BY AUTHORITY BILL No. 55

AN ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO THE ESTABLISHING OF GRADES AND SIDEWALK LINES IN THE DISTRICT OF HONOLULU, CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU, TERRITORY OF HAWAII.

Be it Ordained by the People of the City and County of Honolulu: Section 1. Grades, Datum Plane. That the grades of that portion of Territory of Hawaii, lying between Fort Street and River Street, as set out in Section 2, hereof, are hereby established in reference to a datum plane, being mean tide at the said district of Honolulu, and being located as follows: To wit: A bench mark on top of a copper bolt in concrete foundation of old flag pole on the west corner of Pauahi and Maunakea streets, in said District of Honolulu, is 20.21 feet, and a bench mark on coping at foot of pillar at the left entrance of the Judiciary Building in said District of Honolulu, is 16.50 feet above said datum plane. Said grades are on a uniform straight line between the adjacent points specified in Section 2 hereof, and are all above said datum plane the distance set out in said Section 2.

Section 3. Sidewalk Line. That the sidewalk line on the North side of Pauahi Street, between Fort Street and River Street, in the said District of Honolulu, the same being the North curb line, is hereby established as follows: Commencing at a point on the North curb line on said Pauahi Street, on a line with the West line of Fort Street, which point, referred to as Punch-bowl Triangulation Station, is South 64.0 feet and West 3,875.2 feet, and running thence by true azimuths as follows: 1. 147° 38', 1407.9 feet along the North curb line of Pauahi Street to the East line of River Street.

Section 4. Sidewalk Line. That the sidewalk line on the South side of Pauahi Street, between Fort Street and River Street, in the said District of Honolulu, the same being the South curb line, is hereby established as follows: Commencing at a point on the South curb line on said Pauahi Street, on a line with the West line of Fort Street, which point, referred to as Punch-bowl Triangulation Station, is South 664.3 feet and West 3,902.4 feet, and running thence by true azimuths as follows: 1. 147° 38', 1424.1 feet along the South curb line of Pauahi Street to the East line of River Street.

Section 5. Profile and Plan. That Grade Map No. 2 on file in the office of the Engineer of the City and County of Honolulu is hereby approved and adopted as the profile and plan of said grade and sidewalk lines.

SECTION 6. This Ordinance shall take effect fifteen days from and after the date of its approval.

Competition vs. Public Regulative

OVER-NIGHT FEDERAL WIRELESS To the Advertiser

President Wilson's final word concerning the anti-alien land laws, now pending in the California legislature, was sent to Governor Johnson and the presiding officers in both houses of the state legislature today in the following telegram: "Direct and Pointed"

"I speak on the assumption, which I am sure is well founded, that the people of California do not desire their representatives to and that the representatives neither wish nor intend in any circumstances to embarrass the government of the United States in its dealings with a nation with whom it has most earnestly and cordially sought to maintain relations of genuine friendship and good-will, and that least of all do they desire to do anything which might impair treaty obligations or cast doubt on the honor and good faith of the nation and government.

"Therefore, I appeal in the utmost confidence to the people, to the governor and to the legislature of California to act in the matter now under consideration in a manner that cannot, from any point of view, be fairly challenged or called in question. Precedents to Follow

"If they deem it necessary to exclude all aliens, who have not declared their intention to become citizens, from the privileges of land ownership, they can do so along lines already followed in the laws of many other states and foreign countries, including Japan herself. Invidious discrimination will in evitably draw into the question the treaty obligations of the government of the United States.

"I register my very earnest and respectful protest against any discrimination in this case, not only because I deem it my duty as chief executive of the nation, but also, and more readily, because I believe the people and the legislative authorities of California will generously respond in a moment to a matter frankly presented to them as a question of national policy and a question of national honor. If they have ignored this point of view, it is, I am sure, because they did not realize what and how much was involved."

The government, it is learned, is determined to defend the rights of Orientals before the United States supreme court if California passes the law carrying an "ineligible citizenship" clause.

President Wilson still is hopeful that California will follow the government's advice, but if the land bill aimed only at Chinese and Japanese passes, the department of justice will intervene as a friend of the court.

Representative Raker declared the present situation in his state eclipses the Chinese exclusion.

Fourteen Democratic members of the ways and means committee, which is framing the Underwood tariff bill, today submitted their report to the house. The report denounces the Payne law, alleging that trusts thrive under Republican government.

The Democrats estimate the receipts under the Underwood tariff bill will aggregate \$926,000,000 and the government's expenses will be \$994,000,000. They estimate that the income tax will bring in revenues to the amount of \$700,000,000, which will more than overcome the deficit caused by reduction of the tariff duties.

It defends free listing of sugar and raw wool and urges the passage of the income tax, saying: "The poorer classes bear the chief burden of taxation, the income tax is levied on the ability to pay."

The condition of Pope Plus was most satisfactory today. The pontiff's chaplain said his holiness slept uninterruptedly through the latter part of the night. Stimulants, however, are administered hourly.

Declaring that the big baseball leagues enslave and coerce their players, prevent competition and make up the most autocratic trust in the world, a resolution asking for a thorough investigation of these leagues was introduced in the lower house of congress today by Representative Gallagher of Illinois.

Honoree Fogel, once president of the Philadelphia club, in the National League, has promised to submit evidence to congress sustaining the resolution.

At the municipal election in San Francisco today the people voted to recall Police Judge Weller, brother-in-law of Francis J. Henney. Wiley Crist, a young attorney, was elected. The vote stood: Crist, 30,784; Weller, 29,934.

Becoming unmanageable while being towed off at Hamburg for the trial trip, the Hamburg-American liner Imperator, said to be the largest vessel in the world, broke away from the tugs and swinging crosswise into the river, became stuck in the mud today. The efforts of six tugs failed to dislodge her.

Carrying an appropriation of five hundred thousand dollars for a government exhibit at the Panama-Pacific Exposition in San Francisco in 1915, the civil sundry bill, providing expenditures aggregating one hundred sixteen million dollars, was passed in the house today by a viva voce vote.

After landing at Arracourt, France, in a military biplane, two German officers nearly caused an international mixup today until they explained they did not know they were on French territory and were forced to land because they had exhausted their petrol.

Minister of War Etienne ordered the men released.
