PALAMA'S WORK FOR HEALTH IS MUCH PRAISED

President Pratt Writes Letter Lauding Campaign Against Tuberculosis in Honolulu

Thanking Palama Settlement for the work it is doing to combat tuberculosis, Dr. J. S. B. Pratt, president of the board of health, has written the following letter to Headworker James A. Rath:

Honolulu, March 13, 1914.
Mr. J. A. Rath,
Superintendent, Palama Settlement, Honolulu.
Dear Mr. Rath:
Regret very much that it was impossible for me to attend your annual meeting for I should have liked to have had the opportunity to publicly thank the officers of the Settlement and yourself for the assistance your district nurses have given the board of health.

In the campaign against tuberculosis and infectious nature of the diseases the nurses have all been a very valuable aid to the health department. It is not my desire to pick out any particular nurse for all have done good work, but particular mention might be made at this time of the work done by your district nurse in the Kewalo and Kakaako district in connection with the cases of diphtheria which have occurred in that district. In treating absent school children and finding suspicious cases this nurse has been a great help.

Kindly extend to the officers of the Settlement and the district nurses the thanks of the board of health for their assistance in the prevention of disease.

MAUI NEWS

WAILUKU, Maui, March 16.—The "brighten up" motion picture entertainment at the Kahului Lyceum on Saturday evening was greatly enjoyed by many people from Central Maui. The pictures were excellent and showed what the campaign for better looking houses and places of business can accomplish.

After the entertainment was over the floor was cleared and dancing was enjoyed by everyone present. The music was good and something close to \$20 was netted for the benefit of the Kula sanatorium. A small admission was charged for the dance, while the entertainment by the pictures was free.

The semi-annual association meeting of the Maui Evangelical churches will be held at Lahaina beginning March 25th. The first day will be devoted entirely to work for the ministers. Various papers dealing with subjects pertaining to the minister's work will be presented, sermon outlines discussed, and Bible study carried on in different parts of the day. A portion of the time will be devoted to a ministerial retreat such as has been in vogue for some years past in large centers in the states. The regular work of the convention will be Thursday at which time the association of churches, Endeavor societies, and Sunday schools will be fully organized. It is expected that a number of representatives from the Hawaiian board of missions will be present to take part in the sessions.

Yesterday was Maunaloa seminary day at the Pala Union church. The Pala church people greatly appreciated the innovation and turned out in large numbers to hear the interesting exercises. Rev. A. Craig Bowditch, the pastor of the church, delivered a most interesting address upon the history of the seminary.

PUBLIC UTILITIES IN POSITION TO STUDY THE DETAILS OF BUSINESS

As a result of the initial investigation of the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company, the public utilities commission now is in a position to study in detail the accounts and methods of the company. This fact was pointed out this morning by E. A. Mott-Smith, chairman of the commission, when asked as to the extent of the progress made during the probe which included the questioning of J. A. Kennedy, president and manager of the company, by the chairman.

"The initial hearing began the project of disclosing the methods of handling the accounts and the business of the company," said Mr. Mott-Smith. "The testimony given by Mr. Kennedy was entirely frank and responsive and conveyed a great deal of the information which the commission was seeking to secure for its records."

Attorney C. R. Hemenway, who, with Mr. Kennedy, appeared as representative for the company, did not enter into the discussion except in one or two instances where the question put to Mr. Kennedy by the chairman did not appear quite clear. The examination was conducted rapidly, and a broad scope covered. The next meeting will be held subject to a call from the chair, of which three days' public notice will be given. Commissioner J. N. S. Williams will arrive in Honolulu from Hilo next Thursday, at which time the commissioners will be assigned their duties for personal investigation of the company's affairs.

PUBLICITY FOR HAWAII PROMISED THROUGH WORK OF MOVIE COMPANY

Hawaii is likely to get some excellent advertising through the work of Henry McRae and his company of moving picture artists, who arrived last week and are now beginning to turn out pictures for the Universal Film Company, one of the biggest concerns of the kind in the world. The company will have its people in the islands for four months or more, and practically everything made during this time will have a Hawaiian background—"local color" as Mr. McRae puts it.

One of the first things which Mr. McRae has in mind, is the historical story of the capture by Kamehameha the Great, of the island of Oahu, by which he completed his conquest of the islands and brought all Hawaii under one rule, and according to McRae's outline the result will be a highly spectacular one. The artist has certainly been delving profoundly into Hawaiian history lately, for he has an intimacy with early Hawaiian happenings that would put to shame a large part of the kamaaina residents.

As planned by Mr. McRae this production will open with the capture of John Young and his sailor companion by Kamehameha, and their imprisonment as artillerymen in the conqueror's army. The scene of this event is laid on the island of Hawaii, and it will show in detail the exciting events connected with the capture of the several small canons which proved so important to Kamehameha in his subsequent operations.

The landing of Kamehameha and his army on Oahu will be one of the spectacular features. This, as planned by Mr. McRae will take place somewhere out beyond Diamond Head, where the background will be substantially the same as must have been that at Waikiki at the time of the
