The board of education of New York City has just secured an appropriation of \$79,000 with which to operate during the coming year after-school play centers in 163 of its school buildings. Each of these play centers will accommodate from 250 to 350 school children. The school yard and the school gymnasium will be used for this purpose, and will remain open from 3:30 to 5:30 p. m. The expense for approximately 300 teachers consists of \$2.50 for the director of about 1 1/2 cents per child for the center and \$1 per session for extra janitor service, making a total of \$3.50. Twelve American university endowment funds of over \$100,000 each are contributing to the cost of the centers.
