### TEDDY LOSES TWO PREGINCTS

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 21.—By a decision of the appellate court here today only the vote for A. J. Wallace, Progressive, and for T. F. Griffin, Democrat, both candidates for presidential electors, is valid. This throws out the vote for Roosevelt in two precincts of this city, and gives the State of California to Wilson by a small plurality. It is probable that the decision will be appealed.

### Over-Night FEDERAL Wireless To the Advertiser

Danger of general war is considered past in London diplomatic circles. Servia's acceptance of a compromise over the Adriatic port dispute having removed the casus belli. The Serbians yielded under pressure from their Allies.

Reports that a massacre of Christians has started at Jaffa, thirty miles northwest of Jerusalem, have not as yet been confirmed, but there is great anxiety here among representatives of the Powers.

Kimil Pasha reports that the epidemic of cholera among the Turkish troops is subsiding. This, eye witnesses deny.

Medical treatment these witnesses say is most perfunctory. Cars crowded with sick arrive at San Stefano and the victims are unloaded head over heels down an embankment, along the tracks, where most of them are left without further treatment. There are few tents in the camp.

Jack Johnson was granted by United States District Judge Carpenter today three weeks in which to file demurrers to the five charges against him of violation of the Mann White Slave Act, in transporting Belle Schreiber, a white woman, across different State boundaries for immoral purposes.

While his wife was down town buying tickets to Oklahoma, where he was to go in search of health, James Frick, utility infielder of the Oakland baseball team of the Pacific Coast League, yesterday drank carbolic acid, dying soon afterwards. Frick came to Portland with his wife at the end of the last baseball season, ill and despondent.

His illness and the probable giving up of baseball are said to have affected his mind.

Sam Scheppe, one of the men involved in the death of Herman Rosenthal, for which Lieut. Chas. Becker is under sentence of death and four gunmen are convicted of murder, was today released from the Tombs.

Eight floors of the wall on the Sixth street side of the Marquam building, a sky-scraper in the heart of the business section of Portland, Oregon, collapsed today, but, miraculously, no one was hurt.

Twenty sailors and bluejackets were badly wounded at Tokyo, Japan, today when an explosion of gunpowder occurred in the magazine of the cruiser Nisshin. Half of the injured will die.

Ottie McManigal resumed the witness stand today and continued his description of dynamiting, telling most damaging stories regarding the blowing up of the "Times" building in Los Angeles.

C. G. Bartlett, manager of the Honolulu brewery, is in San Francisco on a two months' stay during which he will investigate the hop-growing industry with the intention of opening a brewery in San Francisco.

Aviator Frey, victor in the recent Paris-Rome flight, fell today from his aeroplane and was killed.

The San Francisco Chinese Free Press received the following dispatch today from Canton:

"It is reported that Wu Han Wen, governor of Kwang Tung Province, is prepared to dispatch an army of 20,000 soldiers to the Mongolian frontier for the protection of Chinese interests.

New York State re-arrested its case against Burton W. Gibson, the New York lawyer, charged with the murder of Mrs. Rogers Sabo, a client. Dr. Otis H. Schultz, of New York, a coroner's physician, testified that Mrs. Sabo died of strangulation and not drowning.

Reports from Durango, Mexico, to the State Department state that the American owned Magway ranch, sixty miles west of Durango was completely sacked and its buildings burned, November 20, by a force of 100 rebels. A detachment of federal cavalry is pursuing the rebels.

### CENTRAL UNION GETS SOLOIST

Mrs. L. F. Jones Comes from Wailuku Union Church to Local Position

[Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence] WAILUKU, Maui, Nov. 19.—Mrs. L. F. Jones, who has been the soloist at the Wailuku Union Church for the last two months, has today accepted the position of first soprano of the Central Union Church, Honolulu.

The Central Union was anxious to obtain the services of Mrs. Jones, who has been an open secret in musical circles for the last few days. The arrangement was consummated by wireless this morning when Mrs. Jones received word to come by today's Claudine.

The musical committee of the Central Union is certainly to be congratulated upon securing Mrs. Jones for the music of the church. She was previously very favorably known in Honolulu by some music lovers, for she sang regularly at St. Clement's Church, where her voice was very much enjoyed for its sweetness and sympathy.

On Maui Mrs. Jones' work has been especially appreciated. She has taken the solo work in the Wailuku Union church, which for the last two years has been favorably known for its good music. Acting as assistant chorister in this church, and occasionally singing outside the church on social occasions, Mrs. Jones has brought an unusually large amount of pleasure to Maui people. It is seldom that a voice with such quality has been heard here.

The standing committee of the Maui church has been happy in having Mrs. Jones sing even for the short space of two months. Several who have been trained in music on the mainland have frequently praised her rendering as the best they had ever heard. Her peculiar adaptability to religious music and her remarkable sympathy with her theme make her work especially valuable in a church. There is nothing more about her. All fans from the oratorios have been marked by the keenest appreciation of the work of the composer. She seems to live over again his experiences.
