# EX-PRESIDENT CASTRO READY TO SWOOP ON VENEZUELA AGAIN

Deposed Chief Now Biding His Time in the Canary Islands



Information received by adherents of Cipriano Castro, deposed President of Venezuela, not only indicates that he is in the Canary Islands, but that he is completing arrangements for another descent upon Venezuela. This project may prove successful this time, because of the open hostility to President Gomez, now dangerously approaching revolution, is considered to be almost certain.

It was not generally known that Castro had left Germany, where, five weeks ago, he submitted to an operation. He spent several days in Berlin while recuperating and then disappeared.

Despite the efforts of agents of President Gomez to locate the irrepressible agitator, his whereabouts were not discovered until a few days ago, when his supporters, all of whom have been exiled by President Gomez, received letters from the erstwhile President revealing his purpose to return to South America incognito at the earliest opportunity.

More a Dictator Than Castro.

According to Antonio Jose Sanchez, for many years the private secretary of Castro, General A. Pimental, who was Minister of Finance under President Gomez, is en route to New York to join the Venezuelan junta now operating there, not so much in the interest of Castro, but to overthrow President Gomez, who, it is now declared, has developed into a far more dangerous dictator than Castro was accused of being.

"There is no doubt that a revolution is now under way in Venezuela," said Mr. Sanchez. "The cause of the revolution was greatly assisted on April 29, when President Gomez forced his Cabinet to resign. The facts were not permitted to leak out because of the methods employed by President Gomez to keep his official acts secret. The cable dispatches merely announced the resignation of the Cabinet but we have since learned that the Min-

isters were deposed arbitrarily by President Gomez because he believed them to be conspiring against him."

Says All Promises Were Broken.

"Are you, with other Venezuelans, seeking to overthrow President Gomez in order to place Castro in power?" Mr. Sanchez was asked.

"I have nothing to do with Cipriano Castro's design to reassume control of the Presidency of Venezuela," replied Mr. Sanchez. "I am merely assisting in the work of ridding Venezuela of a man who has violated every promise he made to the people when he became Castro's successor."

Says Gomez Has Made Millions.

It is charged by the Venezuelans in New York that President Gomez has made millions out of his beef monopoly in the last three years, and that by reason of this price have advanced to extraordinary figures.

This has embittered the people of the Republic, who, it is said, do not conceal their dislike of the President and preference for Castro, who, at least, they say, did not deprive them of the necessities of life to enrich himself. It is charged also that the troops in the quarters are disaffected and that the revolutionary spirit is increasing hourly.

While it is generally known in the Venezuelan colony in New York that Castro meditates another descent upon Caracas, the impression prevails that he may meet with opposition among the Venezuelans themselves, who do not relish his return to power after ten years of dictatorial rule by him. The Venezuelan Minister in Washington is watching events closely and is in daily communication with Mr. Knox, the Secretary of State, relative thereto.

## PARTY PROGRAM SHOWS CZAR'S POLICY IN CHINA

Russia's intentions as to Mongolia and Northern Manchuria are indicated by the resolution recently adopted by the National Party of Russia, the organization which for years supported the policy of Premier Stolypin and which has latterly been led by Kovastoff. The program of policy adopted at a conference held in St. Petersburg recently is as follows:

Manchuria—Annexation of northern Manchuria. If that be for the moment impossible, then the new treaty with China ought to provide for the following measures—(1) Exclusion of Chinese and foreign shipping on the rivers Argun, Amur, Ussuri, and in the basin on the Sungari; (2) renunciation by China of the right of constructing railways in the region between the Eastern Chinese railway line and the Russian frontier; (3) the "restoration" of Russian possessions along the right bank of the Amur river within the limits of Russian "de facto" occupation between 1909 and 1906; (4) renunciation by China of the right of construction railways, without Russia's consent from the Gulf of Liao-tung to the Russian frontier; (5) the establishment for the entire period of the lease of complete extra-territoriality of the leased strip along the Eastern Chinese railway in the section Manchuria-Pogranichnaya and Harbin-Kwangchengtsze; (6) limitation of the number of the Chinese troops in northern Manchuria, and (7) renunciation by China of the right of erecting fortifications on the Russo-Manchurian frontier.

Mongolia—(1) The recognition and sanction of the complete independence of Mongolia; (2) rectification of the Russo-Mongolian frontier, with a view to the strategical safety of Siberia and her communication with European Russia, also a precise restoration of the Mongolo-Chinese frontier according to the decree of Di Fang-Yuan; (3) conclusion of a commercial treaty directly with Mongolia; (4) all-round assistance to Mongolia in her aspirations for political development and (5) strengthening of the Russian economic and cultural influence in Mongolia by the establishment of Russo-Mongolian schools.

## PRESERVING BOOKS IN THE TROPICS

Books painted with the following compounds on their receipt in the Tropics, and every three to six months thereafter, are rendered exempt from damage by the ever present cockroach and much less liable to attack by wood ants and silver fish. They should be painted all over the outside when closed and inside thoroughly at the seam of both front and back covers. A strip 2 to 3 inches wide should also be painted on the inside edges of the covers. In this manner, with a little trouble and trifling expense, the archives can be kept in good condition.

The formula is as follows: Carboxylic sublimate 1-2 ounce; carbolic acid, 1 ounce; methylated spirits, 2 pints; Label "Poison."

#### Bill No. 48. ORDINANCE NO. —

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU TO APPOINT A SECRETARY TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AND TO FIX HIS SALARY, AND PRESCRIBING THE DUTIES OF SUCH SECRETARY. Be It Ordained by the People of the City and County of Honolulu:

SECTION 1. The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of Honolulu, Territory of Hawaii, is hereby authorized to appoint a suitable person, whose salary shall be fixed by said Board, to be known as the Secretary to the Board of Supervisors.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of said Secretary to the Board of Supervisors each week to prepare a statement of the work of the various Departments of the City and County of Honolulu and of the Board of Supervisors, and deposit in the office of the City and County Clerk, as soon as practicable, at least thirty copies of such statement for the use of the Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu, the members of the Board of Supervisors of said City and County of Honolulu and officers and various employees of the Departments of said City and County.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall take effect fifteen days from and after the date of its approval.
