RESOLUTION NO. 128.

RESOLUTION MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE VARIOUS SERVICES AND LIABILITIES OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU FOR THE PERIOD ENDING JUNE 30, A. D. 1914.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of Honolulu, Territory of Hawaii, that the following sums, amounting to THREE HUNDRED NINETEEN THOUSAND SEVEN HUNDRED THIRTY-EIGHT AND 22-100 (\$319,738.32) DOLLARS, are hereby appropriated to be paid out of all moneys in the General Fund of the Treasury of the City and County of Honolulu for salaries fixed by law and other salaries, wages of labor, donations, maintenance of jails and general expenses of the said City and County for the period beginning with the first day of January, A. D. 1914, and ending with the thirtieth day of June, A. D. 1914, such payments to be made on pro rata monthly subdivisions as stated in the schedule there-of herein contained:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the following sums, amounting to TWELVE THOUSAND (\$12,000.00) DOLLARS, be and the same are hereby appropriated to be paid out of all moneys in the Permanent Improvement Fund of the Treasury of the City and County of Honolulu for the period beginning with the first day of January, A. D. 1914, and ending with the thirtieth day of June, A. D. 1914, for the following purposes, to-wit:


BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the sum of SIX THOUSAND (\$6,000.00) DOLLARS is hereby appropriated to be paid out of the General Fund of the Treasury of the City and County as an advance payment only, for repairs and maintenance of school buildings and grounds, labor and repair work, material maintenance, and school janitor services, in the said City and County for the period beginning with the first day of January, A. D. 1914, and ending with the thirtieth day of June, 1914; provided, however, that the General Fund be reimbursed from the School Fund for any sum advanced on account of the School Fund when the said School Fund shall become available;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Auditor of the City and County of Honolulu is hereby authorized and directed to draw warrants on the Treasurer of the said City and County for any of the sums named herein, or parts thereof, upon having filed with him schedules of salaries fixed by law and other salaries, of donation named herein, of payrolls and accounts for materials and supplies for general expenses and for permanent improvements, accompanied by original vouchers and certified by the City and County Clerk as having been duly passed and allowed by the Board of Supervisors at any regular meeting or any special meeting called for the purpose of considering expenditures.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That to make expenditures under this Resolution, it shall be necessary that all salary lists, items covering donation, payrolls, accounts of general expenses and permanent improvements shall, before being presented to the Board of Supervisors, be passed upon by a Committee or Committees and by such be reported to the Board of Supervisors with the recommendation of such Committee or Committees, and sums found to be lawfully due and payable may then be voted upon singly or collectively as convenient, on a call of the ayes and noes. In the event of any such Committee failing or neglecting to so pass any such matters or to make any recommendation in regard thereto, the Board may there-upon act.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That no liability under this Resolution shall be incurred in any month in excess of the monthly pro rata sums herein authorized.

OVER-NIGHT FEDERAL WIRELESS To the Advertiser

E. A. Mott-Smith will assist Governor Pinkham in launching his administration. This was made certain yesterday when it was learned in San Francisco that the secretary, following an exchange of courtesies with the new governor, would precede him to Honolulu on the S. S. Mongolia Thursday, which is due in Honolulu December 24.

By arrangements with Governor Pinkham, Secretary Mott-Smith will set in motion in Honolulu the machinery of which Pinkham will take charge upon his arrival, and it is understood that the new policies will precede the new governor, as a consequence.

It is announced that Secretary Mott-Smith will hold a conference with the governor Thursday morning just before he leaves, and that he will receive his instructions then.

J. J. Medeiros, the Portuguese of Hawaii, who is being held by the San Francisco police awaiting extradition for embezzlement, is very ill, and the departure of Deputy Sheriff Rose, who is awaiting the completion of the necessary legal forms, may be delayed for this reason.

A magnificent diamond, said to surpass in size and quality, the famous Kohinoor, Cullinan Regent, Star of the South and other large diamonds, is on exhibition in a special showcase at a Fifth avenue, New York, jewelry store.

This stone weighs 150 carats and is valued at more than \$300,000.

The navy department has received a wireless dispatch from Admiral Fletcher, announcing that repairs had been made to the Tampico water plant and that the supply had been renewed.

Admiral Fletcher also gave the news that all was again quiet in and around Tampico.

The tango craze has struck the cabinet circle as well as the diplomatic set and the winter colony in Washington. Mrs. A. S. Burleson, wife of the postmaster-general, whose charming young daughters, Misses Lucy and Sidney, are the tango experts, has issued invitations for a tango tea, to be given in the new home of the Burlesons on "Boxer Day," December 26.

Southern, an unoccupied country house near Bristol, England, was burned during the night. Suffragette literature was left scattered about the place.

Militant leaders declare they would push their campaign of destruction with all possible energy as long as Mrs. Fankhurst was held in jail.

Suffragette leaders today sent the following telegram to King George: "In your majesty's name, a noble woman is being done to death. We call upon your majesty to stop this crime before it is too late."

Shouting "Votes for women," a handsomely dressed suffragette threw a hammer through a London police station window yesterday. She was arrested.

Mrs. Kellett Chambers, better known under the pen name of "Kate Carew," is in the Samaritan hospital in London, recovering from a serious operation which was performed on Friday.

Australia will be represented officially at the San Francisco-Panama fair, as a result of the visit of the American commissioners. Besides the federal government, the governments of New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia, Queensland and Tasmania have decided to participate at San Francisco. The financial grant probably will aggregate \$500,000. New Zealand will also be represented. Its grants may amount to \$200,000.

Declaring that President Yuan Shikang was trying to have himself declared emperor and transform the new republic into a reactionary monarchy, nearly 500 members of the Chinese colony in San Francisco met yesterday to take steps to finance a revolution to cast him from office.

The London Times devoted three columns yesterday to reports from leading commercial and industrial centers of the United Kingdom on the actual, or prospective, effect of the Underwood tariff on British industries. Some manufacturers are optimistic, some are diffident and many cautiously non-committal. There has been no appreciable expansion of business in a majority of places from which reports have been received, but several cities, including Leeds, Dundee and Belfast, report that the new tariff has given a decided fillip to trade.

At the special request of Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, Mrs. John Dodd of Cedartown, Ga., is baking the Christmas fruit cake for the White House. Mrs. Dodds was a Miss Walker and the pastor of her family was Dr. Axon, Mrs. Wilson's father.

Miss Alma Hodges, the pretty debutante daughter of Lieutenant-colonel and Mrs. Henry Hodges, if the old superstition is true, "will not be married this year," for at the Chevy Chase in Washington, last Saturday, she tripped on the tight skirts of her pink tango frock and fell upstairs. She is now nursing a broken ankle.

Dr. Mary E. Walker has signed a contract to appear at a vaudeville theater, beginning January 5.

Former President W. H. Taft took a stand opposing compulsory arbitration of labor disputes which, he said, have been found useless, and advocated the appointment of a tribunal which should refer its decisions to public opinion for the settlement of strikes.

Figures taken from the books of the Western Fuel Company were cited yesterday by Matt I. Sullivan, special government prosecutor, to show that the company had made nearly \$100,000 by fraudulent methods. Sullivan's charges were made in the opening statement for the prosecution in
