PEARL HARBOR DOCK

WASHINGTON, D. C. — An evidence of the desire of the navy department to complete the drydock at Pearl Harbor, on Oahu, was made manifest during a discussion in the house committee of naval affairs meeting held yesterday. It is now proposed to eliminate the plans for building a great battleship drydock on the Atlantic coast that the Pearl Harbor project may be completed. The committee finished a draft of the appropriation bill, it is regarded as certain that the committee will send the measure to the house with a provision for building two dreadnoughts, in addition to a number of torpedo boat destroyers and a num-

ber of submarines, necessitating an expenditure of from \$148,000,000 to \$145,000,000.

The draft as now ready proposes the elimination of the proposed great battleship graving yard on the Atlantic. The reason for this is given that it will be necessary to expend \$1,500,000 in the completion of the Pearl Harbor drydock, which is looked upon as the most important project at this time.

NEVADA STATUTE KNOCKS OUT DIVORCE COLONY

RENO, Nevada. — Reno's hungry horde of divorce attorneys lost their last fight here yesterday when a decision was handed down by the district court upholding the constitutionality of the law passed by the last legislature making it necessary to reside in Nevada for one year before divorce proceedings can be instituted. The district court decision today means an end within a few months of Reno's famous divorce colony, made up of divorcees and divorcees whose wild orgies have brought a sort of

fame in Nevada which those who have the welfare of the state at heart have not relished.

FATAL TRAIN COLLISION

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. — The engineer, fireman and seven passengers were killed and scores were injured last night in a collision between two trains on the St. Louis & San Francisco Railroad, near here. The trains came together with great force, the cars of obsolete pattern splintering like tinder and others piling over in the ditch.

News of the accident was telegraphed here and relief trains, with physicians and nurses aboard, were hurried to the scene to care for the injured. The work of removing the dead and injured from the wreckage is still in progress.

GORE SAYS CHARGES ARE ALL LIES

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. — United States Senator Gore, defendant in a \$50,000 damage suit brought by Mrs. Bond, spent yesterday on the stand, a willing witness in his own behalf. The blind senator strongly denounced Mrs. Bond's charge of improper conduct, which she makes a basis for her suit. He branded the allegations as infamous lies. He was a willing witness throughout and was unperturbed under cross-examination.

HUNGER DRIVES WOMAN TO HIGHWAY ROBBERY

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. — Mary McCormack was arrested last night on a charge of highway robbery. At the point of a loaded revolver she held up Eliza Francis, a stenographer, demanding money. When arrested the feminine highwayman said she was driven to crime by hunger and that she had not had anything to eat for a week.

SCHMIDT SAYS ANOTHER DID IT

NEW YORK. — Haas Schmidt, confined in the death house at Sing Sing awaiting the date set for his execution, is reported to have confessed yesterday that the death of Anna Amuller for whose murder he was convicted, was not caused by him, but was the result of an illegal operation that was performed by another. Schmidt, however, admits that he cut up the woman's body.

HUERTA GATHERS IN LIBERAL LEADER

VERA CRUZ, Mex. — Fernando Calderon, leader of the Mexican liberal party, opposed to the policies of Huerta, arrived here last night from the Mexican capital in disguise. He succeeded in getting aboard a Spanish steamer, but was taken in custody by the Mexican authorities and is being held incommunicado, on orders from President Huerta.

IRWIN BEQUESTS LARGE; DETAILS RECEIVED HERE

Details of the will of the late William G. Irwin were received here today. The will disposes of a fortune valued at \$5,000,000. The great bulk of this goes to the surviving widow, Fannie M. Irwin.

The other beneficiaries are his surviving brother and sisters, a few more distant relatives and certain charities. Under the latter head come the United Charities of San Francisco, which organization is remembered with \$25,000 and the Associated Charities of Honolulu, which is bequeathed a like amount.

Irwin began his business career as a clerk in the office of the late Claus Spreckels in Honolulu. He died January 23rd, being at that time not only a multi-millionaire, but president of the Mercantile Trust Company and chairman of the governing board of the Mercantile National Bank. All his property was left in the form of shares in the William G. Irwin Investment Company.

Following are the bequests prescribed in Irwin's will:

One hundred thousand dollars to the executors of the Irwin estate, to be held in trust and invested in first mortgage securities at not less than 5 per cent interest, and the net income thereof be paid to deceased's sister, Leonora Irwin, during her life. At her death the \$100,000 to be paid to her children.

Two hundred and fifty thousand dollars to his daughter, Helene Irwin Crocker, bequeathed absolutely. One hundred thousand dollars to Elizabeth Irwin Spalding of Boston, bequeathed absolutely.

Twenty-five thousand dollars each to Irwin's three nieces, Elizabeth, Grace, Bell, and nephew Richard, children of Elizabeth Irwin Spalding.

Fifty thousand dollars to Edward Irwin Spalding, Liverpool, England, bequeathed absolutely.

Five thousand dollars each to the children of Edward Irwin Spalding, Raymond Spalding, Edith Spalding, nois Central passenger train in the woods near Love station last night, taking two negro prisoners from the sheriff, who was conveying them to the county jail.

The executors of the will are John D. McKee, vice-president of the Mercantile National Bank; Richard Ivers, Charles Templeton Crocker and Edward I. Spalding.
