SAM HOP BOOSTS GRAND JURY TO ISLANDS ON MAINLAND PROBE, GRAFT IN HAWAII

Genial Sam Hop, manager of the All-Chinese baseball team which is now making its second mainland tour, was quoted by mainland papers as being an authority on the managing and training of Oriental baseball teams. Hop has announced himself as being the promoter of an advertising proposition for the Hawaiian islands which will penetrate every city of importance in the east.

Before leaving Honolulu with the team this last time, Sam received from the Promotion Committee a trunk load of folders and postal cards descriptive of Hawaii, and it is with these and the musical ability of the members of the team that he is doing the advertising. Writing from Oberlin, Ohio, under date of May 15, to Secretary Wood of the Promotion Committee, Sam says:

"Our plan this year is to carry back the honor to Hawaii, and to leave in the States the name of the Hawaiian Islands. Our Hawaiian postal cards and booklets which we brought with us have proved to be a big boost for the islands. The people simply go crazy when reading about Hawaii and the greater number of them say that the first opportunity they have they will take a trip to the Paradise of the Pacific. Our Hawaiian music and singing has also made a great hit, and it is assisting us greatly in advertising the islands. The people are also greatly surprised to hear us speak the English language so well.

"I would like to say a word about the trip and the games. Our trip so far has been very successful both in business and financial affairs. We have played 42 games and won 23, losing nine. After holding a clean record of 25 college games, we met our first college defeat by the Notre Dame College in Indiana last Tuesday. This college certainly has a fast and strong nine."

Secretary Wood stated this morning that another supply of folders and cards, as well as a number of photographs, would be forwarded to Sam at the team's headquarters in New York City.

[Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence] HILLO, Hawaii, May 26.—When the grand jury convened this morning to hear the instructions from Judge Parsons before beginning their investigations, the fourth circuit rooms were filled with witnesses, and the curious, there evidently being a feeling that the charges to the jury were to contain much of interest, on account of the graft cases which it is expected are to be probed by the jurors.

After an examination of the jurors as to their qualifications to serve, by County Attorney Beers, and following the administration of the oath by Clerk Le Baron Curney, Judge Parsons read his instructions to the jury stating that there were seven commitments for their examination. He then called their attention to the territorial statutes on embezzlement, which he read to them and particularly to that portion having reference to officials. He warned them that any man, however high his standing should not be exempt from being indicted, if found guilty, and said they should diligently follow wherever their findings lead.

"If guilty," seemed to be the keynote of the judges' charges. He emphasized that no report should be made filled with generalities or the least bit of intendo; that they were empowered to return true bills, but not to leave reflections on any man's character.

Authorities, stating that to return indictments was really the only office of grand jurors were read by him, at some length, he in the end citing that the federal grand jury in Honolulu had called to the attention of the jurors there, similar findings. Attorneys, after the charges were read, declared they were as able as any they had ever heard. It has been several years since Judge Parsons presented written ones of any length to grand jurors.

That the graft cases are the ones first to be examined was indicated by the calling of two witnesses this morning, W. J. Rickard, deputy sheriff of Honolulu, and J. K. Kehaula, deputy sheriff of Kalihi. Another case of some territorial interest is one involving charges against Marcelo Quiros, a Filipino, formerly a special police officer, who will have to face charges of assault upon a girl under twelve years of age. This is the case where the Spanish mother, after failing to secure the commitment of the man in the district court, made a trip to Honolulu and laid her grievances before Sheriff Jarrett. He then took her to the attorney general and explained the case to him. The territorial official wrote Judge Parsons advising that the case be examined by the grand jury.

In the seven commitments the grand jurors are ordered to investigate are charges of murder, rape and larceny. On account of the number of witnesses to be examined it is believed their work will take most of this week.

James Webster, manager of the Pepeekeo plantation, was appointed foreman of the grand jury.

ENTERTAINMENT AT KALIHIA SUCCESS

With a view to raising sufficient funds with which to purchase a graphophone, some records, and several other necessities for their school, a delightful entertainment was given at the Kalihia Settlement Saturday evening by the pupils of the Kalihia school. The large hall was crowded with parents and friends of the pupils, and the tasteful decorations which prevailed gave evidence that the children had worked in more than one way in order to make their entertainment a success.

Following a song, the school chorus, the folk dances of the different nations were given, which proved very effective. Each tot was dressed in native costume, and the spirit which they took in the occasion caused not the slightest flaw in the course of the dances.

WOULD APPLY STATUTE

The question of whether the statute of limitations applies against the territory, particularly in the matter of delinquent taxes, was discussed before the supreme court yesterday in the resumption of an old tax suit against Samuel Parker, Sr., brought by James N. K. Keola, deputy tax assessor at Walluku. The amount claimed by the territory is \$121.20, and judgment for the territory was awarded by the district magistrate at Walluku last March. Asserting that the tax fell due and became delinquent more than six years ago, and that no action against him was begun on the matter during that time, the defendant seeks protection under the statute of limitations, asserts the claim is outlawed, and has appealed to the supreme court on a writ of error.

GRAFT PROBERS MAY ADJOURN THIS WEEK

[Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence] HILLO, May 26.—Unless some of the evidence before the grand jury this week shows the necessity of immediate action on the part of the Hawaii investigation commissioners, it is likely that they will adjourn for a month or two. This is to be done to give Civic Expert H. Gooding Field an opportunity to carry his audit along to such an extent that when the jury convenes again it can keep right on hearing evidence until the financial investigation is completed or the transcripts become too bulky for the stenographer to keep up with the work of the investigators.

That this adjournment is contemplated was affirmed by Dr. Elliott, chairman of the commission, this morning, when he said: "It is not improbable that we will take a recess for a month or so. The auditing of the accounts by Mr. Field is a huge task and it is physically impossible for him to get through his work for some time. It will be more economical for us to adjourn until he has completed an audit of the road funds and then we can begin taking and hearing evidence every day, but this is dependent on the findings of the grand jury this week. There may be developments that will require us to begin action at once, on some other phase of the work."
