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## MURDERER OF ABREU FOUND GUILTY; WILL HEAR SENTENCE NEXT TUESDAY

### Ferguson Faces Gallows Unless Judge Robinson Should Order a New Trial

For the killing of Police Officer Manuel Dionisio Abreu, Henry Francis Ferguson, the 18-year-old boy, will pay forfeit with his life if the verdict returned by the jury in Circuit Judge Robinson's court at 6:55 yesterday evening is executed. After five hours' deliberation the jury returned the verdict, "Guilty as charged," which means the prisoner will suffer the extreme penalty. He will be sentenced by Judge Robinson at 9 o'clock next Tuesday morning.

After the jurors' long consultation and apparent difference of opinion, the verdict came as a distinct surprise. Announcement of a decision for second degree murder, carrying with it a life imprisonment sentence, was confidentially expected. Attorney George A. Davis, who struggled heroically to save the man's life and who delivered a masterly address to the jury in closing his case yesterday morning, immediately gave notice of an exception to the verdict and presented a motion for a new trial. Argument on this motion will be heard by Judge Robinson Monday morning at 9 o'clock.

Ferguson Breaks Down.

The convicted youth seemed unable to comprehend the meaning of the verdict as the court read the words, but a moment later the realization of his doom came with full force. His bearing of sudden apathy gave way and he broke down, sobbing like a child. The pitiful scene was one which will be long remembered by those who witnessed it.

Ferguson shot and killed Abreu on the afternoon of November 6, and on the evening of November 21, 15 days later, he was found guilty. Ferguson stated yesterday to newspaper men that the police had denied him the privilege of writing to his mother, who resides at Jersey City, N. J., but even

had that privilege been granted and had the parents possessed the desire or the ability to lend him any assistance, their efforts would have been futile. The word of his dilemma could hardly have reached them by mail ere he was convicted and virtually beyond their reach.

Whether Ferguson is, to an extent, a pitiful victim of circumstances, and whether he possesses an average responsible mentality, is a subject of some discussion. That he was a wayward son even before he joined the army, enlisting with his mother's consent a year ago, is shown by the story of his life as related to the newspaper men. That he was admittedly a dangerous character, a menace to society, is the statement of an officer of the troop from which he deserted a week previous to the shooting of Abreu.

"Only a Question of Time."

"It was only a question of time," this officer is quoted as saying, "when he would have killed his man. If he had not killed Abreu he would have killed some other man later. By his rates in company F, of the 4th Cavalry, he was regarded as a dangerous individual."

Ferguson said yesterday he could not remember having ever seen his own father, his mother marrying a second time when he was only 6 years of age. He attended school for five years, but at the age of 12 went out to work for his living. In the next few years he essayed many jobs, holding none of them for long. His first work was as an A. D. T. messenger. From that time forward he evidently associated with the gangs of city lads of his own age, working occasionally but loitering and living off his step-father, a street car motorman most of the time.

Apparently he is a typical product of the slums of the mainland cities. That he did not have the proper training is evident; whether proper training and educational advantages would have had the desired effect on his peculiar mentality and saved him from himself is a matter for doubt.

## DOLLS HOLD THE CENTER OF STAGE IN CITY TODAY

Big dolls and little dolls, dolls representing every nationality and clothed in native costume, are holding forth on the lanai of the Hawaiian hotel today to do their share to increase the proceeds from the sale being held by the women of St. Clement's church. The sale and doll show started at 2 o'clock this afternoon and will last well into the evening, the Hawaiian land to be in attendance as one form of entertainment.

The makai and swa fanals of the hotel are prettily decorated with flags and bunting, while neatly arranged on tables are the dolls, on which have been spent weeks of untiring work. The dolls are not in the ordinary dress in which they are seen in their respective boxes in the stores, mind you, but every one has been costumed after the present day modes, silks and satins and laces being sparingly used. Then, too, there are other things for sale. Here, on one side, is a big table with all sorts of pretty doll clothes and hats; yes, and even shoes, for the doll of the "400" would not seem it fitting to go barefoot, even in a tropical climate. Dolly's house must be furnished, and so those in charge of the show have placed various kinds of doll furniture on sale. There are chairs and tables and lots of other little things which the children delight in not forgetting a teddy bear or two for those who wish them.

Should the visitors desire, they may retire to the shady end of the lanai where refreshments may be ordered. For the amusement of the children--and the grown folks, too--a Punch and Judy show will be in session throughout the afternoon and this evening. Those in charge of the sale are enthusiastic over their work and they believe that the sale held this year will be even more successful than the one held a year ago.

## HAMAKUA CANE PLANTING SURE, SAYS MR. SWANZY

A rumor that Theo. H. Davies & Co., Ltd., had decided not to plant any 1916 cane upon its Hamakua plantations was promptly denied by its managing director, F. M. Swanzy, when the matter was mentioned to him this morning. As a fact he added that they were making considerable repairs in the Hamakua mill, including the installation of new boilers and smoketack.

"No, there is nothing to which the land could be put--that is, on a large scale--if cane planting were abandoned. What could replace cane on such plantations as Ewa or Waiwala on this island? Of course nobody knows what the outcome of the present conditions in the sugar industry will be, but there is no truth in the rumor you mention."

"I notice that someone is here advocating the cultivation of coconuts in these islands, which I think would be a very good thing provided they could be made to grow well. If I were a young man I think I should be inclined to go into coconuts in the Philippines."

So great has been the demand for Red Cross Christmas seals on the Big Island that, through a letter received by James A. Rath of the Palama Settlement, Dr. H. B. Elliot, who is handling the campaign in Hilo, asked that additional stamps to the amount of \$200 be forwarded him on the return boat. "If the sale progresses as well on the other islands," said Mr. Rath, "we will dispose of nearly all the little stickers." Mr. Rath also received a letter from Maui asking that \$15 worth of stamps be forwarded at once.
