PORTLAND-TO-ORIENT LINE VERY POSSIBLE

Hamburg-American steamers will be running from Portland to the Orient and on through to Europe via Suez Canal by the first of the year, if the Chamber of Commerce and others interested in the establishment of such a line exert their influence to bring that result about, declares the Telegram. This conclusion is reached from remarks made by Fritz H. Kirchhoff, agent at Portland for the China Import & Export Company, who has just returned from a hurried trip to New York, where he conferred with head officials of the company.

The company has not done anything definite relative to the matter of having its steamers stop at Portland, says Mr. Kirchhoff, "as the proposals advertised by the Chamber of Commerce have not assumed concrete form. Until then it will be out of the question to enter into negotiations. Meanwhile Portland should bring the matter to a head to induce the line to come here, in order to prevent other Pacific Coast ports from reaping the benefits to be derived from the establishment of the line." The plan as proposed is for the steamers to sail from Europe to the

Far East and thence to San Francisco. On the outward trip they will go to the Orient and back to Europe, bringing the shippers in touch with new markets in both quarters of the world. As yet it is problematical as to what other ports on this Coast than San Francisco the steamers will make regular calls. If it should be decided to send them to Portland, there will be one steamer of 10,000 tons capacity leaving here every month.

G. Giese, manager of the Oriental service of the Hamburg-American Steamship Company, will arrive in Portland in a few days to confer with the Chamber of Commerce officials and the various shippers. During his stay it is believed that an understanding of a definite nature will be reached as to whether the steamers will stop in here. It even is held possible that Portland may be made the terminal of the steamers on this side of the Pacific.

Mr. Kirchhoff formerly was manager of the Hamburg-American line in the Orient, and he has a close acquaintance with all of its officials. It was for this reason that he made the trip to New York to set before them the advantages of Portland, which he has decided to make his home.

ZEALANDIA FROM COLONIES HERE; PURSER COXALL DEAD AT SYDNEY

Purser P. Coxall, until two months ago connected with the liner Zealandia and for the past fifteen years a regular visitor at the port of Honolulu as an official in Canadian-Australian liners died at Sydney, N. S. W., on November 20th.

Such was the news brought to this city this morning with the arrival of the Zealandia which completed a fine run from the colonies to Honolulu by the way of Auckland and Suva.

Prior to the placing of the Zealandia on the Vancouver-Honolulu-Suva-Auckland-Sydney run, Coxall was identified with the official family on board the old steamship Aorangi. Commander J. S. D. Phillips was much affected over the loss of a well liked officer, the news of death having been sent to the Zealandia through wireless the second day following the departure of the liner from Sydney to Auckland.

Coxall is said to have been about forty years old. He was a man of a family, a widow and one child surviving. He made his home at Sydney during the greater part of his service with the Union Steamship Company.

From what could be learned this morning the popular steamship man passed away as the result of tuberculosis. When the official last visited Honolulu, two trips ago, he appeared to be the picture of health.

It was shortly after his arrival at Sydney that he is said to have contracted a sudden cold that rapidly developed into something far more serious.

H. S. Faulkner, prominent in Union Steamship circles and later as an accommodating and obliging officer has been appointed to take over the duties of purser in the Zealandia.

He returned in that capacity in the Zealandia this morning.

Charters Continue to Bring Steady Rates

Tacoma, Nov. 11.—In spite of the freights prevailing in the shipping world, the charter retains a marked activity. The list of charters made last week includes fifteen or twenty fixtures in the foreign trade from the North Pacific. Comparisons of rates paid in 1911 and those now paid bring out some interesting figures. The old union rate of 27 shillings 6 pence that prevailed in 1911 is now about doubled for grain to the United Kingdom.

In the Honolulu cargo are three automobiles. One interesting item in the freight carried in the Honolulu is a shipment of 2000 boxes of apples. The vessel will proceed to Hilo instead of Kahului on this trip.

Wilhelmina Will Sail Lightly Laden. Taking a small amount of cargo including pineapples, coffee, rice and sundries but no sugar, the Matson Navigation steamship Wilhelmina is to depart for San Francisco at ten o'clock tomorrow morning. The liner will carry a small list of cabin and steerage passengers judging from the advance booking at the office of Castle and Cooke.

Hilonian At Hilo.

The Matson Navigation steamer Hilonian was expected to arrive at Hilo today, there to complete the discharge of mainland freight and complete cargo intended for San Francisco. The Hilonian it is believed will sail for the coast tomorrow afternoon.

A BUREAU OF PATRONYMIC

The interesting suggestion has lately been made that a bureau of patronymics be established to assist immigrants in changing their names to conform to the English language. It seems a misfortune that family generations, have to be broken off in this manner, but this is the fate of emigrants to a land where a strange tongue is spoken. Even the aristocratic Norman names in England have suffered a transformation in spelling, in pronunciation, or in both. Who would look for St. Privat behind Spratt, or Bourillon behind Bullen? Names war down like words as in the corruption of Sevenoaks into the plain Snooks. In this country many of the German names have been altered, but the family names of some of the nationalities now coming in, Polish, Czech, Magyar, Russian and others, are far more unpronounceable than the German. An alteration is often a matter of simple necessity, and it ought to be done well. A bureau might be of real service in standardizing such changes and save the America of the future from being filled with unrecognizable names. Nor should it be forgotten that some day genealogists will be tracing some of these altered patronymics as patently as they now search for the origins of early colonists or the German ancestry of the house of Rockefeller.—Springfield Republican.
