FILIPINOS DRAW LONG TERMS IN PRISON

Sentenced to serve over three years in prison, having been found guilty of larceny, two Filipinos, were given a prompt disposition when their case was called before Judge Monsarrat in district court this morning.

C. Abrica and Pedro Espinosa, are two little brown brothers from the Philippines, who really felt as to the need spread for their reception by Deputy Chief of Detectives Kellett.

Police officers have received many complaints concerning a more or less systematic attempt at burglarizing lodging and tenement houses in the down town district. Dwellings frequented by Japanese and Koreans seemed to fall under the ban of the marauders.

Deputy Kellett, began work on the case with the first of the week. He paid a visit to the Maagoon block in Kakaako and in the quarters occupied by the two Filipinos, the officer recovered a large amount of booty including wearing apparel, the entire collection resembling the results of a successful raid on a bargain counter.

In placing Abrica and Espinosa under arrest, these Filipinos finally admitted that they had engaged in running lodging houses and dwellings, they further agreed to take the officers to a place where additional loot was stored.

In making their statement to the officers, the Filipinos also implicated several other countrymen. These are to be arrested within a few days. The men were arraigned upon four counts each. In passing sentence Judge Monsarrat, gave the defendants one year imprisonment on three counts.

Prosecuting Attorney Cathcart, advised that the fourth charge in the case of both Abrica and Espinosa be stricken from the calendar, which was done.

Yesterday was a bad day on the New York stock exchange, with a general tumble of prices at the opening. Railroad stocks showed better resistance to pressure than industrial and the favorite issues were not much affected by the severe break in some of the specialties.

It is reported by the Herald of that town that a scheme is on foot to start a new paper in Hilo, and that the editorship has been offered to John M. Giles, who temporarily edited the Herald in the absence of Mr. Connors and later ran the Citizen with shares at \$10 is the plan mentioned for the business end, and Frank Scares is named as the printer.

The Hilo branch of the Honolulu Iron Works will be ready for operation in February. The steam hammer was the biggest piece of machinery to be installed and the most important pieces yet to come are two electrical traveling cranes.

Twenty-seven building permits were issued in Hilo in December, of which twenty-four were for new construction, and the cost of the work under all permits is \$110,282, which the Herald says is far above any previous record.

Theo. H. Davies & Co. have presented a bill to the county of Hawaii for \$24,392.44 for cane destroyed by fire on Halawa plantation owing to the carelessness of servants of the county.

Hilo is agitated over news from Washington that there is danger that the government will complete only so much of the breakwater as can be finished with the original authorization of \$1,700,000, which would leave the structure about 4000 feet short of the point which it was planned to reach.

The most important part of this would come in the fact that the shortened breakwater would not protect the present anchorage, which would, especially in case of heavy winds and seas, be as bad, if not worse than under the conditions of years past," says the Hawaii Herald.

In addition to this it would mean that wharves could only be built in Kuluha bay, if they were to receive protection from the structure, and that there would be little or no opportunity of using the long stretch of waterfront lying between that section and the town of Hilo. It is proposed to take steps at once to bring these matters to the attention of the board of engineers, through resolutions from the Board of Trade and otherwise, as after a decision upon such a matter

The cars were sent down a grade with power shut off, gravity supplying the energy. Besides prodigious and considerable excitement, the contest had its value from the standpoint of motor car demonstration and comparison because, all other things being equal, lack of friction is the factor that enables a car to win such a contest, or, in other words, to "roll" the farthest. The victorious Cadillac captured two prizes, winning the Grand Prize, or A. N. Sweet cup, for coasting the greatest distance, irrespective of class, and also the "Bull Moose" cup, or first prize in its class. Thus it was victorious over all cars regardless of weight, some cars being heavier and some lighter, the weights ranging from 1700 to 4400 pounds.
