In Business Circles--News and Review

STOCK AND BOND MARKET SHOWS INCREASED SALES FOR WEEK AND FEW INDUSTRIALS SHOW GAIN

A gain of a few thousand dollars was made in the proceeds from stock sales for the six-day period ending Friday over the corresponding period last week. A few gains were made in stocks, particularly Haiku and Kahuku, and the few losses suffered were slight.

On the whole it was a very good week considering the low price of sugar. It was quoted Friday at 3.1368, a loss during the week from 3.14.

There were 1180 shares sold in the period bringing a total amount of \$35,022.87. In the former period the stock sold numbered 2175 shares, the proceeds being \$22,237.

Pines, which closed Friday a week ago at 36, closed this period at 36.50. It opened at 35.50, rose as high as 37, at which price 65 shares were sold, and closed for the period at 36.50. There were 135 shares sold. Pioneer gained a half point, the first 55 shares going at 17.50, the balance, 25 shares, at 18. One sale of Hilo Com. was made at an unchanged price, 3.25. Oahu stayed at 12.50;

It closed at that figure last week. Thirty-five shares changed hands. Hawaiian Commercial recovered at 23.50, after one small early sale at 23. The shares sold numbered 285. McBryde stayed at 2; 15 shares sold. Ten shares of Waialua went at a loss of a point and a half; 55. The greater part of the 195 shares of Ewa changing hands were disposed of at 16; 85 shares sold at 15.75 in the middle of the period. Brewery lost another quarter of a point, the one sale made, involving 25 shares, going at 16.

Kahuku made a 2-point gain, 10 shares changing hands at 14. Kekaha stayed at 90; 15 shares changed hands. Oiaa gained an eighth—100 shares sold at 1.12 1/2. And Honokaa gained a half point—200 shares selling at 2.50. It remained for Haiku to make the greatest gain—a gain of 12 1/2 points over the last sale.

This gain was accounted for by the fact that a much larger balance was carried over than expected by the "street." Fifty shares sold at 100.50.

FOREIGN NATIONS ASK NICARAGUA TO PAY DEBTS

British, German and Italian Governments Demand Money

(By Latest Mail)
MANAGUA, Nicaragua—The British, German and Italian governments, through their respective ministers here, have demanded that Nicaragua pay the debts due their nations, which amount to more than \$1,000,000. The German minister, in addition, demanded that promissory notes of the Nicaraguan government for debts be received in payment of customs duties.

The government refused to accede to the demands of the ministers on account of its embarrassed financial condition and notified the American minister to this effect.

BANK IS SWINDLED BY A DUPLICATE DEPOSIT BOOK

SPOKANE, Wash.—A new bank swindle was announced here today when it was made public that a man giving the name of Shackelford T. Miller had obtained \$1750 from the Fidelity National Bank January 2 by means, it is thought, of a duplicate deposit book. Miller deposited \$1750 in a checking account and then changed it to a savings account.

He called at the bank later and withdrew all but his interest. When a new paying teller went on duty as luncheon relief, Miller presented a savings book which showed no withdrawals and received again \$1750. The first withdrawal had not been entered against Miller's account in the bank's books by the regular teller.

BUSINESS IS BEGINNING TO BRIGHTEN UP

Much of the Improvement Thus Far Is Sentimental, but Some of It Is Actual, Particularly in Iron and Steel

Reports of business conditions throughout the United States and Canada are more generally favorable than they have been in a long time. Bradstreet's says:

Improvement is the keynote of this week's dispatches. Much of the betterment is sentimental in character, but at the same time considerable of it is actual and substantial. Foremost in the budget of news is the better state of employment incident to the resumption of operations in plants that had closed down over the holidays, particularly in the iron and steel industry.

Incidentally, collections have improved. Bank clearings for the week ending with January 15 aggregated \$3,448,773,000, a decrease of 8.2 per cent from the like week of last year. Outside of New York the total is \$1,520,474,000, a loss of 3.6 per cent from the corresponding week of 1912. The decrease at New York from last year is 11.5 per cent. Exports of wheat and flour, 6,713,289 bushels; corn, 97,577 bushels.

R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade says:

Almost without exception, reports from the leading sections of the country indicate that mercantile and industrial enterprises are being undertaken with increased vigor and signs of improvement are clearly apparent in iron and steel. There is no evidence that buying has expanded materially, the railroads continuing to defer purchases pending the decision of the petition for an advance in freight rates, but steel mills are re-suming and furnaces which had been banked over the holidays are again going into blast.

COMMERCIAL ITEMS.

A. Z. Rothchild of San Francisco, interested in the coconut fiber industry, has leased the property of the defunct American Laundry on Liliha street for a term of seven years. He states that he will install machinery in the building soon and start upon the manufacture of fiber door mats.
