LIEUT. RICH'S CALCULATIONS BRANDED FAULTY

[By Latest Mail] MANILA.—The investigation which is being conducted by the army authorities as to the cause of the fatal hydroplane accident at Pasay beach death of Lieutenant C. Perry Rich, Philippine Scouts, a few days ago, has reasonably established the hypothesis, as far as it can be done, that it was not due to the faulty mechanism of any part of the machine, but that the unfortunate aviator miscalculated and dropped down at too steep an angle, being unable to right the airbird before striking the water.

Lieutenant Frank P. Lahm, 7th cavalry, one of the most distinguished aviators in the world and the instructor of all the aviators in the Philippine department aviation corps, was requested last night to give an explanation, so far as could be given, of the Pasay beach accident. He said: "It appears from all the inquiries that we have been able to make, that the accident was due to a miscalculation on Lieutenant Rich's part when he prepared to come down after his flight. He arose at 10:12 and came down at 10:19, being in the air but seven minutes. As far as we know or can ascertain, there was nothing wrong with the machine in any particular and the flight was entirely normal in every respect. The aviator came down in the same place and in exactly the same way as we all have been accustomed to come down. He was at an altitude of, it is judged, about 400 feet—when he started to come down. I should say that he had the machine under control almost all that distance. Bystanders who were watching him state that before he had gone very far he seemed to be coming down at a very steep angle. One man who saw him coming down said that it seemed to him that the machine made an effort to right itself just before it struck the water. At any rate, it did not do so and the accident was the result.

"Lieutenant Rich had one of our non-sinkable jackets about his person and a safety helmet on his head. When the machine struck the water it did so with the right wing down. Lieutenant Rich was flung from his seat and the engine fell loose from its fastenings and struck him in the back of the head. It is not true that he was strapped in his seat. We are never strapped in when flying over the water, but always strapped in when flying over land. I am practically certain that Lieutenant Rich never knew what hit him and that the blow from the engine, cast loose by the impact of the machine on the water, fractured his skull and killed him outright. He must have received this blow about the time the machine hit the water or as soon immediately thereafter as to be practically the same. He was catapulted into the water to the right as the machine struck and the engine was thrown back of him at once, striking him in the head as they both went down.

"It was a very sad and unfortunate affair and one which we all feel very deeply, more deeply than I can say."

SLAVERY PROBERS INVADE ILOILO

[By Latest Mail] ILOILO, P. I.—Assemblymen Acuna Acuna and Rounmoldes, members of the committee for the investigation of slavery in the Iloilo district, arrived here this morning. After a conference with Governor Hernandez it was decided to delay the beginning of the investigation for another week in order that publicity might be given to the proposition. Governor Hernandez will notify all the municipal presidents in his province, as will the governors of other provinces, of the dates on which their respective towns, and it is expected that the presidents will inform the people and call them to a public meeting at which the report of the ex-Secretary Worcester will be read and information asked concerning the specific cases of slavery mentioned in the report, and also information concerning any other cases of slavery known to exist.
