## CHILDREN ARE FETED IN HILO

[Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence] HILO, Hawaii, June 23.—If getting so tired they can't play any more is the acme of childish fun, as many people think, then the 1800 public school children who came to Hilo last Friday on a special excursion-picnic were about as delighted a bunch of youngsters as ever spent a day away from their parents.

Arriving here early in the morning on two special trains of thirteen cars, the school children under the supervision of their teachers were divided into several sections and taken to see the Hilo sights—afloat. The walk from Mookhean Park, where they disembarked from the train, to the iron works and back to the ice works, a distance of almost three miles, did not seem to particularly weary the children, most of whom walk long distances daily to school, but it did tire the physical strength of the teachers.

En route to the iron works the children were taken to the factories where macaroni and soda biscuits are made, the Japanese proprietors passing out samples of the eatable food for all. At the ice works after the warm walk, the children ate the cracked pieces of ice with as much pleasure as they later took in their lunches, which all were carrying.
