MAUI NEWS

[Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence]
WAILUKU, Maui, April 11. — Vice-President R. A. Wadsworth called the meeting of the Maui Chamber of Commerce together on Thursday afternoon last. There was no important matter up for discussion, but before the meeting was over, however, there was considerable discussion over matters of importance.

Supervisor Henning spoke particularly concerning the large reduction in the income of the county, saying that this year only \$200,000 were available as against \$400,000 last year. D. C. Lindsay then wanted to know how it would be possible for the county to pay interest on the bonds if the citizens voted for the public improvements called for in the plebiscite. There was some little discussion of the matter on the part of Supervisor Henning, who ended his remarks by saying that "the expenditure of the county must be cut to meet the income." County Attorney Case then asked if the Chamber of Commerce was in session to do politics, and with that rather pointed question, the matter was dropped.

The breakwater at Nawiliwili harbor on Kauai and a public improvement at the Hilo harbor were both referred to the Maui chamber for support in getting the appropriations through Congress. The matter was then brought up of the breakwater at Kahului harbor, and a letter was read from Jack Desha, secretary of the committee, which said that nothing more could be obtained at present in the way of appropriation from Congress through their committees, but more information was desired from Maui concerning the full details in reference to the Kahului harbor improvements. The matter of securing these details was referred by vote to the secretary, D. H. Case.

On Monday evening last the Alexander House Gymnasium committee met at the gymnasium. Quite a few matters of interest to the Gym. were brought up for action, the principal item being the possibility of repairing and painting the roof. After some discussion as to the best kind of paint to use on such a roof, it was voted to use grapholium, and the job of taking the roof and repainting was given by contract to Mr. E. H. Wilkins, who has already begun on the work. Several basketball games are scheduled for the near future, and a big dance is planned for the night of the Fourth, July after the races. The arrangements for the matches and the basketball ball games is left to the athletic committee of the Gym, of whom Dan T. Carey is chairman.

At Kahului on Wednesday evening there will be a public reception tendered Rev. and Mrs. Howard Harris. Mr. Harris preached his first sermon at Kahului last Sunday morning. At the meeting of the standing committee of the church it was decided that beginning with the first Sunday after Easter services would be held in the evening. It is expected that the new arrangement will suit a large number of people who are not able always to attend the morning service.

Mrs. A. Rodrigues of Wailuku, half-sister of Miss Mary E. Hoffman, died last Friday evening. She was only 27 years of age and leaves a family of five small children besides her husband to mourn her loss.

Judge W. A. McKay has sold his Kahala property bought some months ago as a basis for the enlargement of his dairy farm. Frank Correa is said to be the purchaser at \$5,400.

SAY SUGAR TRUST IS RUINING THEM

Louisiana Planters Ask President and Congress to Come to Rescue

[By Latest Mail]
WASHINGTON, D. C. — Senator Thornton of Louisiana and Donelson Caffery, son of former Senator Caffery of that state, submitted to President Wilson copies of a bitter attack on the sugar trust for its methods in Louisiana, declared to be ruining the sugar industry there. The same petition was presented to the house and senate, its arguments being directed toward a request that Congress consider the grave situation that is being caused by the methods of the trust and take action that will stop the strangulation of an industry.

The petition points out that the history of the trust in the past is being investigated in the courts, in the dissolution suit that is pending, but that a catastrophe will be caused in Congress does not take cognizance of the oppressive methods of the trust at the present time in Louisiana, pending final adjudication of the government's suit.

Ask Inquiry by Congress.
Congress is asked to make investigation to determine if the charges against the trust are true, and is further asked to make the investigations by the proposed interstate trade commission with respect to the monopolization of markets for the necessities of life more weighty than is now proposed by giving its findings of fact the effect of prima facie proof; likewise to amend the other trust bills so that it shall be criminal not only to enhance the price of merchandise to consumers, but to depress the price of raw materials to producers, as the trust is alleged to do in Louisiana. The president promised to consider the material laid before him.

Representative McCoy of New Jersey today laid before the president the draft of a bill he is to press in Congress prohibiting foreign trusts from operating in the United States, but allowing independent business concerns, not doing business as trusts, according to this bill, will not be allowed selling agents in the United States at all. The president promised to consider the provisions of the bill. Life Member of Press Club.

The Denver Press Club today gave to President Wilson a gold card of life membership in that organization, one of the most notable in the west. State Senator J. J. Tierney, a newspaper man, presented the card, a solid plate of gold two and one-half by four inches, and accompanying him were Senator Shafroth and Representative Seidomridge.

The president received an invitation today from the Kentucky Educational Society to attend a state educational conference in Louisville in May. The invitation, fortified by a joint resolution of the state legislature, was presented by John W. Barr and Pratt Dale, who were introduced by Senator James.

President Wilson has nominated John K. Sague of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., to be appraiser of merchandise at New York, and Vincent H. Riordan, Buffalo, N. Y., to be collector of internal revenue for the 28th district of New York.
