President Joseph F. Smith of the Mormon church took occasion to congratulate Walter G. Smith at the close of the latter's illustrated lecture on Hawaii at Salt Lake City several days ago, according to a Salt Lake City Newspaper. The story states that Assembly hall, where the free entertainment by Hawaii's promotionist was given was filled with spectators, who were deeply impressed by his vivid oral descriptions and especially by the motion pictures of the volcano.

The body of the late Mrs. D. McLain of Maaokaa avenue was interred yesterday afternoon at the funeral services being conducted by Father Stephen. The funeral was an unostentatious as had been the life of this well-known Kamaoia, although the number of floral tributes heaped upon the coffin and, later, upon the grave, testified to the wide circle of those who mourned. Only relatives and close friends were present and the pallbearers were all old friends of the family, being C. V. McCarthy, John Lucas, John Bowler, Stephen Smith, John Hughes and R. O. Matheson.

The engagement of Miss Gladys Cronan and Lieut. Jos. O'Hara, Tenth Co. Coast Artillery at Fort De Russy, was announced last week in San Francisco. Lieut. O'Hara was stationed at Fort Winfield Scott for a short time, and his sudden transfer to Honolulu precipitated the announcement of the engagement. Miss Cronan is the daughter of J. B. Cronan of San Francisco and her fiance is the son of Col. O'Hara (retired), and a brother of Lieut. James O'Hara, an instructor at West Point. The wedding will take place as soon as Lieut. O'Hara can arrange to leave of absence.

The report of L. Winternitz, a representative of the Fleischman Company of Chicago, is satisfactory. It is likely that a branch of that company will be located in the Hawaiian Islands. Mr. Winternitz arrived in Honolulu on the Cleveland, and has decided to remain here until the vessel again touches this port on February 13, and since his arrival has been making an investigation of the productions of the islands. The company which he represents manufactures yeast, vinegar, alcohol and household necessities, and as the Hawaiian Islands have a large output of pineapple juice and molasses, Mr. Winternitz believes that his company might do well to get interested in these products.

MAUI JAPANESE TO WELCOME THEIR CONSUL
H. Etaki, Japanese consul-general, here, is planning to make an inspection tour of Maui for the purpose to make himself familiar with the Japanese conditions there. It was his intention to leave for the Valley Island tomorrow on the steamer Claudine. However, for fear of a threatened tie-up of the Inter-Island traffic, he is as yet undecided as to his departure tomorrow.
Consul-General Etaki has already made a trip to Hawaii. Everywhere he visited he was cordially welcomed by his fellow countrymen and his tour proved to be so successful that after his return from Hawaii, he made an announcement to the effect that a similar trip to Maui would be made in the near future.

According to the word received from Wainuku, today by the Nippu Mail, the Japanese residents of Maui are preparing a monster welcome for the consul.
PINEAPPLE CANNERY BORING FOR WATER
The big cannery of the Hawaiian Pineapple Company at Iwilei is going

PINEAPPLE CO. IS PROSPEROUS

Hawaiian Pineapple Company, Ltd. was shown to be in a prosperous condition at the annual meeting of stockholders on Monday afternoon. Its pack for the past year was nearly eleven million cans, and it has in the treasury undivided profits to the amount of \$348,632.
In his report to the directors, James D. Dole, president and manager, said in part:
"Our pack for the year amounted to 458,869 cases, figuring gallon cans, twelve per case, as in the past. Inasmuch as we have now adopted the plan of shipping six gallon cans per case, we shall probably compute our pack in future on this basis, as is now done by most of the packers. As showing the effect upon our apparent volume of business, it is to be noted that if we had used this basis during the past year, our pack would have totaled 536,961 cases. This was a total of 10,737,144 cans.
"While it is still too early to make an intelligent estimate of the 1913 pack, we anticipate a slight increase over the past year.
"Market conditions have been excellent throughout the year.
"Our old cannery buildings are now being replaced by new structures with concrete floors, steel frame and asbestos-iron roofing.
"After paying our dividend and writing off liberally for regular depreciation on the old buildings and various losses, we carry a net profit for the year to undivided profits of \$55,960.54, which leaves our undivided profits account at \$348,632.07.
The officers of the company were re-elected as follows: J. D. Dole, president; H. M. von Holt, vice-president; E. B. Barnes, secretary and treasurer; L. E. Arnold and John L. Whitmore, additional directors.
The company pays a monthly dividend of 25 cents a share, or 15 per cent per annum on the par value of its capital stock. At \$20 par value the stock sold yesterday at \$44.50.

COAST MAGAZINE SEEKS MATERIAL
To represent a travelogue bureau as well as Sunset, a coast illustrated magazine, Mr. and Mrs. Edward H. Kemp, are passengers in the Oceanic liner Sierra, to arrive here on Monday morning.
Mr. and Mrs. Kemp are to make an extended stay in the islands. They are prepared to take a series of pictures of outdoor life in Hawaii. The local promotion committee has arranged that the lecturer and writer be given an opportunity of visiting the volcano, as well as a chance to spend some time in touring the several islands in the group.
Mr. Kemp writes that he proposes to make an extended tour with a view of gathering material for a series of illustrated lectures, and also features for Sunset.

NEEDS MORE MONEY FOR WHARF REPAIRS
The coming legislature may be asked to provide additional funds for the repair and maintenance of wharves in the territory. After authorizing the payment of a number of bills yesterday the board of harbor commissioners discovered that only about \$400 remains in the repair and maintenance fund, which was originally intended to cover all such expenditures until June 30, 1913. Bills for improvements amounting to \$10,453.83 were approved and ordered paid yesterday. Because two members were absent the proposed new rules for Honolulu harbor were again held up and action cannot be taken on them until the next meeting. They were discussed in some detail. James Wakefield and Col. C. J. McCarthy were unable to attend yesterday's session, the former at present being on the Big Island. The publication of all rules and regulations governing wharves and harbors in the territory was authorized. The Philadelphia Breakwater Company was given permission to make alterations in the specifications for the new Hilo wharf allowing the free passage of the dredging scow and other craft at that point.

PRIZES WIRELESS WELCOME AT SEA
"On board the steamer I received a wireless welcome to Honolulu, and I think a great deal of it."
This testimony to the value of the wireless in maintaining Honolulu's traditional hospitality was given to a Star-Bulletin man this morning by E. O'Sullivan, one of the oldest contractors and builders of San Francisco, who, having retired from business, comes to Honolulu to spend two months. He is the guest of Mr. and Mrs. John F. Bowler, Mr. Bowler having been associated with him in some big work on the coast. Mr. O'Sullivan was the builder of the fine church at Stanford University, and had contracts on the Palace hotel and other large edifices in San Francisco. He arrived in the Honolulu on Wednesday.
