OAHU PRESIDENT SAYS HE'LL QUIT

Chillingworth's Intention Is Opposed by Fans Who Want League Rules Upheld

President Charles F. Chillingworth of the Oahu baseball league insists that he will not continue at the head of that organization unless the league upholds the stand he has taken regarding Saturday games.

As published some days ago, the action of the Portuguese team's manager in scheduling a contest with the All-Chinese a week ago without consulting the league officials, furnished a grievance that the president says cannot, in the interests of clean and organized baseball in Honolulu, be overlooked.

"It has come to this," says Chillingworth, "either the league rules are to be upheld or I cannot remain as president. I believe a majority of the league members are with me, but certainly unless some action is taken to curb the unauthorized playing of Saturday games, and the scheduling of games without following the rules, the president cannot remain in office. He has to see the rules upheld, and if the league does not back him up there is nothing for him to do but resign."

Chillingworth's intention is opposed generally in the league ranks, so far as can be learned, with the exception of certain elements who believe that a change might be desirable.

Among the fans generally, those who have expressed themselves as strongly opposed to letting Chillingworth resign. They say the disorganization of baseball if his hand is taken from the helm, and in view of the importance of the coming inter-island series, to be played during the parade week, they hope that Chillingworth will reconsider his intention and remain with the league. It is believed that a satisfactory compromise can be reached.

INTER-ISLAND BASEBALL FOR 1914 CARNIVAL

Dougherty Names Committee to Arrange Series of Fast Contests

A. L. Castle, John Soper and A. Q. Marcellino were yesterday appointed by James D. Dougherty, director-general of the 1914 Floral Parade and Mid-Winter Carnival, as a committee to make arrangements for the series of inter-island championship baseball games proposed for the February celebration. Upon his return from a month's trip to Hawaii, Dougherty gave out the information that the teams of the Big Island are keen over the proposed series and have decided to enter a strong team, and it is thought that the other islands will respond as rapidly to the requests of the carnival committee for something in the way of good baseball as one of the features of the week.

While in Hilo, Dougherty had a lengthy session with the Hilo baseball association, laying before it the plans which he has in mind for the inter-island championship diamond series. A team from that organization, as well as teams from Maui, Hawaii and Kauai, will be brought here to play four Oahu teams. Dougherty has received word from Maui that that island is eager to enter a team. An All-Kauai team is now endeavoring to secure several games in Honolulu with the All-Chinese at Christmas time. This is thought to be a poor policy on the part of the Kauai aggregation from the fact that any inter-island games around Christmas would be likely to detract from the interest of the proposed contests in February. As yet, this All-Kauai team has not been approached on the matter of playing in Honolulu with the other island teams during the carnival, but it is thought that it will be willing to cancel Christmas dates and postpone its visit to this city until February, at which time it could get in line for the trophy which is to be offered to the winner of the series. Dougherty will go to Kauai next week, at which time he will take the matter up with the Garden Island teams.

The committee in charge of the arrangements has decided upon the Punahou, C. A. C. and Asahi teams to compete against the island aggregations, and a picked team will be formed and known as the All-Oahu. With these teams in the field, an interesting schedule should be the result of the committee's efforts, and the handsome trophy which will be awarded the winner should create keen competition.

Oahu College and Town Team Will Play Tomorrow

Captain of Each Eleven is Confident of Winning the Second Contest

Husky Aggregations on Edge for Second Game of the Series

Two evenly matched aggregations, one composed of former gridiron champions and the other of younger fellows who are getting their first start, will hold forth in the sunlight, and with each captain confident that his teammates will acquire victory, there is little doubt but what the game will be fast and furious. From the time the first quarter opens until the umpire's whistle announces the close of the last half.

"With the material we have I believe we can win," said Captain Schuman this morning. On the other hand, Captain Inman harbors the same degree of confidence in his eleven. Neither captain, it may be said, has

William Paty, Elisha Andrews, Eddy Moore, Harry Melin and Henry will be seen in different positions on the line. For substitutes, Captain Schuman has secured Oswald Lightfoot, "Chipper" Gilman, Harold Morgan and "Buster" Carter.

KAMEHAMEHA TO PLAY MCKINLEY MONDAY P. M.

Cadets Join the Interscholastic Football Series and Boast Speedy Eleven

The second game of the 1913-14 interscholastic championship football series will be played on Alexander field Monday afternoon between the McKinley high school eleven and the newly formed team from the Kamehameha schools. At a recent special meeting of the Interscholastic Athletic Association, of which First Lieut. George Turner is president, the cadets expressed their intention of entering a squad, which, although it will be unable to secure any Saturday games, will materially increase the impetus which has been given the gridiron sport so far this season.

Early in the season the Kamehameha representatives, at a meeting of the athletic association, informed the delegates that the cadets would enter no team on account of the lack of a competent coach and for other reasons. The schedule for the year was arranged between three teams, namely: Punahou, Town Team and High School, Saturday being set as the day for all games between any two of these aggregations. Shortly after the High School eleven journeyed out to Kanihau field and was beaten by a picked team from the senior class, the cadets did not come out with a squad. Considerable stress was laid on the matter, with the result that the Kamehamehas, who by that time had secured a coach, decided that they would enter. Trouble then arose concerning the schedule, and as the Kamehameha school is a member of the Interscholastic Athletic Association and therefore has a right to play with either the High School or Punahou for the championship, it was thought for a while that the Town team would have to drop out.
