TAFT BACKS UP WILSON POLICY WITH MEXICO

NEW YORK, May 18.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—Former President William H. Taft, in an address here last night at the Free Synagogue as a feature of the peace celebration, expressed little hope that the mediation move by the South American republics to settle the difficulties between the United States and Mexico would accomplish much but asserted that the offer of mediation was an important step toward the future settlement of international difficulties. He declared that the people of the United States are determined to do their duty even if it comes to war. Taft severely criticized the administration for favoring the rebels, declaring that it was bringing this country nearer to intervention. He graphically pictured a long, expensive and unpopular war and urged the support of the President in his efforts to find a way of restoring peace in Mexico.

HUERTA ENVOYS DINE AT SPANISH EMBASSY

WASHINGTON, May 17.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—The Mexican delegates named by Huerta to the peace congress to be conducted by the South American mediators in an attempt to adjust the differences between the United States and Mexico were guests of honor last night at a dinner given by the Spanish embassy. All the South American mediators were present, as were the American commissioners and numerous Mexican, Spanish and Mexican officials.

Secretary of State Bryan was unable to attend owing to an engagement previously made to witness a Greek peasant given for charity. The Mexican delegates will leave for New York tomorrow and on Tuesday will proceed to Niagara Falls.

REFUGEES, FROM MANZANILLO, TELL OF OUTRAGES

Steamer Cetriana Makes Good Escape from Harbor With Americans Aboard

SAN FRANCISCO, May 18.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—The British steamer Cetriana arrived here yesterday with 150 refugees from Manzanillo, Mexico, and reports the murder of a score of Americans in that city, the capture of the American brig Geneva by the Mexican transport Korrgan, and the imprisonment of American Consul Edwards at Acapulco.

Rifle fire was directed at the Cetriana by the Mexicans as the vessel steamed away from Manzanillo, many of the bullets striking the ship but causing no injury to passengers or crew. The escape of the Cetriana was daring and skillful and was resolved upon by the commander when he became convinced that the Mexicans were preparing to burn the ship by firing and dynamiting the wharves.

S. S. GENEVA CAPTURED BUT RELEASED LATER

On arrival of the United States cruiser Raleigh, the crew of the Geneva escaped in small boats and rowed to the Cetriana, which had moored under the protection of the cruiser's guns. Upon representations from the commander of the Raleigh the Geneva was released by the Mexicans and sailed for Grays Harbor.

FEDERALS BLOW UP BRIDGE NEAR VERA CRUZ

WASHINGTON, May 18.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—Brigadier-general Funston, in command of the land forces at Vera Cruz, reports that Mexicans yesterday blew up the Inter-Oceanic railway bridge 28 miles from Vera Cruz. The bridge spanned the Antigua river.

COL. GOETHALS 'CZAR' OF THE CANAL ZONE

WASHINGTON, May 17.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—President Wilson yesterday empowered Col. George W. Goethals, governor of the Panama canal zone, to grant pardons and reprieves for offenses against the Canal zone laws, to commute sentences and remit fines.

Varied and Well-Chosen Program is Rendered by Youthful Master of Violin

Mischa Elman charmed a large audience Saturday night at his second concert in Honolulu with a varied and exceedingly well-chosen program. Mendelssohn's "Concerto in E Major," the opening number, was followed by Schubert's "Serenade" as an encore. The second number, "Faust Fantasy," Wieniawski, showed to perfection that flute-like quality of tone which is one of the characteristics of Mischa Elman's playing. This was received by the audience with long-continued applause to which the violinist responded with "Mediation," from "Thals," Massenet, interpreted with great depth and pathos.

MANY ABANDON HOMES AND FLEE FOR LIVES

Mexicans at Manzanillo are highly inflamed against Americans, believing that the occupation of Vera Cruz by the American forces meant the beginning of war against Mexico by the United States. Anger against the Cetriana was engendered by the fact that many Americans who had been compelled to abandon their homes fled to the ship and under the protection of the British flag in fear for their lives. The brig Geneva previously had escaped from the harbor but became becalmed outside, was overtaken by the transport and towed back into the harbor. The members of the crew were held prisoners on the ship for a week.

HUERTA ENVOYS ARE PAYING SOCIAL CALLS

WASHINGTON, May 18.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—The Huerta delegates to their mediation congress departed yesterday for Niagara Falls by way of New York. It was learned yesterday that the real mission of the Huerta representatives is to present the broad question of how to pacify Mexico. President Wilson and Secretary of State Bryan are reported to concur in this attitude. The Mexicans yesterday conferred with the South American mediators as well as with the American delegates and left cards at the home of Secretary Bryan, who reciprocated. The Huerta delegates declined quarters which had been engaged for them by the state department.
