

Local Post Office Now Ready For The Parcels Post System



Map showing how parcels post plan will work in Hawaii. Territory is divided into units within certain zones. All units inside the first zone will be served by parcels post at the rate of five cents for the first pound or fraction and three cents for each additional pound. Units in the second zone, marked "2," are served for six cents for the first pound and four cents for the additional pound. The third zone, the units of which lie entirely outside the big circle, is served for seven cents and five cents. The detailed workings of the proposed system was explained in a talk made before the Honolulu Ad. Club by E. M. Cheatham of B. F. Ehlers & Co.

RATES OF POSTAGE FOR PARCELS POST IN HAWAII

The rates of postage for parcels post mailed in Honolulu postoffice for delivery to the other offices in the territory follow: For local delivery, 1 cent an ounce up to four ounces; over four ounces to one pound, 5 cents; and 1 cent for each additional pound or fraction of a pound. For delivery in first zone, fifty miles, 1 cent per ounce for four ounces; over four ounces to one pound, 5 cents; and for each additional pound or fraction of a pound, 3 cents. The first zone embraces all offices on the island of Oahu and Kaunakakai on Molokai. For delivery to postoffices in second zone, 1 cent per ounce for four ounces, and 6 cents for five ounces to one pound, and 4 cents for each additional pound or fraction of a pound. The second zone embraces all postoffices on Molokai except Kaunakakai; islands of Kauai, Maui, Nihaui, Kahoolawe and Mahukona only on island of Hawaii. For delivery to postoffices in third zone, which embraces all offices on the island of Hawaii, except Mahukona, 1 cent per ounce for four ounces, and 7 cents for five ounces to one pound; and for each additional pound or fraction of a pound, 5 cents. All parcels should bear parcels postage stamps only affixed and be presented at the postoffice for examination and weighing before being deposited in the mails. Parcels postage stamps are not valid on other classes of mail. The rates of postage for parcels post mail from Hawaii to all points in the United States and territories and Philippine islands is 1 cent for each ounce for four ounces, and over four ounces the rate is 12 cents per pound or fraction of a pound. The foregoing applies to parcels post mail in the United States and territories, including Philippine islands and District of Columbia, and does not apply to parcels post mail to foreign countries, which remains the same heretofore, and such mail (foreign) must bear the usual ordinary postage stamps affixed at the rate of 12 cents per pound and not exceeding eleven pounds in weight.

Postmaster Pratt has issued instructions regarding the regulations for the sending of parcels through the post, according to the instructions received from the postmaster general some weeks ago. These instructions include the formalities that special stamps must be used in sending the mail matter through by the new system, as well as a list of rates. The installation of the system will make but little difference in the work of the local post office until after the ships begin bringing the packages through the mail, as until that time the postmaster of Honolulu confesses that he will be unable to make any arrangements. "We can't tell what to do until we face the actual conditions created by the new law," said Mr. Pratt this morning. "So far as the sending of the packages under the new law is concerned, there will be little need for increased facilities. It will be the receipts that make the difference, if any. "I want to explain to the people of Honolulu that the supply of parcels post stamps—which is the way that will be used on all packages—that we have on hand at present is limited. For this reason they will be sold only to purchasers actually testing to send parcels through the mail at any given time. In other words, one will be allowed to buy stamps for future use. We expect to get a large supply of stamps on the steamer arriving here Jan. 2, in which case this embargo will be discontinued. Information as to details of the

matter of this class. Parcels post of postage or postage due on matter of the first, second or third class. For 5 cents any parcels post package may be insured against loss to the amount of its actual value, not to exceed \$25, and a receipt will be given the person mailing the package, and a stub showing such insurance is attached to the package upon which the consignee receipts for its delivery.

Weight Limit. The weight limit on packages is 11 pounds, and the size of the package is limited to length and girth of six feet. This means that a piece of twine six feet in length and no longer, would be placed around the package lengthwise, and then around its girth.

Parcels Post Rates. A comprehensive rate chart has been prepared by the postoffice, showing the exact rates for packages of different weights in each of the eight zones. These zones are measured in distances of 50, 150, 300, 600, 1,000, 1,500 miles and more than 1,800. The rate of a one-pound package from Honolulu to any point on Oahu or other places within the 50-mile zone would be 5 cents. The same package sent to Hilo, which is outside the 150-mile zone and therefore would take the 300-mile rate, would be 7 cents. To San Francisco, outside the 1,800-mile zone, a one-pound package could be mailed for 12 cents. An 11-pound package could be sent from San Francisco for \$1.32.

Special Stamps for Service. Under the new parcels post law matter dispatched must bear the distinctive postage stamps, a series of twelve denominations of which will be issued by the postoffice department. Five denominations of due stamps also will be issued for the service.

Whole Country Alert. From all over the mainland comes information that the larger cities, the country towns and districts are getting ready for the enormous increase in the amount of postal business expected when the parcels post gets into full working order and the people begin to realize the manifold advantages of it.

The new system will be effective throughout the entire postal service at the same time. Every precaution will be taken by the postoffice department to have the mail moved with the usual dispatch, and all postmasters, superintendents and inspectors have been directed to familiarize themselves and their subordinates with every phase of the new system.

Books Not Included. The regulations provide that parcels of merchandise, including farm and factory products, "but not books and printed matter," of almost every description up to eleven pounds in weight and measuring as much as six feet in length and girth combined, except those calculated to do injury to the mails in transit, may be mailed at any postoffice for delivery to any address in the country.

Delivery will be made to the homes of people living on rural or star routes as well as to those living in cities and towns where there is delivery by carrier. Where there is no de-

QUEER RULES IN PARCELS POST

The rules regulating the parcels post have arrived in Honolulu and some of them make reading as quaint and queer as the sentences rattled off by an office boy when learning to operate a typewriting machine.

"Pistols or revolvers, whether in detached parts or otherwise, live or dead animals, except live bees, will not be accepted," reads one of the rules.

Evidently the government considers animate bees less dangerous to handle than the inanimate parts of weapons of offense and defense—or of other live or dead animals.

"Fresh meat in any form may be transported, only within the first zone," reads another of the rules.

"This unquestionably is a considerable provision for the meat, as the first zone means fifty miles of transportation."

"Mummified" meat has a much wider latitude under the rules, which read:

"Salted, dried, smoked and cured meats or meat products will be accepted for mailing to any zone."

Here are some of the other rules: Parcels mailed in the United States for delivery in Canada and Cuba will be limited to four pounds six ounces in weight. Parcels for Mexico and for the republic of Panama will be accepted up to eleven pounds. The eighth zone rate will apply to these countries, except on parcels weighing four ounces or less.

Seeds, sortings, bulbs, scions and plants are fourth-class matter, but will be carried at the special rate of 1 cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof, regardless of distance, as at present provided, but will be accepted up to eleven pounds in weight.

be accepted by mailing beyond the first zone. Parcels may be insured for their full value up to \$50 upon the payment of a fee of 10 cents. A person insuring a parcel will be given a return receipt showing the signature of the person to whom delivered, if request for such return receipt is made at the time of mailing.

A parcel post guide and map has been prepared and may be secured by remitting a money order for 75 cents to the Chief Clerk, Postoffice Department, Washington.
