MILK ORDINANCE WILL BE BROUGHT BEFORE SPECIAL MEETING OF THE SUPERVISORS NEXT TUESDAY NIGHT

Troubles of the proposed milk ordinance do not seem to be over. A special meeting has been called to consider it. The meeting will be held Tuesday evening in the chamber of the supervisors. Members of the board of agriculture and forestry will be particularly invited to be present, as they have pointed out that several radical changes must be made in the proposed ordinance to make it meet the needs here.

A communication was received from the board and read at the meeting of the supervisors last night. It was declared in the letter that the ordinance had been drafted without conferring with them, that the supervisors had ignored their offer to be of assistance in whipping the law into shape.

A dairyman present at the meeting last night stated that if the proposed ordinance was passed many dairymen would be obliged to go out of business. The board of agriculture and forestry said that if it is passed it will nullify the latter's bovine tuberculosis work.

The new milk ordinance was drafted after a great deal of deliberation on the part of the committee of health of the supervisors, P. L. Weaver, first deputy city and county attorney, and Dr. James T. Wayson, city and county physician, and E. J. Gay, milk inspector.

The following is the summary of the meeting last night: Petition on behalf of E. S. Barrero for admission to Leahi Home. Denied.

Report from ways and means committee criticizing civil service commission for its expenses made in excess of \$300, but recommending that the \$250.00—part of the additional expense—be appropriated; but that the \$150 for printing translations be disallowed. Adopted.

Report from roads committee recommending that Wahiawa bridge be repaired at cost of about \$3700.

Report from health committee recommending that emergency tuberculosis cases, chargeable to county, and not otherwise provided for, be sent to Leahi at \$1.50 a day rate. Adopted. Report from county engineer on

grading of Lihoukalanani school lot, and the partial completion of the work. Roads committee.

Report from county engineer on status of several jobs and also with amendment to resolution for extension of Bishop street. Roads committee.

Report from Bishop Estate trustees offering "Paoua Park" to city and county for \$121,000. Ways and means committee.

Communication from Manoa Improvement Club endorsing street frontage tax. Filed.

Communication from Kalihi Improvement Club asking supervisors to buy plot of land near Kalihi park. Supervisor Petrie stated that he would be glad to work with club for purchase of lands. Roads committee.

Communication for Picani & Co. denying liability in re claim of Eben P. Low for damages. Ways and means committee.

Amendatory resolution for extension of Bishop street; introduced by Supervisor Petrie. Passed first reading.

Resolution from Supervisor McClellan for \$458.20 for funeral expenses of Officer Abren and sundry expenses of police department. Passed first reading.

Petition from committee of Daughters of Hawaii for preservation of Queen Emma home at Queen Emma Park. Roads committee. Adjourned to Nov. 28 at 12:15.

MAKE PLEA TO SAVE HOME OF QUEEN EMMA

The priceless value of old landmarks of Hawaii, and particularly the home of Queen Emma, at what is now known as Queen Emma Park, was pointed out last night at a meeting of the board of supervisors when a committee representing the Daughters of Hawaii, and W. O. Smith and J. G. Spencer spoke for the preservation of that old royal residence.

"We understand," said Mrs. F. W. Macfarlane, the spokeswoman for the committee, "that the supervisors plan to demolish this old home. This building is the only thing which now stands as a landmark to old Hawaii. The palace has been turned into an executive building, the old associations there have been done away with, and this old landmark we are now pleading for, this former home of a former queen, is the only place we can now show a tourist as representative of the days gone by."

"It only needs a little paint and a few slight repairs, which will not cost much, to put it in good repair."

W. O. Smith also strongly urged that the building be not destroyed.

Though the supervisors had already agreed to tear down the structure, it was agreed that they should reconsider their former action. Mr. Macfarlane stated that she felt a part of the expense of repair, or for a caretaker could be secured from private subscriptions. Mr. Smith declared that the expense should be borne by the city and county, that it was something in which the entire community is interested.


