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PENDING TARIFF HURTS COUNTRY, SAYS BISHOP

"There is no part of the United States not being hurt by the pending tariff measure," declares E. Faxon Bishop, president of C. Brewer & Company this morning, who has recently returned from a hurried trip to California.

That the depression in California is even greater here, and that business in New York is the duldest in years, are other statements made by Mr. Bishop this morning in discussing the present financial condition of the country and the territory in particular.

While in San Francisco he says he was surprised to find the people so depressed, but he believes with the passage of the tariff bill, business will regain confidence to a great extent. California, he says, is receiving a double blow, the first of which came when the heavy frosts ruined a vast amount of the citrus crop, the second when citrus fruits were put in the free list of the pending tariff bill.

"I was surprised to find California so badly hurt by the pending tariff bill. The residents there are even more depressed than we are. By taking off the tariff on citrus a severe blow has been struck at that industry, which, added to the one suffered by them from the frost, has made them very bitter against the present administration.

"When I expressed my surprise at finding the residents there so blue, one who had just returned from New York told me that it was even worse there. Business, he said, in that city was at a stand still.

"At present the entire country is suffering from the pending legislation. A sentiment of uneasiness and uncertainty pervades the country. Though many industries will be hurt, just as our sugar industry will be hurt in event free sugar is agreed upon, I believe when the bill is finally signed business will readjust itself and times will come better."

FATE OF MISSING SOLDIER IS STILL MYSTERY AT POST

SCHOFIELD BARRACKS, June 28.
—After a painstaking search of the entire east face of the Waianaa range to the north of Kolekole pass, which begin at the first peep of dawn Friday morning, the 900 men of the Fourth Cavalry rode in to the post last evening about dusk, and reported that no trace of the missing Cook Hero, of I Troop, had been discovered.

The missing soldier was last seen on Wednesday morning, by a non-commissioned officer of his regiment, as he was crossing the target range, presumably bound for the deep gully just northwest of the post, where the wild hogs are being found in great numbers this season. The man left his troop armed with a 30-30 Winchester, and a .45 revolver, with five rounds of ammunition for the rifle and one for the pistol. There is an unconfirmed report that shots were heard from the direction of the mountain about dark on Wednesday evening. When Hero failed to put in an appearance on Thursday evening, the matter was reported to the post commander, and orders were issued late that evening for a cessation of firing by the Twenty-fifth Infantry on both the A and B ranges for Friday, so that the Fourth Cavalry could safely search the entire country leading to the mountain. The Fourth Cavalry turned out all available men, and, dividing the range into sections to be covered by each of the three squadrons, the command left the garrison at daybreak. Leaving their mounts at the foot of the range, each troop searched carefully its allotted section, climbing finally to the very crest of the range and looking down the slope to the west. The work involved a tremendous amount of hard climbing, and the appearance of the regiment on its return was that of a command just in from a long forced march.

The portion of the range south of Kolekole pass will not be searched as the missing soldier was headed towards the other part of the mountain and the best pig hunting is found only in this section. Hero was a recruit of some eleven months service and during his service in I Troop has shown a marked preference for his own company which explains his solitary hunting trip. The dangers that attend climbing alone over the mountain are so great that it is not unlikely that hunting trips except with a party of several men will be forbidden in the future.

Morning on CHANGE

The last day of the week did not show any new developments on the stock exchange. During the session this morning no sales were recorded, and the few which were made between board were at former prices.

Hawaiian Sugar sold in seven shares at 24.50; almost 200 shares of Olaa went at 1.25. Pioneer, fifty shares of which changed hands, stayed at 18.50, and McBryde, selling in four sales, stood at 2.75. Two O. R. & L. Co. went at 145.

By December 1 the Panama canal will be so near completion that, should the need arise, the Atlantic fleet could be transferred by that route from the Atlantic to the Pacific.
