**ONLY FOUR MEN KNOW COMBINATION**

**FINE CONCERT NOW PROMISED**

A musical event of greatest interest is the presentation by the management of the Bijou theatre on Friday, June 20, of two artists of international fame: Anthony Carlson, celebrated as one of America's greatest basses, and the distinguished English pianist, Vernon Spencer.

These two artists are booked for a tour around the world, the next concert taking place in Batavia and the principal cities of the Dutch East Indies, followed by a tour of Australia. At one moment a low "C" reverberates through the hall and at the next, one is astonished to hear a voice almost baritone in character and timbre. In defense of his conviction that the lied, or song, represents a higher standard of music than opera, Mr. Carlson has consistently refused to appear in opera, declining even to sing at the great "Festspiele" at Bayreuth when personally requested by Siegfried Wagner.

Mr. Spencer's first visit to America was in 1903, on which occasion his recitals were all east of the Rocky Mountains. For more than twelve years he has been a prominent factor in the German musical world, and has achieved an international fame as pianist, composer and teacher. During his residence in Berlin he attracts students to his class from all parts of the globe, while as a concert artist he is in constant demand. One interesting feature of his playing is the introduction into every program of a group of miniatures as he terms them—compositions which every lover of music can appreciate, but which most artists neglect. In the playing of these Mr. Spencer discloses an art that is unique and absolutely individual.
