## SAMUELS OPTIMISTIC AT OCEANIC LINE PROSPECTS IN SOUTH SEAS

Vice President and General Manager F. S. Samuels of the Oceanic Steamship line is a through passenger in the liner Ventura, that called at Honolulu today, completing the round trip to the colonies has declared himself as optimistic at the prospects of a success of the new "New Sydney Short Line" as inaugurated by the Oceanic company with the steamers Sonoma and Ventura.

Mr. Samuels is now completing the last leg of a voyage that carried him to Sydney N. S. W. in the initial trip of the Sonoma. At that time the Oceanic officials bore correspondence that reached Sydney in a trifle less than twenty-nine days after being dispatched from London, Eng.

The tour made by Mr. Samuels has had to do with the establishment of agencies through Australia. He is reported as much pleased over the cordial reception accorded the advent of a direct line from the United States to the Colonies.

Accompanying Mr. Samuels on his tour of the south seas with J. W. Burdette, a San Francisco jurist and identified with the Spreckels interests along the coast. Judge Burdette visited the colonies in the capacity of legal adviser.

The Ventura was an object of much attention on arrival this morning, in that a number of distinguished passengers were aboard, destined for the mainland.

The territorial band played British and American patriotic airs as the vessel neared the wharf in honor of Ambassador and Mrs. Bryce, of Great Britain.

The Ventura made a record time in reaching Sydney. At Pago Pago the vessel was the central attraction for thousands of Samoans who came from miles away to witness the arrival of the liner. A series of feasts and native dances were given during the brief stay of the liner at Pago Pago.

The Oceanic line is proving a blessing to the isolated colony of Americans of the Tutuila naval and coaling station.

The Oceanic liners have been assigned a berth at the new wharves at Millers Point, Sydney harbor. The stay at the New South Wales capital is limited to but five days, in order that the fast schedule of nineteen days from Sydney to San Francisco can be maintained.

The liner arrived here this morning with thirty-five passengers. The arrivals for this port left the vessel before eight o'clock.

Refrigerated cargo in the form of beef quarters to the number of 625 were left here. The vessel is carrying a thousand tons freight to San Francisco.

Furber "Bill" Reid, a former old timer in the Toy Kien Kalahe service, now completing his maiden voyage to Australia reported fine weather on the trip.

A program of concerts and deck sports served to keep the passengers well entertained.

The Ventura is to sail for San Francisco at five o'clock this evening taking at least one hundred passengers from this port destined for the coast.

Carter Sought Deserters. Harbor Officer Carter paid a visit to the United States army transport Logan before that vessel departed for San Francisco last evening and made a careful search for deserters or others who might have attempted to gain the troopship as a means of obtaining a cheap passage from the islands to the coast.

The quest proved fruitless, however. The Logan sailed shortly after five o'clock taking a score of military passengers from Honolulu destined to the mainland.

Wilhelmina Returning Sunday. The Matson Navigation liner Wilhelmina, departing last night for Hilo will return to Honolulu early Sunday morning, according to the expectations of Castle & Cooke, the local agents for that vessel. The Wilhelmina will be discharged of eighteen hundred tons cargo while at Hilo and at the same time will take on a quantity of sugar intended for coast refueling. The Wilhelmina will sail for San Francisco at ten o'clock next Wednesday morning.

Bark Allen Entered Harbor This Morning. The Matson Navigation tug Intrepid stood by the American bark S. C. Allen early this morning and following the granting of practice by the Federal officers, the windjammer with her cargo of eight hundred thousand feet of lumber was moving through the channel and to a berth in the harbor. The vessel came from Grays Harbor, making the voyage in twenty-three days.

Chiyo Maru Brings Distinguished Passengers. Six hundred dollars in fines has been assessed the Secretary Fisher party that arrived at Honolulu this morning as passengers in the Japanese liner Chiyo Maru from San Francisco.

Walter L. Fisher, Secretary of the

Interior accompanied by Mrs. Fisher and his private secretary H. A. Meyer were three passengers from the Coast to Honolulu in a vessel which is of foreign registry and thus entailing the assessment of a fine of two hundred dollars imposed for each infraction of the coastwise shipping laws.

In Fisher's case the fine will probably be a matter of form and will be remitted in view of the fact that his traveling by this particular ship was a necessity of the public service.

The Chiyo Maru was an early arrival and came alongside Alakaa wharf at nine o'clock amid the strains from the Royal Hawaiian band that had gathered to greet the incoming cabinet official.

The liner brought four passengers for Honolulu. The through list included 129 cabin, 103 second class and in the steerage there traveled 75 Japanese and 59 Chinese for the orient.

According to Purser Chapman the Chiyo Maru met with fine weather on the five day and twenty hour trip from the coast to the islands.

A daily concert and entertainment had been planned and was carried out to a successful issue.

The liner is bearing a through cargo amounting to about three thousand tons, which is to be discharged at the regular ports along the Japan and China coast.

The Chiyo Maru is to be dispatched for the orient at five o'clock this evening, a dozen cabin and a hundred or more oriental passengers joining the vessel at this port.

Kiyo Maru Carried Hundreds of Passengers. The Japanese freighter Kiyo Maru in the Central and South American service arrived at Honolulu this morning from Japan ports and has been berthed at the Waikiki side of Alakaa wharf, to be discharged of 40 tons general Oriental cargo.

Six hundred passengers, mainly Asiatics, destined for South American ports, are on board in transit. The vessel will remain here until 8 a. m. tomorrow, at which time she will sail for the west coast of Central and South America.

Two Hundred Asiatics to Depart in the Chiyo. The Japanese liner Chiyo Maru, to sail for Japan and China ports this evening will carry at least two hundred Asiatic steerage passengers to the Orient according to the bookings on file at the office of Castle & Cooke, the local representatives of that line.

The vessel will also take fifteen cabin passengers from this port. The Chiyo Maru sails for Yokohama at 5 o'clock this evening.

ANOTHER HAYTIAN PRETENDER. Gen. Saint Just Likely to Demand the Presidency. PORT AU PRINCE, Hayti, Aug. 20.—News that Gen. Triboniat Saint Just has either started or is just about to start for Port au Prince to claim the presidency of Hayti, bringing with him a big party of followers who have been in exile in Jamaica since the late Gen. Leonote became president, caused a panic here today.

Saint Just cannot become president without displacing Gen. Auguste, the Haytian congress's choice as Leonote's successor, and Auguste will not give up without fighting. He counts on the army to support him, but it is said many of the soldiers favor Saint Just.

Reports have it that the Dominican government is preparing a demand for explanation of Hayti's alleged activity in stirring up a revolution in Santo Domingo. Between Saint Just and Santo Domingo the people think there is pretty sure to be fighting shortly and are seriously frightened.

That an agent of the Haytian exiles in Santo Domingo caused the death of Leonote has not been verified. The American warship which arrived yesterday to protect foreigners in case of disturbances ashore is now at anchor off the city.

Funeral services for Gen. Leonote were held today. The body was buried with military honors. All flags were at half-mast.

## FEDERAL TELEGRAPH CHARGED WITH INFRINGING ON PATENTS

### Marconi Company Brings Two Suits Against Poulsen Company Asking for Injunctions and Heavy Damages—Litigation Instituted in California—Previous Claims Sustained

Two suits for injunctions and damages for the infringement of wireless telegraph patents have been brought in the United States District Court for the Northern District of California by the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of America against the Federal Telegraph Company. The patents involved cover basic inventions of the well-known inventor, Mr. Marconi, and the English scientist, Sir Oliver Lodge. Two of the patents have already been adjudged valid and held to have been infringed by the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York. The bills of complaint in these suits allege that the Federal Telegraph Company is making and using the apparatus and system of these wireless telegraph patents, and claim that the Marconi company is entitled to an injunction restraining the Federal company, and its associated directors, officers, etc., from the infringement of the patents, and that the Marconi company is entitled to a large amount of damages and profits which it has sustained by reason of the Federal company's infringement. If the claims of the Marconi company in these suits are sustained, the Federal company will be obliged to discontinue the use of the infringing wireless telegraph apparatus and compelled to pay damages to the Marconi company. The Marconi company is represented by Sheffield, Bendley & Betts of New York City and Samuel Knight of San Francisco.

For sweeping refuse from his place of business to the street, a Japanese named Iwashiga was fined five dollars and the costs of prosecution at this morning's session of Police Court. The prosecution of such offenders comes under a new ordinance recently passed by the Board of Supervisors.

As a result of a neighborhood scrap, Georgiana Marks was placed under arrest for mistreating a child of Porto Rican parentage at Camp Number 3. The case was dragged into the police court this morning and following the lot of conflicting testimony the presiding judge discharged the defendant, Georgiana Marks, the woman having been found not guilty of the alleged assault upon the child.

Percy Levy is alleged by the police to have driven a motorcycle through the downtown streets of Honolulu at a pace faster than that prescribed by the law. ## MRS. LORRIN ANDREWS NO LOSER HER FIGHT FOR ALIMONY

Supreme Bench Forbids Lower Court to Continue the Contempt Proceedings

Such hopes as Mrs. Lorrin Andrews No. 1 may have entertained as to forcing her former husband to pay her monthly alimony, through contempt proceedings were shattered this morning, when the supreme court handed down a decision, making absolute the temporary writ of prohibition secured by Lorrin Andrews to prevent Judge Whitney of the circuit court from attempting to force the payment of alimony through proceedings for contempt.

The supreme court holds that the lower court at the time of the divorced decree being granted to Andrews upon the ground of his wife's desertion, was without jurisdiction to award alimony and any such alleged agreement is null and void. The court holds further that in such a case even the consent of the parties is ineffectual to give the court power to award alimony.

The supreme court holds that there is no provision in the statute pointing to the existence of the power of a divorce court to grant alimony as an incident to a decree for the fault of the wife and that under no law written or unwritten is a husband required to support his wife, if she has without caused some other breach of her duty to him, constituting grounds for divorce.

Whether Mrs. Andrews No. 1 can otherwise than by contempt proceedings recover upon the former husband's alleged contract to pay, is a question which the court does not pass upon, holding that it does not arise in the case at bar.
