**BLOOD-POISON
ATTACK FATAL
TO DR. PETERSON**

Honolulu loses one of its most eminent citizens, and the Territory one of its most valuable public servants in the death last night of Dr. Charles A. Peterson, superintendent of the Insane Asylum, the unexpectedness of the sad event being a shock to the community. It was only a few days ago, since the doctor was down town in his usual health and habitual good humor. The cause of death was blood poisoning from a slight trouble in the nose, discovered first on Christmas Day but not thought anything serious. During the week infection developed, until, within 24 hours of the end, the condition of the patient became dangerous. At 9 o'clock last night Dr. Peterson passed away.

His body was removed from the asylum, where his death occurred, to the residence of his brother-in-law, A. V. Gear, Emma street, from whence the funeral took place at 11 o'clock this morning. Dr. Doremas Scudder, pastor of Central Union church, conducted the services. The funeral was virtually a private one, only relatives and intimate friends being in attendance. After the services the body was conveyed to Nuuanu cemetery and cremated. The pallbearers were E. W. Peterson, C. F. Peterson, A. V. Gear and Harold Gear. Among many floral tributes was a wreath from the employees of the asylum.

Besides his aged mother, Dr. Peterson leaves a wife, one son, two daughters, a brother and a sister to mourn his loss. Clarence, the only son, is with a Philadelphia mining company, having graduated at Stanford university after passing a very fine examination in engineering. Elsie, one of the daughters, is a teacher in the Normal school here, and Helen is attending college at Stanford. The surviving brother is E. W. Peterson of the clerical staff of Castle & Cooke, Ltd., and the sister is Mrs. A. V. Gear. The late Arthur Peterson, attorney general in the reign of Liliuokalani, was a brother of the doctor. His father died several years ago and his daughter Miriam about a year ago.

Charles A. Peterson, M. D., was born at Sandwich, Massachusetts, on November 9, 1856, hence was in the fifty-seventh year of his age at death. Removing to Honolulu with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Daniel P. Peterson, receiving his earlier education at Punahou. He took the degree of B. A. and M. A. at Amherst College and that of M. D. at the College of Physicians and Surgeons, New York, the medical department of Columbia University. Returning to these islands he engaged in practice but was early enlisted in the public service, being successively district physician in several districts, medical superintendent at Kalaupapa, Honolulu
