RENEWED ACTIVITY FOR REPUBLICAN PARTY THE KEYNOTE OF CONVENTION

- CHIEF FEATURES OF NEW REPUBLICAN RULES
County committees to be elected by direct vote of party members.
Territorial committee to be elected at territorial convention in July.
Territorial platform to be enunciated by territorial convention.
County conventions meet two weeks after territorial convention to enunciate county platforms.
Territorial central committee has charge of all campaign literature and campaign for delegate and legislative offices.
County committees have charge of campaigns for county offices.
All reference to party patronage or endorsements for office stricken from the rules. Committees to take no hand in distribution of patronage.
Publicity must be given collection and distribution of campaign funds.

Without wasting time, the special committee named yesterday to draft into shape the revised Republican rules met this morning at the office of George G. Guild and went over the many amendments adopted yesterday. Those present were L. M. Judd, chairman; R. W. Breckons, Ed Towse, George G. Guild and William Thompson. The rules will be printed and distributed to the party members.

With renewed activity for the Republican party as the keynote of the vigorous speeches made, the convention for the revision of the rules and regulations of the Republican party came to a close yesterday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock, after a day of hard and harmonious work. The speeches were made at the close of the convention by Republicans who are confident that the party will come back into power in 1916, with all present dissenters and progressives united under its banner.

The speeches were made by Robert W. Breckons and Lorrin Andrews after the last section in the new rules of the party had been passed upon, and they were based upon a resolution introduced by George S. Curry, which protests against the threatened reduction in Hawaii's representation at national Republican conventions. The good old Republican confidence and determination permeated the speeches and roused the delegates to loud and long applause. It was with this applause still ringing in the air at the Liberty theater that the convention came to its close.

The entire rules had been gone over, section by section, some passed un-

luted, disbursed, contributed, loaned, advanced, or promised by such political committee, or any officer, member, or agent thereof, where the amount or value of such distribution, disbursement, loan, advance, or promise to any one person, firm, association, or committee in one or more items is less than ten dollars.

"Sixth—The total sum disbursed, distributed, contributed, loaned, advanced, or promised by such political committee, or any officer, member, or agent thereof."

Breckons Versus Andrews. Breckons spoke warmly in favor of the adoption of his section; Lorrin Andrews opposed it.

"This section is in line with the growing feeling for full publicity in political matters," said Mr. Breckons. "Two years ago I tried to get this rule adopted, but failed. Now if there has been any change in conditions since that time, it has more positively than ever shown the necessity of such a provision as this. Let us show the people that we are not ashamed of what we do, or who supports us. Let us throw the full light of day on our business."

"The people are entitled to know where we get our money. And we have no reason in being ashamed in showing them."

Andrews argued that the publication of the contributions before election would arm the other party; that they could use it as a club.

"There is nothing to be gained by it. We are simply showing our hands and giving the other side a chance to pick up a weapon to beat us. If there was anything to be gained I would gladly support the measure; but there is nothing to be gained."

A vote showed a large majority in favor of the section. There was a small encounter on a proposed change to prohibit a candidate being in the presence of election judges while the latter were counting the primary ballots. William Thompson argued that the candidates should be kept out of the space. Others argued that the candidate was entitled to be present to see there was fair play. Thompson lost.

The section on the division of contribution, on a 75 and 25 per cent basis, was lost. Jack Conroy of Kauai strongly opposing it. A. D. Castro, member of the rules drafting committee, spoke strongly in its favor.

The following two sections were defeated:

"Section 13. No person shall be eligible to election or to hold a proxy as delegate to more than one territorial convention in any one election campaign, and no member of any convention shall hold more than one proxy."

"Section 14. No member of the executive committee of the territorial central committee shall be endorsed or recommended for appointment to any government office during the term for which he was elected."

Mr. Breckons was the introducer of the section providing for the publication of a list of all donations made to the committee as campaign contributions, this list to be published twice—first, from 10 to 15 days previous to an election at which a delegate to Congress is to be elected; second, within 30 days after the election. The section reads: "It shall be the duty of the treasurer to keep a detailed and exact account of all money or its equivalent, received by or promised to the committee or any member thereof, or by or to any person acting under its authority or in its behalf, and the name of every person, firm, association or committee from whom received, and of all expenditures, disbursements, and promises of payment or disbursement made by the committee or any member thereof, or by any person acting under its authority or on its behalf, and to whom paid, distributed or disbursed. The treasurer shall, not more than fifteen days and not less than ten days next before an election at which a delegate to congress is to be elected, publish in some newspaper published in Honolulu an itemized detailed statement, sworn to by said treasurer; and on each sixth day thereafter until such election, said treasurer shall publish a supplemental itemized detailed statement, sworn to by said treasurer. Each of such statements shall conform to the requirements hereinafter set forth, except that the supplemental statement herein required need not contain any item of which publicity is given in a previous statement. Each of said statements shall be full and complete, and shall be signed and sworn to by said treasurer. It shall also be the duty of such treasurer to publish a similar statement within thirty days after said election, also to be signed and sworn to by said treasurer, and to conform to the requirements hereinafter set forth. Section 2. The statement herein required shall state: "First—The name and address of each person, firm, association, or committee who or which has contributed, promised, loaned, or advanced to such political committee, or any officer, member, or agent thereof, either in one or more items, money or its equivalent of the aggregate amount of value of one hundred dollars or more, and the amount or sum contributed, promised, loaned, or advanced by each. "Second—The aggregate sum contributed, promised, loaned or advanced to such political committee, or to any officer, member or agent thereof, in amounts not less than one hundred dollars. "Third—The total sum of all contributions, promises, loans, and advances received by such political committee or any officer, member or agent thereof. "Fourth—The name and address of each person, firm, association, or committee to whom such political committee, or any officer, member or agent thereof, has distributed, disbursed, contributed, loaned, advanced, or promised any sum of money or its equivalent of the amount or value of amount or sum distributed, disbursed, contributed, loaned, advanced, or promised to each, and the purpose thereof. "Fifth—The aggregate sum distri-
