HARRY HOLT NOW IS U. S. MARSHAL PRO TEM

With the death of Eugene R. Hendry, a new candidate for the United States marshalship has appeared in the arena, in the person of Harry H. Holt, chief deputy in the marshal's office for the past six years. It is generally believed that Holt is a formidable factor in the race. His record has been good, and through the illness for much of the past year of his chief, the burden of the office has during this time been largely upon his shoulders, and the consensus of opinion seems to be that he has made good.
Holt was this morning sworn in as marshal pro tem, by Judge Dole of the United States district court. Bond was given in the sum of \$20,000, as required, and approved by the court.
Following the execution of Holt's bond, with the United States Fidelity & Guaranty Company, of Baltimore, as surety in the sum of \$20,000, Judge Dole made a brief statement of appreciation of the late Marshal Hendry. The devotion which the deceased had always shown in the discharge of his duty, his watchfulness over details, and his infinite tact, which had resulted in pleasant relations with all interests which came in contact with the office, were points touched upon by the court in his remarks.
Holt's Chance to Continue.
Considerable interest was manifested among court officials and others today, over Harry Holt's chances of receiving the marshal's office. Holt is undoubtedly well-liked, and the fact that he was given the vacancy appointment by concurrent action of both Judge Dole and Judge Clemons, indicates that the court has faith in his ability and integrity, particularly so since there is no knowing how long it may be that the office will be so filled. It was stated by some that the appointment was not necessary and that Holt might have continued to exercise the duties of marshal, under his appointment as first deputy. Judge Dole and Judge Clemons on this point stated this morning that although there is an old law providing for this procedure, and for holding the bondsmen of the deceased marshal until a regular appointment was made, there is a new statute authorizing the appointment by the court of a marshal to hold until the regular appointment is made, and while this statute does not expressly repeal the old law, they preferred to consider it as having done so.
Neither Judge Dole nor Judge Clemons was willing to express himself in the matter of the permanent marshal, and while it is possible that their preference may be consulted, it is understood that thus far it has not been. Having been appointed under the Republican administration, neither of the local federal judges can expect his views to have any weight from a political standpoint.
Jeff McCann, U. S. District Attorney, whose recommendation was expected to have double weight in Washington from the fact that his office is closely allied to that of the marshal, and also because of the fact that he himself is a part of the present Democratic administration, also declined to make any statement as to whom he has or may recommend for the marshalship. He is reported to have recently stated, however, that he has not yet recommended anybody for the place.
Palmer P. Woods, who has been mentioned as the most likely Democratic candidate, it is understood, is likely to meet with opposition from within the ranks of his party in Hawaii, if he has not already. Mr. Fenwick, who has been spoken of for the place, is a Republican, and it is not believed that he has much chance against Holt, should a Republican be appointed.

BOARD OF HEALTH YELLOW FEVER CAMPAIGN WINS

The meeting of the territorial board of health yesterday afternoon was a success mainly by the report of President J. S. R. Pratt on the mosquito campaign, which shows that during the entire 12-month period, the percentage of Stegomyia calopus, the yellow fever carrier, has been much lower than six per cent. Experience at Lanaina, and scientific investigations, have brought out that a district with only six per cent or less of the carriers is safe from becoming infected with yellow fever.

Some correspondence exchanged between the board and Dr. James T. Wayson, city and county physician, and in charge of the Kalia leprosy station, was read, and action on it was deferred over the objection of George R. Carter, member of the board. This is the first meeting of the board as held for two weeks, and consequently quite a bit of routine business was disposed of by the board on Lanai. This is the first agent that has been appointed for that place. Doctors Heppner, Ayre and Dismore were given licenses to practice medicine. The board granted the request, on condition of the Libby, McNeill & Libby Company to pump pineapple waste into the sewer. The condition is that the sewer is to be flushed out to its full length, using a minimum of 300,000 gallons of water a day.
