**ARMY BAKERY GOES UP**  
IN BUSINESS DISTRICT

Eight large army tents were pitched on the Mahuka site this morning, the line extending from King to Merchant street, and the work attracting the usual crowd of interested spectators.

The outfit is a field bakery, established to supply a special quality of field bread to all the mobile troops in the field during the coming maneuvers. This bread has a thicker crust than the ordinary white bread, and while harder, keeps in condition much better, and will stand transportation.

The field bakery is in command of Captain Sherrard Coleman, 10th cavalry, commissary, and the detail consists of a quartermaster sergeant, one sergeant, one corporal, eight bakers, and two laborers, from Schofield Barracks.

## WILLET & GRAY

### GIVE LATEST ON SUGAR

Willet & Gray's Sugar Trade Journal for September 25 gives the following market report and news about the sugar tariff.

Statistics by Special Cable—Cuba.—The six principal ports. Receipts, 5,000 tons; exports, 24,000 tons; stock, 101,000 tons.  
Centrals grinding 1, against 2 last year and none in 1911.  
Receipts entire island 16,000 tons, against 6,000 tons last week, 4,000 tons last year and 3,000 tons in 1911.

Stocks in the United States and Cuba together of 362,000 tons, against 381,320 tons last week and 214,686 tons last year, an increase of 147,314 tons from last year.  
Europe—Stock in Europe, 947,000 tons, against 615,000 tons last year.

Visible Supply.—Total stock of Europe and America, 1,308,000 tons against 829,686 tons last year at the same uneven dates. The increase of stock is 478,314 tons, against an increase of 446,305 tons last week. The total stocks and floats together show a visible supply of 1,374,000 tons against 1,001,986 tons last year, or an increase of 372,014 tons.

Raws.—Quotations declined 6 cts. per 100 lbs. to equivalent of 3.67c per lb. for 96 degree test centrifugals, say 2 5/16c c.&f., followed by a further decline to 2 1/4c c.&f., reducing spot quotations to 3.61c.  
The week under review was subject to influences that are quite unusual, as compared with several past seasons.

Just one little difference is accountable for the greater difference being experienced.  
The necessity of adding to our local supplies last year by imports of about 60,000 tons of full-duty sugar sustained our local markets at that time.

The absence of such necessity this season by reason of a surplus of supplies at home, causes a weakness every time sugars from the local supplies are put on the market in advance of the hand-to-mouth basis on which all sugar business is now being done from the refiner to the retailer.

Refiners' own stocks are not yet down to this hand-to-mouth basis, and all efforts to induce them to take on more stock until this condition is touched, results in concessions by sellers necessary to be made.

The local supplies for use by refiners to end of year are not excessive, and if it is possible to withhold them from the market until refiners can handle them on the hand-to-mouth basis, more satisfactory results to sellers would no doubt result.

As it is cargoes are arriving unsold, with but a few days in which to sell or warehouse, and a weak market results.  
It may be said also that buying raws in anticipation of a much larger demand for the refined products in September than actually materialized, has to do with the present inability of refiners to keep the market clear of offerings at full prices.

We are inclined to think that F. O. Licht's commercial estimate, given herewith, of the European beet crops, 1913-14, is somewhat more favorable for a higher range of prices for the crop than was obtained for the past crop. The first deliveries, however, in October are quoted at 9s. 3 1/4d. per cwt., which price scarcely covers the cost of production. Futures of May and onwards, however, show 2 1/2d. advance during September to date.

In brief, the commercial estimate shows a total for all Europe of an average between a maximum and minimum of 8,455,000 tons, against actual last season of 2,305,000 tons, a probable increase of only 150,000 tons for this season, but which is of special importance is that Germany, Austria and France give less expectation than last year, and the increase of 500,000 tons in Russia is of less importance under the controlling influence of the Russian government, which may or may not divert its surplus in competition elsewhere.

Russia's crop last year was a partial failure, and less stock goes over into the new season than last year.  
The consumption is increasing from about 23 pounds per capita in 1911-12.  
Our Russian correspondence, herewith, is interesting.

At first view, we look for improved sugar conditions in Europe for 1914, when viewed independent of the crops which go to make up the United States requirements.

The low prices ruling in the United Kingdom, though 1/2c to 3/4c per lb. higher than the duty basis parity of the United States, produced an increased consumption for 11 months to September 1 of 85,126 tons over 1912.  
Cane crop conditions are fairly favorable throughout, with no special estimated increases or decreases for next season.

Cuba is ending with one Central grinding and full-up receipts for the season, 16,000 tons this week.  
Stocks in Island are so far reduced that it seems they might be better controlled than last year.  
At the close the sugars on the market remain unsold, and quotations remain nominally at 2 1/4c c. & f. and 3 1/16c per lb. for 96deg. centrifugals.  
The American Sugar Refining Company has announced: "We have decided to incorporate in our delayed contracts the following clause: Buyers agree in purchasing this sugar to have the same shipped to their own store or warehouse and not to sellers' customers."  
Washington, D. C. (by telegraph)—Sept. 25, 1913.—The conference on the tariff bill are working with might and main today to complete their work on the bill in the hope of bringing in a report tomorrow. The repeals amendments to the sugar schedule proper have been left intact, but it is understood that the senate retaliatory provision, under

which the president was permitted to proclaim a duty on sugar coming from countries discriminating against the United States, was stricken out.  
The house provision permitting a discount of 5 per cent on imports brought in American ships is retained, but is so amended as to render it inapplicable to countries with which the United States has treaties, with which it would conflict. It is impossible to get the text of the amendment as the conference work is all secret and very little given out.  
Senator Simmons told the newspaper men that the senate had been compelled to surrender the retaliatory provision.
