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**HAWAIIAN SPECTACLE TOMORROW**  
**UNIQUE IN CHARACTER AND SETTING**

The love episode in the life of King Umi, his wooing of the beautiful Princess Piikea, in the dawn of Hawaiian history, stands out as one of the prettiest romances of the islands. It is upon his meeting of the princess when she is brought to his shore by Omaokamau, lifelong friend of the young king, to be delivered over to Umi in marriage that the historical drama is based.

In the staging of old Hawaiian historical events and legends, the Carnival committee has undoubtedly hit upon something that will go farther than almost any other one feature towards making Hawaii's annual festival a well demonstrated one. This seemed to be well demonstrated in the great open air production of the "Landing of Kamehameha," which was given last year. It was probably the most talked of feature among the strangers in the city who saw it, even though there were more or less hitches, and the arrangements for handling the crowd were most inadequate.

This year's production—"The Wooing of Umi and Piikea"—which will be produced at the county beach tomorrow afternoon beginning at 3:30 o'clock, gives promise of being an even more impressive and picturesque spectacle than the Kamehameha landing, and it is very certain that the big audience which will witness it will not be handicapped in their enjoyment as they were last year. The story depicted, is an exceedingly pretty love tale of two royal personages who were eminent in island affairs about the time that Columbus was discovering the American continent. The story was told at length in a very entertaining article published in the Star-Bulletin yesterday.

The last rehearsal of this event is in progress at the beach this afternoon. Most of the characters, as well as the great concourse representing the retainers of the royal pair, are students of the Kamehameha schools, and they have been drilling hard for weeks past on the chants or melees, through which the story is unfolded. The 3000 seats which have been provided surrounding the landing place of Piikea and her retinue, assures at least this number of persons seeing the drama in most comfortable manner.

**CARNIVAL SPIRIT GETS LAWMAKERS FROM BUSINESS**

A brief meeting of the board of supervisors was held last evening. Adjournment was taken a few minutes after it met that the members could take in the evening's carnival entertainment. Consequently the report of L. M. Whitehouse on the permanent street survey, giving an itemization of the expenses incurred, was not introduced. The proposition of financial retrenchment was not taken up. The meeting was postponed to Thursday night.

Engineer Whitehouse's report shows that expenses to the amount of \$109,625 have been incurred in the permanent street survey bureau for the month of January. A petition from Manoa was considered. It asked that the gore corner between upper and lower Manoa be used for park purposes and not the site of a fire station. This request was granted, the fire committee reporting that a suitable site had been found elsewhere. Governor Pinkham is to be asked to dedicate that Manoa gore as a public park.

Pila Holo was appointed janitor for Emma Square, succeeding Pine Kahalei, who died recently.


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
