Those present were Hon. S. B. Dole, W. D. Westervelt, Mrs. J. M. Whitney, P. H. Deverill, Mrs. S. B. Dole, Mrs. W. O. Smith, Mrs. F. W. Macfarlane, Spencer Bowen and Mrs. Alice C. Jordan.

The report of the treasurer, which was presented by P. H. Deverill, showed the finances of the association to be in good condition, with a fair amount of money on hand. The work of the association covering the month of March was presented by Mrs. Alice Jordan, manager of the organization. This report went into detail concerning the number of cases handled during the past month, as follows: New applications 12, number of old cases 56, number of calls at the office 133, and visits made 14. The report also contained a detailed list of each important case handled.

While Mrs. Jordan's report contained a number of really pathetic, still the usual number of "hard luck" stories, budding with humor, were in

evidence. For instance, an elderly resident of Honolulu walked into the office of the association a short time ago and calmly demanded that the organization send him on a several months' trip to the mainland, and pay his expenses while he was there. His health, he said, demanded it. The manager got in touch with the man's doctor and was informed that the party in question was in no need of such a trip. The would-be traveler's request, therefore, was denied. Two able-bodied sons of Holland, also stricken with either the wanderlust or that homesick feeling, asked for a trip back to the old country in one of the palatial steamers plying between here and the coast. One had a wife in Holland, it seems, and that was his only reason for wanting to get back home. They were informed that the easiest way to get back to their native land would be to work their passage.
