SHIPWRECKED BOY MATSON OFFICERS LINER SIBERIA STRANGELY DISAPPEARS PROMOTED TO MATSONIA CHARGED FEE FOR TIP

That George Vining of Santa Rosa, Cal., the youth who was a member of the crew of the Amaranth, shipwrecked in the South Seas some weeks ago and who told a graphic story of the travel of almost 1400 miles in a jury-rigged open boat, as published in the Star-Bulletin October 7, is believed to have been shanghaied almost immediately upon his arrival in San Francisco is the news brought here in the Ventura this morning.

Vining, but 19 years of age, had been the victim of two ocean disasters within as many years spent at sea and had determined to give up the tempestuous career. However, friends of the young man state that he disappeared shortly after the Ventura reached the coast port, before his mother, who had journeyed to San Francisco to meet him, had had an opportunity to lay eyes upon her boy. Every effort to locate Vining proved futile, notwithstanding the fact that the police of the bay section were called upon to aid.

Just recognition of a long period of faithful service from several well-known steamship men, who for years have been identified with the Matson Navigation Company, is offered in the promotion of several officers well-known to a wide circle of friends and acquaintances in this city.

In addition to the elevation of Captain Peter Johnson, formerly master of the Wilhelmina to the new Matsonia now about completed at the Newport News Shipbuilding Yards on the east coast, of Capt. Henry Weedon of the Lurline who goes east to take command of the liner Manoa, private advice received with the arrival of the Oceanic liner Ventura this morning bring word that Joseph Farrell, a popular chief steward, with the Honolulu, has been ordered to proceed to Norfolk, and take over the stewardship in the Matsonia, making the trip through the Panama Canal and the maiden voyage from San Francisco to Honolulu in that vessel.

Farrell left for the Atlantic seaboard immediately following the arrival of the Honolulu at San Francisco. He was accompanied by J. R. Harry, port steward of the Matson Navigation Company with headquarters at San Francisco. Harry will have charge of outfitting the new vessel and will also return to the Pacific coast in the liner.

In future, when a Pacific Mail skipper has reason to believe that a China sea typhoon is ailing in the capacity of a far performer in a "tango twister," and seeks more definite information from Japanese sources regarding its location, the official must be prepared to pay for the service.

Captain Adrian Zeeder, master of the Siberia, that sail from Honolulu for the California coast last Saturday morning, was introduced to a distinct innovation while steaming from Hong Kong to one of the Japanese ports. Having been advised before departing from Manila, that a typhoon might be encountered before his command reached Yokohama, a wireless query was dispatched to one of the stations along the coast of Japan. The message was sent to a representative of the Imperial weather bureau and found its way to a station on Formosa. The Japanese official is said to have replied to the inquiries forwarded by the Siberia's skipper with the interesting request that the information must be paid for, as the barometer was dropping at an alarming rate. The matter was finally settled by the skipper assenting to a charge of three yen, or six bits United States currency.

Rougier's Trip a Costly One.

It cost Fr. Emmanuel Rougier, South Sea Island copra king, and dealer in Pacific Islands \$275 to reach the coast from Honolulu. Father Rougier left this city on the last voyage of the Japanese liner Honokong Maru. He had just figured as an important witness in an extended hearing before a territorial court in which his suit had been brought against him by Capt. Frederick Miller. Father Rougier claimed to have important business awaiting him at Paris and London, and was determined to proceed to San Francisco at any cost. As he elected to travel on a vessel flying a foreign flag, a fine of \$200 was imposed against the Toyo Kisen Kaisha by the federal government, in which case the penalty was added to the cost of the ticket sold to the former priest.

Plan New Life-Saving Stations.

In the very near future it is expected that several life-saving stations will be built in northern British Columbia waters by the dominion government. Owing to the great amount of shipping which has developed to the north in recent years, the needs of more adequate life-saving facilities have become emphasized, and Commander Henry Thompson, inspector of life-saving stations, has just completed a tour in northern waters. There is not one life-saving station north of Queen Charlotte sound in either British Columbia or Alaska waters.

Steamer Gives Way to Trolley.

Officials of the C. P. R. coast service announce that the sternwheeler Beaver, after many years of useful service on the New Westminster-Chilliwack route up the Fraser, will be withdrawn from the run at the end of the month. Since the inauguration of the B. C. electric railway service to Chilliwack, the Beaver has been operated at a loss, hence her departure from the Fraser.

BOARD OF HEALTH CONDEMNS LARGE NUMBER OF LOTS

In a two hours' inspection of the Kewalo reclamation district this morning the territorial board of health condemned about 25 lots which were not included in the original grade. About five lots were found virtually up to grade, not requiring the action that had been considered necessary in their case.

Most of the lots condemned today are on Lanikai street, and average about one foot below the sea level set for the property adjoining them, a few being even three feet below and already filled with stagnant water. Supt. J. W. Caldwell of the public works department now will be notified of the board's action, he in turn notifying the owners, who may do the requisite filling themselves or permit it to be handled by the Lord-Young Engineering Company, the contractors who are making the general fill for the territory.
