ORDINANCE NO. 47.

An ordinance relative to the establishing of grades and sidewalk lines on Kapahulu Road, from Waiatae Road to Kanaina Avenue, in the District of Honolulu, City and County of Honolulu, Territory of Hawaii.

Be it Ordained by the People of the City and County of Honolulu: Section 1. Grades, Datum Plane. That the grades of that portion of Kapahulu Road, in the District of Honolulu, City and County of Honolulu, Territory of Hawaii, lying between Waiatae Road and Kanaina Avenue, as hereinafter set forth, are established in reference to a datum plane being mean tide at said District of Honolulu and being located as follows, to-wit:

A bench mark at the foot of pillar at the left entrance of the Judiciary Building in said District of Honolulu, is 16.5 feet above said datum plane. Said grades are above said datum plane, the distance specified on a map which is on file in the office of the City and County Engineer, and is marked Grade Map No. 5.

Section 2. The sidewalk lines of said Kapahulu Road, which are also the curb line, shall be parallel with and 14 feet from the following described center line, except as noted on Grade Map No. 5.

Commencing at a point in the center of Kapahulu Road, which is by true azimuth 11° 49' 30" distant 14 feet from a monument which marks the intersection of the center line of Kapahulu Road with the South side of Waiatae Road, said monument being by Co-ordinates as referred to the Government Triangulation Survey Station, Maunaea, 1155.4 feet North and 1167.7 feet West;

Thence running as follows by true azimuths 11° 48' 30" - 1,793.3 feet to Hobron Avenue;

Thence 9° 20' - 960.1 feet to Waiatae Avenue;

Thence 35° 36' - 1306.0 feet to Campbell Avenue;

Thence 29° 15' - 1720.0 feet to Kanaina Avenue; all of which with the grade elevations are more perfectly shown on the above mentioned Grade Map No. 5, which is hereby made a part of this ordinance.

OVER-NIGHT FEDERAL WIRELESS To the Advertiser

Hundreds of police and soldiers both infantry and cavalry, are patrolling the streets of Mexico City, prepared to put down any uprising which might occur. The rapid fire guns which were placed in the Palace last Friday and later withdrawn, have returned.

All of the papers issued in the city either remained strictly impartial in their discussion of the event or were strongly sympathetic with the Huerta policy. Minister of Foreign Affairs Moheño, whom Huerta offered to place in the cabinet, says that Huerta took his action against the deputies when it was learned that there was a plot on foot in the chamber to put Huerta out of the way and allow the revolution in the north to triumph.

The United States government is quietly preparing for any emergency that may arise in Mexico. Its advisers show the improbability of an election on October 26, not only because of the successes of the Constitutionalist, but numerous illegals in connection with the preliminary arrangements for an election. The dissolution of congress by force is plainly looked upon in Washington as an unconstitutional act.

Hereafter a matron and a policeman must stand guard with a watchful eye in every public dance hall in Boston to see that the tango, turkey trot and other dances of a similar character are not attempted and that further regulations just promulgated by Mayor Fitzgerald are not violated.

Mrs. Rose Manarik, 45, who had not been to a dance for 20 years, was initiated into the mysteries of the tango by her daughter Stella at a Bohemian dance at Chicago. After several hours of tangoing she fainted and died.

Glenn H. Curtiss, the American aeroplane manufacturer, is at St. Petersburg at the invitation of the Russian navy department which is now using a flotilla of Curtiss hydroplanes on the Black Sea.

Curtiss admits that the object of his visit is to further his plans to acquire a suitable piece of land near St. Petersburg on which to construct a plant and become chief hydroplane constructor of the Russian navy.

The plans of the Russian government include the supplying of aeroplanes for the army as well as the navy and in numbers which will put Russia on an equal footing in this respect with the other great powers.

Capt. E. O. Nilson will command the steamer Hilonian when she leaves San Francisco next Wednesday for Hawaiian ports via the Sound. Captain Nilson is a veteran navigator on the island run in windjammers but this is the first venture in supreme command of a steamship.

Col. H. B. McCoy, deputy collector of customs at Manila, and Chas. H. Linsler, director of the Bureau of Lands in the Philippines have resigned, and Manuel Finto has been appointed to succeed the latter. This appointment is regarded as implying the adoption of a new attitude toward the friar land question. Governor General Francis Burton Harrison says that he does not intend to make any further changes at present.

East Brookfield, Mass., the birthplace of Connie Mack, celebrated his victory with red fire parades and bell ringing.

Headed by a drum corps a crowd of men and boys marched over muddy roads from Brookfield to East Brookfield to the house where Mack was born. No members of the family were there, but the present tenants of the house had anticipated the coming of the celebrators, and had red fire burning on the steps.

All railroad cars running between the two towns burned red lights. Church bells were rung and a big bonfire was lighted.

The Furness line steamship Rappahannock which has on board a number of passengers received from the Voltorno, is due to arrive at Halifax Wednesday. The Voltorno has been calling at that port for a number of years, and Captain Francis Inches and his chief officer, H. W. Miller, are both well known there.

Two experiments are to be made with Ulivi's "F" rays in Italy in an attempt to prove the inventor's contention that he can destroy battle-ships by means of the rays without direct connection. The experiments will be made with two captive balloons provided with a steel frame work.

Timothy L. Woodruff, three times Lieutenant Governor of New York, once with Theodore Roosevelt as Governor, died at his home there last night after an illness covering a period of several days. Paralysis was the cause of death.

Woodruff was born in New Haven, Connecticut, August 4, 1858. He was first elected Lieutenant Governor of New York, and was elected to the same office for three succeeding terms.

Scenes of wild consternation ensued at Rotterdam the following the receipt of the news of the destruction of the Voltorno, which sailed from that port on October 2. ing of the Voltorno at sea was due directly to unskilled labor employed, according to Andrew Furuseth, president of the International Seamen's Union. "This is but another gruesome argument for better working conditions at sea," declared Furuseth today.
