Ritchie And Kilbane, Two New Kings In Fistic Realm



IN SPITE of the cracks who persist in the theory that the boxing game is going down hill, the year 1912, just finished, has witnessed a number of important changes.

Naturally, he isn't going to put the title in jeopardy for a few weeks, while he is sure of a big salary on the vaudeville stage.

The new year certainly promises some good matches in the lightweight division, which has been the busy class for several years perhaps.

Jack Johnson, regarded as the peer of all the heavy-weights, had a battle with the courts, and is practically in oblivion. There isn't a promoter in the country over that would risk his prestige by signing Johnson, and the Chicago negro is more effectively dead than had he been knocked out.

So far it can't be said that a white heavy-weight has been produced who stands head and shoulders over his fellows. Just at the time being Luther McCarty looks the most promising of the lot.

He will hardly be hailed for a while as the heavy-weight champion of the world, but he would stand so far above his fellows that Luther would be the finest kind of a drawing card. It would unquestionably rehabilitate the sport to a large extent for a white champion to be truly established on the throne, and let us hope that the year 1913 will settle the vexed question beyond all dispute.

Ritchie on Trial. Willie Ritchie doesn't seem to have been accepted the country over as the rightful king, but there is nothing strange in that situation.

Also, it isn't customary for a new champion to be "thoroughly accepted on one night." Stanley Ketchel was several fights demonstrating his full worth. When Nelson beat Gans every-one said it was because the "old man" was through. Later, when Wolgast wrestled the title away from the "Battler," there was still the same shaking of heads on the part of the Doubting Thomases.

And so, taking past history into consideration, there isn't any reason why Ritchie shouldn't hold the title, at least as long on the average as other champions have done so. He should and doubtless will improve and the confidence that comes with the title is going to mean something.

MILLS TAKES AN ATHLETIC SPORT

Soccer Team, Which Plays Its First Game Today Is Strong, and Cross Country Running Team May Also Be Developed

Mills Institute, now that it is in the interscholastic Soccer League, intends to make good and has started out in the right way. The boys have taken up soccer and have gone into it, heart and soul, and they intend to fight hard for every game.

For a school situated as Mills is, without a field upon which to practice, and with only a limited amount of material from which to choose, the soccer men, have done wonders and deserve great commendation for their work.

With such a team as Mills has this year the school should certainly have a good showing and end up the season with a record that will be envied by the boys, coached by Mr. Duncan, who have having strenuous practice every afternoon, and have organized a good team work.

After the soccer season, the interscholastic cross country race is in the air. This year is expected to be a good one. It is possible that the cross country team will be able to start practice immediately.

The course for the run this year is to be from Waikiki to the Mokapu point, which is nearly the same as last year. The schools that are expected to compete should be able to enter some very interesting as the game is just the thing to improve wind, and learn a lesson or two.

Why the Decline? Jim Jeffries, if he has done nothing more, is his criticism of the boxing game, has started quite a life-sized movement. The former champion says he is disgusted with the fight game, and bases this on the loss of clean hitting and the preeminence in the ring of clinches and tough work artists.

The boxing game has certainly gone down hill, he said, "from a standpoint of producing good champions. You can't begin to compare the champions of today with those of ten years ago. Try and compare the fellow Eddie McGoorty with Bob Fitzsimmons; Ad Wolgast with Joe Gans; Jim Flynn with Jim Corbett and you have an idea. The men I mentioned from the past were all brainy fighters who knew how to think. The present day fighter simply uses his muscle."

It is hard to explain the reason. The financial incentive is greater than ever for the fellow at the top. The old-time fighters couldn't get \$15,000 at a clip or draw down \$1000 a week for theatrical engagements. I have it figured out that boxers are losing class; that there is a stigma attached today that keeps away from hat sport men of the brainy men. You don't find boxing as strong in the clubs as was formerly the case and, as a result, the fighters are not as bright. That is the main difference between the fighter of today and yesterday."

LADY MAGNATE NOT DESIRED IN BASEBALL

Women and baseball don't mix, according to a New York newspaper. Likewise, it is alleged, none of the gentle sex will be allowed to own and operate ball clubs in the American League.

This language was printed in the New York Globe: "No women managers will be allowed in the American League. That league is of the opinion that woman has no place in baseball. Club owners met in Chicago recently and took up the 'eternal question.' A decision was reached that no woman can own a club or even attend American League meetings. According to the owners it was a good decision, as they did not want to get into the same mess of trouble which the National League has encountered."

"I think it will benefit our league to keep women out of baseball," said a magnate today. "It is almost impossible to do so, but we must keep them out of baseball. A woman owning a ball club is about the limit, and the American League made a great move when they decided to bar female magnates."
