Ten persons were fatally, and forty seriously injured in a panic at Verins, France, caused by the explosion of a moving-picture apparatus in a small upstairs theater, late last night. The audience numbered 120.

OVER-NIGHT FEDERAL WIRELESS To the Advertiser

Secretary Bryan, by appointment today, formally received most of the diplomatic corps in Washington. The secretary made a felicitous speech, telling the corps, in the name of President Wilson, of the earnest desire of the administration to strengthen the relations between the United States and other members of the great family of nations. Ambassador Jusserand, the dean of the corps, replied and then personally presented the members of the diplomatic body to the new secretary of state.

The Wilson family party at the White House is beginning to break up. Mr. and Mrs. John A. Wilson, the seniors of the family, Mr. Wilson being the first cousin of the president and the oldest member of the clan, leave today for their home in Franklin, Pennsylvania. The White House, since the morning of March 4, has been filled with Wilsons. The only children now that remain are two grand-nieces of the president whose parents reside here and who will be in evidence to give the juvenile touch to the executive mansion.

Mrs. Pascual Orozco is happy today for the first time in months, following the receipt of a letter from her husband, saying that he is safe in the interior of Chihuahua and will support the Huerta government.

Hope was held out to thousands of tuberculosis sufferers throughout the world today, by the announcement that three consumptive patients treated at the Peoples' Hospital in New York by Dr. Frederick F. Friedmann are doing splendidly. Declaration to this effect was made by Doctor Landermann, head of the institution. "All night sweats and pains in the chest," Doctor Landermann told Doctor Friedmann, "already have disappeared and the patients show marked improvement."

In a prize fight between Cross and Mandot at New Orleans last evening, Cross knocked out his opponent in the tenth round.

J. Pierpont Morgan, the American banker, and Porfirio Diaz, former president of Mexico, were fellow-passengers on the liner Atlantic, which left Alexandria, Egypt, today for New York, via Naples. Diaz will go to France, where he will meet the officer sent from Mexico City to escort him back to his native land.

Following a twelve-hour battle, in which there is reported to have been many killed and wounded, the Nationalist rebels occupy the town of Nacozari today. The federal garrison evacuated the town last evening under a flag of truce and 121 of its original 171 members marched weary and bedragged into Agua Prieta, opposite Douglas today. How many of the fifty were killed and wounded is not known.

General Ojeda, in command of the federals at Agua Prieta, withheld all possible information of the defeat of the government forces at Nacozari. Various accounts of the battle, however, were furnished by stragglers from the town, who followed the federals in their flight.

Nogales was thrown into a panic of fear today, when a report was circulated that several hundred rebels, equipped fifteen miles south of the town, were marching toward the border. Scores of refugees carrying their valuables fled to the American side.

The passenger station of the Great Western and Central Railway, at Saunderton, Buckinghamshire, was destroyed by the suffragettes today. "Votes for Women" placards were found in the ruins. Simultaneously the Croxley Green station in London, and the Northwestern railway station at Waterford, were fired and partially destroyed.

Cards found at the several stations showed suffragettes are responsible, and it was added that there "would be no peace until women were given the ballot."

According to Vatican reports, the Pope's condition is much improved today. His fever is three degrees lower and it is believed influenza is his only present ailment. His speedy recovery is predicted.

President Wilson has not completed his roll of diplomatic appointments, but announcements are expected within a few days. The president has been considering prospective candidates through his friends. The situation tonight is about like this: Richard Olney, of Massachusetts, can be ambassador to Great Britain if he wishes. Democratic Chairman William F. McCombs, can be ambassador to France, if he wishes. T. W. Gregory, a lawyer of Austin, Texas, may be ambassador to Mexico. There is some doubt whether he would accept if he were offered the position. Charles R. Crane, of Chicago, can go to St. Petersburg, or Pekin, if he desires.

Augustus Thomas, the playwright, probably will be ambassador to France if Mr. McCombs does not accept. Otherwise he may be offered the ambassadorship to Germany. Frederick C. Penfield, of Germantown, Pennsylvania, will be ambassador to one of the European courts, probably Russia, Austria or Turkey. President Wilson today sent the following nominations to the senate:
