

PALAMA DORMITORY ABANDONED; SIX YOUNG MEN LOSE HOMES

Owing to lack of room, Palama has had to give up its dormitory, and as a result there are six men who are hunting around for another rooming house.

When the plan for the new settlement house was first projected, it was thought that one of the features would be a dormitory for men, where they could find lodging at a nominal sum, but on account of the size of the budget it was decided to abandon the original plan of a men's dormitory and utilize the space in the new building for the settlement workers.

The old frame building Waikiki of the present offices of the settlement was rapidly growing uninhabitable, and an opportunity was found to dispose of the lumber originally used in its construction, so yesterday was decided upon for an official moving day and the six residents of the building took their belongings and dispersed to find other quarters. Work of tearing down the old structure was immediately commenced and will be completed within a few days, according to Rath.

The new settlement house, which is being constructed between the gymnasium and the old offices, is rapidly assuming definite proportions. Construction on the second story is in progress, and it is expected the building will be ready for occupancy by September, 1.

The old office quarters will be abandoned, and the new offices, together with the dispensary, will be moved to the basement of the new structure. The upper stories will be used for living and sleeping rooms for the settlement workers.

It is the idea of Head Worker Rath to house all of the workers together, in order that they may benefit each other and the work by exchanging ideas and discussing new problems continually presenting themselves for solution in the course of each day at the settlement.

Miss E. A. Moody, who is the latest addition to the corps of settlement workers, arrived from Boston on last Friday and has entered upon her duties.

HONOLULU'S CLEAN-UP DAY

Cablenews-American, July 18: A few days ago we had somewhat to say in this column of civic improvement societies and the good such agencies may accomplish for a city or town. Attention is called to the subject again by the latest report from Honolulu to the effect that the second annual "clean-up day" was celebrated there, June 20, with astonishing results. The annual clean-up day is an institution allied to the civic improvement society. Honolulu is proud of the results achieved. Over one thousand loads of rubbish were taken from the city between 7 o'clock in the morning and 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

A public holiday was observed throughout the city and everybody joined in the clean-up crusade. Every street, alley and corner of Honolulu was gone over as with a broom. Heaps of rubbish of long standing and of great offense were carted away, every old can in every forgotten lot was picked up. Eyesores that had shamed the proud residents of Honolulu for months were eliminated and thousands of disease-breeding spots were made clean.

All sorts of conveyances were employed. Road-rollers were pressed into use and trundled through the city dragging great trains of wagons loaded with the trash the enthusiastic citizens had gathered up. Autos and auto trucks did valiant service, and private wagons and carts as well. Altogether, it was one of those triumphs for which the good, energetic people of Honolulu are noted.

A number of valuable results, aside from the amount of rubbish disposed of, resulted from the cleaning bee. First of all, Honolulu learned that the city was not so dirty as it had been a year before. The campaign of 1911 had left its effect in a cleaner city throughout the year. The general average of civic pride had been raised by the cooperation of the citizens for one day for the improvement of the city.

Another thing Honolulu learned by the clean-up day was that many spots in the city were in a worse condition than even the health authorities had been aware of. Nooks and corners that had escaped the eyes of the inspectors were found by the citizens in their hunt for rubbish and filth, in a state menacing to health as well as comfort.

The real significance of the clean-up day in Honolulu will be found in the fact that the people of the city could cooperate in such a crusade. The campaign reveals a unanimity of purpose among the citizens, a pride of city, an understanding of what is required to make a community self-respecting at home and admired abroad. It is an exemplification of the spirit that enabled former President Springer and his associates of the Manila Merchants' Association to work that organization up to its present effectiveness—that spirit applied to municipal affairs. It, moreover, shows what might be done in Manila with the proper effort.

FALSE PRETENSE IS CHARGE AGAINST NATIVE

On a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses Mokuila, an elderly Hawaiian, was placed in jail yesterday at the behest of Attorney General Lindsay. He says the man came to him with a subscription list for a new Hawaiian church, which he said was to be built at Kalihi-kali. The list contained a large number of names of prominent Honolulu churchmen, purporting to have been attached within the last three days. Lindsay happened to know that a number of the supposed signers have been on the Coast for several months, and believes the signatures to be forgeries.

This makes but two cases of bubonic plague in the Philippines in the past six years, by far the best record that has been made by any country in the Far East.

ORDINANCE NO. —

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU TO APPOINT A SECRETARY TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AND TO FIX HIS SALARY AND PRESCRIBING THE DUTIES OF SUCH SECRETARY.

Be it Ordained by the People of the City and County of Honolulu: **SECTION 1.** The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of Honolulu, Territory of Hawaii, is hereby authorized to appoint a suitable person, whose salary shall be fixed by said Board, to be known as the Secretary to the Board of Supervisors.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of said Secretary to the Board of Supervisors each week to prepare a statement of the work of the various Departments of the City and County of Honolulu and of the Board of Supervisors, and deposit in the office of the City and County Clerk, as soon as practicable, at least thirty copies of such statement for the use of the Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu, the members of the Board of Supervisors of said City and County of Honolulu and officers and various employees of the Departments of said City and County.
