**CITY FATHERS CLASH AND  
CLATTER OVER TRIFLES**

**Row Starts at Introduction of  
Payroll for Election Inspectors  
and Room Is Swept by  
Torrent of Windy Words**

Dull mutterings as of a distant storm rumbled through the assembly room in the city hall last night, when the board of supervisors met for the second gathering since the disastrous election. As the meeting progressed the rumbling grew louder, until, when Eben Low presented his resolution calling for the payment of the election inspectors, the storm center swept into the room and engulfed those present in the mighty whirl of words.

Low wants the county to pay \$600 for the inspectors' salaries. McClellan objected. This was the bill that was held up by the ways and means committee from the previous meeting. It provided that inspectors should be paid \$10 for their services. It was supposed to have been drawn up after a discussion of that committee in the office of Frank Kruger, but just what happened at that meeting no one was able to say, as the members of the committee present last night disagreed absolutely, one saying that one decision had been reached, and another contradicting him flatly. The bill was finally tabled, and the matter will be taken up for consideration at that committee meeting before the next meeting of the board.

This row preceded another, not quite so vitriolic in character, which started over a question asked by His Honor the Mayor.

Mayor Fern wanted to know if there was not a road contract under way out in Kaimuki. He did not know, the road supervisor did not know, and no one else on the board appeared able to enlighten the darkness, and there was a delightful shyness that lasted, to the disgust of the onlookers, for the best part of a quarter of an hour.

The supervisors, since passing the dance hall ordinance, are now burdened with applications for dancing permits, and last night applications for permission to dance poured in upon the board.

The senior class of the McKinley High School, through John Galt, requested permission to give a dance in the assembly room of the school on December 20, the proceeds to be used by the class for their graduation exercises. The students got their permit but pay \$1 to the treasury.

A. M. Keelo, secretary of Damien Council, notified the board that the council will give a dance at the Young Hotel, November 27, for raising funds for a Christmas tree celebration for the benefit of the orphans of the Kaimuki Orphanage, and also for the children of the members of the institute. This was granted, no fee required.

Mrs. M. Shearer, of Kaimuki, asked the board for a permit to hold a dance every Saturday evening at the Oahu Fellows' hall, until further notice. The latter sentence was the cause of the application being held up as the supervisors wanted to know whether a penny notice is wanted.

Delei Iihiki, for the Aloha Lahui Society, was granted a permit for a dance at Nottley Hall, December 23. Engineers' Estimates.

City Engineer Whitehouse sent the board the following estimates for road work:

Grading and constructing a macadam road up Pauoa Valley for three-quarters of a mile from the end of the present macadamized road, fifteen feet wide at fills, with six inches of macadam cover, \$12,000.

For constructing a lava gravel road on Pahoa avenue, from Eighth to Twelfth avenues, \$1800.

A similar road for Palolo avenue, from Koko Head avenue to Eighth avenue, \$1750.

To re-gravel Mauna Loa avenue, from Sixth to Twelfth avenues, \$2,000, approximately.

To construct a water-bound and macadam road, thirty feet wide, along Koko Head avenue, from Pahoa avenue to Waialae road, \$34,000; with asphalt cover, \$600 additional.

That the present board may go out of existence with all its bills paid, Supervisor Murray requested the clerk to notify all heads of departments to get up their accounts to November 30, and have them ready for presentation to the board at its first meeting in December.

He also requested the clerk to insert a "By Authority" notice in the newspapers notifying all merchants who had accounts with the county to prepare and file their statements early in December, so that the board could make provision for paying them.

**BUSINESS ITEMS**

Walker's boat works, burned down some months ago, are being rebuilt.

Raw sugar firm at 4.05 and refined steady, is the latest from New York.

Some of the stores are already displaying Christmas goods in their windows.

There is much activity in real estate under the surface, and some large deals will soon be recorded.

Building permits this week are running largely to groups of cheap cottages for small-paying tenantry.

Since the completion of the outside changes, work on the interior of the Bank of Hawaii is progressing rapidly.

Blahop & Co.'s bank is now using its new bookkeeper's room in the Rhodes building, and the Davies grocery department in the same building is approaching completion.

There will be a meeting of the stockholders of Oahu Sugar Company on November 22. It is supposed to be called to decide whether to bond the Koolau water scheme or to apply the surplus in the treasury to the work.

It is reported that the two telephone companies operating on the island of Hawaii will be amalgamated, at least in a working agreement, with the Mutual Telephone Company. Details of the merger are not yet completed.

Yesterday's closing quotations at San Francisco were: Hawaiian Commercial, 46 asked; Hawaiian Sugar, 37 bid, 46 asked; Honokaa, 10 asked; Hinchinbrook, 18.50 asked; Kilauea, 12 bid; Oowhee, 35 asked; Peahi, 20.50 asked; Honolulu Plantation, 35 asked.

Large selling orders and prices sagging were the features of the New York stock exchange yesterday morning. News of prospects of end of the Balkan war caused the tide to turn, and by noon prices had recovered to around the closing level of the day before. In the afternoon little was done. Bonds were steady.


