## SENATE PROCEEDS LEISURELY ON NOMINEES

### Thayer, Henry and Carlsmith Confirmed Without Any Serious Opposition

Working again in executive session, the senate confirmed three more of the governor's recess appointments late yesterday afternoon, assigned to district committees the names of a number of commissioners, and deferred the remaining portion of the list until April 22.

Attorney General Wade Warren Thayer, High Sheriff William Henry and Carl S. Carlsmith, commissioner to promote uniform legislation, were the three names confirmed by the senate.

The Honolulu park commissioners were assigned to a special committee, and to the same committee was also sent the local loan fund commission. The same rule as to the latter commission was followed in the case of Hawaii. The other appointments were deferred.

An examination of the list confirmed Monday and yesterday shows that there are still a number of important posts not decided upon. The superintendent of public works, Hubert K. Bishop and A. C. Wheeler, as grade commissioner, Francis M. McStocker, harbor commissioner, and Fred L. Waldron, commissioner of immigration, are shown to be still unconfirmed.

What action the special committee will take on the names of the commissioners before them could not be learned this morning as strict secrecy is being maintained by the senators in the proceedings.

One of the leading senators stated, however, that as to the appointments still before the senate as a whole, he believed they will all be confirmed, with the possible exception of Mr. Bishop, who says he is anxious to be relieved of the responsibility of his territorial position.

Governor Frear, who was present during the consideration of the name of Mr. Bishop, may submit a number of names of possible successors to the superintendent of public works before April 22, it was rumored last night, and the senate may then be asked to select the one it deems best fitted for the position.

The report that the Democrats and Republicans would take sides on the appointments seems not to be sound, for it was said in legislative circles last night, and was openly admitted this morning, that the appointments so far made have been almost unanimous, with only an occasional dissenting vote, and this not strictly a party vote.

### QUESTION OF NUUANU CONTRACT BOBS UP AGAIN

The sentiment of the Oahu senators on the contract allowing the Hawaiian Electric Company to tap the water main on Nuuanu Valley was shown yesterday, when it handed down a report recommending the passage of S. B. 132, one to authorize the superintendent of public works to enter in a contract with the Lord, Young Engineering Company for the filling in of low land in Honolulu.

Near the end of the report, written by Senator Cecil Brown, it changes the subject long enough to hit the board of public works over the knuckles. It says:

"In this connection, the committee would call the attention of the senate to the fact, that the public works department seeks by this bill to have the legislature of the territory authorize and empower it to make a contract, when in other cases, where the power and authority of the department to enter into a contract has a serious question of being legally able to do so raised (notably the contract and grant to the Electric Light Company to lay pipes on the streets of Honolulu and take water from the public mains for other than domestic purposes and endangering thereby the supply to domestic users of water under pre-existing contracts).  
"In these cases last mentioned, no such authority was sought, and as that matter is now a matter of investigation before this committee, it will, at this time, make no other or further comments."

### LOCAL SOUTHERNERS WILL HOLD BANQUET

All the men of Honolulu who were born south of the Mason and Dixon line will meet for dinner in the banquet room of the Palm Cafe tomorrow evening at 6 o'clock, at which time the Honolulu Southern Society will complete its organization. There are probably more than 100 men of Southern birth in Honolulu today and at present the society has a membership roll of 75, while new members are continually being added. Every man who is a native of a Southern state will be welcomed at the banquet tomorrow evening.

There has been an elaborate program prepared for the evening's entertainment in the way of music and speeches. Ernest Kaai and a number of his musicians will attend and render every song of the Sunny South procurable in Honolulu. The Southerners are requested to gather immediately after business hours, the affair proper to begin at 6 o'clock. Business dress will be the fashion of the evening, and prior to the banquet the guests will have ample opportunity to become acquainted with their fellow Southerners. Several of the prominent Southerners of the city are expected to be present and a number of oratorical efforts are assured.




