**FRIENDS WILL GIVE MARSHALL GOOD CHARACTER**

Arrangements for the depositions of 11 character witnesses residing at Connelville, Pa., the former home of John William Marshall, who is held here for the murder of C. R. Guertler, were made in circuit court this morning when a stipulation was filed, in which City and County Attorney Cathcart and Thompson, Wilder, Watson & Limer, counsel for Marshall, consented to the action.

The clerk of the court of common pleas for the county of Fayette, at Uniontown, Pa., will be authorized to examine the witnesses, giving them with questions which will be sent forward by both prosecution and defense and taking their replies in writing. The evidence will be introduced at the murder trial several weeks hence. Those to be examined at Connelville are Dr. Thomas H. White, Dr. Thomas Eckard, Harry Schenk, Dr. W. E. Edle, William C. McCormick, Samuel Goldsmith, R. E. Ubel, U. P. Park, W. R. Scott, Edward Dunn and A. C. Cochran.

**Police Notes**

Failing to scale a fence near the corner of Beretania and Nuuanu streets, D. A. Christiansen met with injuries last night, which when diagnosed at the hospital proved to have been a fractured hip bone. Christiansen claims that as he reached the top of the fence some of the timbers gave way sending him to the ground.

John Hopkins was placed under arrest by the police last night, it being alleged that in company with an alleged man from one of the local military organizations, the pair were responsible for the carrying away of a bath robe. The men were passing near the corner of Hotel and Mauna Kea when apprehended by the officers, while the garment was returned to the claimant.

The attempt upon the part of Francisco Loreka to outdo the nature man in Thomas square was resented by a number of people who happened to pass through the park last evening. A police officer was dispatched to the place, where it was alleged that the man was appearing sans the necessary clothing to adorn his person. Loreka is believed to be suffering from mental trouble and when apprehended by the police, was engaged in taking a bath at a hydrant. He has been locked up pending an inquiry concerning his sanity.

Captain of Detectives McDuffie would like to learn the identity of a complainant, who, while present at the monster gathering at Capitol square last evening, following the arrival of Governor Pinkham, declared that he had been a victim of a deft-fingered pickpocket. A man who gave his name as Allen, who failed to give a satisfactory account of his movements in the crowd, was arrested. The party who made complaint to several bystanders, insisted that Allen was the man who had slipped a hand in his pocket. When Chief McDuffie and his plain clothes men reached the scene, Allen alone remained in the throng.

Daniel S. Smith, an enlisted man with Company E, 1st Infantry, alleged by the military authorities to have been a deserter from the service since December 15, was placed under arrest last night by Detective Swift, it being charged that Rankin is implicated in the theft of a solid gold watch case, the property of a Japanese jeweler. The story told by the Japanese to the police is in effect that Rankin, who displayed an injured hand, visited his place of business some days ago, and asking to be shown some jewelry, is declared to have concealed the watch case in his clothing, the article not being missed until some time after the departure of the visitor. A short time afterward a Porto Rican is said to have visited the store, for the purpose of having a movement fitted to the case. The watch was immediately identified by the proprietor as having been his property. The Porto Rican was questioned and finally admitted that he had purchased the trinket from a soldier. The matter was then reported to Captain of Detectives McDuffie, who sent his men to seek for the missing militiaman. Rankin, it is stated, admits that he made away with the watch, with a hope that he might be bob-tailed from the army.

**BOURBONS WILL MAKE FURTHER CABINET PLANS**

Members of the territorial central committee who were to meet last night and take up the matter of patronage distribution in conjunction with a recently-organized committee of Democrats, decided late yesterday afternoon to postpone the meeting until this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

The arrival of the Honolulan an hour and a half earlier than was expected was the cause of postponement. Members of the territorial committee had planned to meet at 7:30 in the McCandless building and adjourn in time to meet Governor Pinkham on his arrival. But when word was sent to them that he would get in by 8 o'clock, they quickly changed their plans.

A list of names of persons to be endorsed by the committee for the positions in the governor's "cabinet" will be taken up by the territorial committee. Several names have been endorsed for each place.

"We will consider this list at the meeting," said M. C. Pacheco, chairman of the territorial committee, "and probably make endorsements. Several names have been given us for each place; which I consider wise. For if the governor wishes us to advise him of the men we favor for 'cabinet' places, we wish to be in a position to submit to him several from whom he can choose."

John Markham and J. Lightfoot were on hand at first for the meeting. They were active in the gathering of Democrats Monday when the list was made up. From what could be learned last night, the territorial committee will work in harmony with the recommendations of the self-appointed committee; and the members look forward to deciding on men for many important places this afternoon.

"Of course we realize," said one Democrat last night, "that Governor Pinkham may not call on us for endorsements. But if he does, we want to be in a position where we can turn them over to him without delay. Governor Pinkham is in a different position from what McCandless or other candidates would have been if they had been appointed. We realize that he hasn't us to thank for the position and that he is accountable directly to the president for what he does. Yet we wish to work in harmony with him and we feel that he wishes to work in harmony with us."

The meeting this afternoon will be held in the McCandless building, Bethel street.

**AD CLUB NOMINATION COMMITTEE NAMES ITS SLATE FOR NEXT YEAR**

It was announced from the local national guard headquarters this afternoon that, in case the company now being organized by Paul Super is not complete by midnight tonight, an order will be issued by Colonel John W. Jones tomorrow morning changing the status of the national guard of Hawaii to an organization composed of two separate battalions and two separate companies. Also, in case Mr. Super's company is not recruited up to the required strength, another order will be issued reducing certain staff officers and promoting others in accordance with the regulation governing military affairs.
