OVER-NIGHT FEDERAL WIRELESS

To the Advertiser

Capt. John Lanyon of New York, special agent of the Matteawan Asylum for the criminal insane, was this afternoon hurrying to Colebrook to demand that Harry K. Thaw be delivered to him as his keeper. Lanyon was delayed at Lancaster by a breakdown of his auto.

With pompous alacrity, which had been somewhat subdued by the unexpected, strenuous and turbulent events of the last twenty-four hours, Thaw began his preliminary fight with the declarations that his lawyers would not let W. T. Jerome "railroad" him back to the asylum without a hard fight.

"We will try to imitate Canadian celerity," said Jerome. "We shall not allow quibbling to interfere with the transfer of Thaw back to the lunatic asylum, where he belongs." In fact, Jerome indicated strongly that he had assurances from Governor Samuel Felker of New Hampshire and Attorney General James H. Tuttle that these would be no delay in giving the fugitive a hearing in the extradition proceedings.

Japanese demands growing out of the killing of several Japanese at Nanking were presented to the Chinese government today. Though full details were not available, sufficient information was gleaned to show that the demands were tantamount to an ultimatum. An apology, an indemnity and the punishment of the guilty soldiers and officials in Nanking are demanded, and the Chinese are required to accept the terms without delay and without bickering.

It was stated at the Chinese foreign office that the Japanese note had been received, and that it had been turned over to Provisional President Sun Shih-kai, who with other Chinese officials was considering it this afternoon.

By a vote of 87 to 190, along party lines, the house today determined to send the tariff bill, with the senate's amendments, direct to conference. Republican efforts to have the amendments considered in the house proper were defeated after a partisan debate, during which the minority assailed the gag rule brought in by the Democrats.

The conferees who have been agreed upon to represent the house, and who will be formally announced later, are Representatives Underwood, Kitchin, Rainey and Dixon, Democrats; Payne and Pordney, Republicans; and Murdock, Progressive, as members of the ways and means committee.

"Mayor Gaynor was a strong man with a genius for public life," said Secretary Bryan today, on learning of the death. "He was strong not only in the sense that he showed ability in the discussion of public questions, but his sympathies were broad, and his heart was enlisted in reform. His place will be hard to fill. I am distressed to learn of his death."

B. W. Dawson, a West Virginia coal operator, declared before the senate investigation committee today that operators in Pennsylvania and Illinois have agreed with the United Mine Workers to limit the production of coal in West Virginia.

David Lamar, under indictment in New York for impersonating members of congress, was arrested yesterday by order of Attorney General McReynolds. He was released on bonds.

President Wilson is so satisfied with the tariff situation that he left Washington for the summer White House, at Cornish, New Hampshire, today.
