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PECK'S WORK FOR HAWAII'S BANKING WINS

Honolulu Man's Suggestions on Currency Bill Will Probably Be Adopted

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 25.—L. Tenny Peck, cashier of the First National Bank of Hawaii, has appeared before the Senate committee on banking and currency, urging that consideration of financial institutions in Hawaii be given in framing a measure to change the present monetary system. He stated that the territory should not be left without any connection whatever with the plans prevailing on the mainland for the control of financial concerns.

As heretofore pointed out by the Star-Bulletin correspondent, the currency measure passed by the House made no provision whatever for Hawaii. When attention was called to this omission it was explained that the matter could be rectified in all probability by a series of regulations issued by the secretary of the treasury of the United States.

Jurist, Resigning from Bench, Makes Known Plans in Washington Interview

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 25.—Judge H. E. Cooper, who tendered his resignation as circuit court judge while here attending the supreme council of Scottish Rite Masons, expects to devote much time in the future to developing the Palmyra islands. He has purchased the entire group, comprising 52 islands. Much enthusiasm was manifested by Judge Cooper while here regarding his new possession. It is his intention when returning to take a colony of native Hawaiians to settle the islands. The islets are in the form of a horseshoe and about 6 miles around. They abound in luxuriant cocoanut groves through which birds of gorgeous plumage flash in myriad flocks, their bright wings, Judge Cooper said, glinting like the aurora borealis in the radiance of a tropical sun.

"Before purchasing the islands I made a trip there in my yacht," said Judge Cooper. "I was accompanied

The license was issued to a Japanese hack driver, Yagahara Nikiichi, and Alicia Brown, a Portuguese girl, American born. The parents of the girl contend that she is less than 16 years of age; however, in securing the license she gave her age as 18, and the complaint of the parents to the sheriff have been ignored.

ALL-CHINESE COMPANY NOW A CERTAINTY
