SHAFTER TROOPS TAKE TO HILLS

Following the general plan of the former and also of the present department commander, that the troops of Oahu become thoroughly familiar with the terrain that they might be called on to operate over, the second battalion of the second infantry will take to the mountains Monday. MILLER SUES ISLAND 'KING'

Disclosing the fact that Father Rougier, at the time he was negotiating for the sale of Fanning Island, made an effort to sell or lease the land to Japan, a letter to Miki Saito, at one time Japanese consul to Honolulu, has come to light in a suit filed by Capt. Frederick Miller in the circuit court. In the papers filed, Miller states that he seeks to recover \$53,531.50, which sum he alleges is due to him as commission for his aid in the sale of Waanington and Fanning Islands. To prove himself Rougier's accredited agent, Miller includes in the papers the letter addressed to the Japanese consul, Honolulu.

"Fanning Island has a good safe harbor where coal and water may be obtained," Father Rougier sets forth in the letter, "and it would prove an invaluable spot for a rendezvous. The object of this communication is to have you bring this to the attention of the proper authorities in Japan."

Further evidence that Father Rougier tried to sell the island to Japan is found in several expense items. One item makes mention of \$200 paid to "special agent, Japan." A second item refers to money paid Max Schlemmer for services in trying to sell the island to Japan.

Captain Miller, in his suit against Father Rougier, states that he was, during the time of these negotiations, Rougier's accredited agent. He says that on May 19, 1908, he contracted to sell Washington and Fanning Islands for Father Rougier. He was to receive \$5000 in case the selling price did not exceed \$250,000. He was to receive, so he alleges, one half of any sum above this amount. Inasmuch as the islands sold for \$350,000, Miller claims that he has got coming to him over \$50,000.
