**'THE BARRIER' IS STRONG DRAMA,
ABLY PRESENTED BY 'THE PLAYERS'**

Each Member of Cast Scores Big Success in Rex Beach's Drama of the Far North

The Players' or, as the P. A. (meaning press agent) is inclined to name the aggregation, "The Players All-Star Company," gets a perfect score in the production for the first half of the present week. In other words, each and every member of the cast is hitting 1000 and playing in major league style. The P. A. is correct. It is an "all-star" company in its portrayal of Rex Beach's drama of the land of the Great White Silence. Each individual in the company is well cast in "The Barrier." Each is afforded an opportunity to do his best work and each accepts the chance and should be given credit for an assist.

Of course, Miss Florence Oakley and George Webb are cast in the leading roles and they each do as good work as in anything they have essayed in Honolulu. However, all the parts are "big" and all the players do equally as good work as the leads. Guy Hittner is particularly good as John Gale, as are Huron Blyden as Dan Stark and Jack Belgrave as Poleon. Miss Marie Baker has been seen before in the role of a squaw, all the comment necessary being the mere statement that her work is equally as good in "The Barrier" as it was on the previous occasion.

The members of the cast were letter perfect last night, a most refreshing novelty in "stock" as has been noticed during the engagement of Mr. Webb's players, where the opening performance of any bill is usually a trifle rough. In "The Barrier" there is not the slightest opportunity for adverse criticism, even those cast in "thinking" parts being perfect.

Love and Hate in Far North.

In "The Barrier" Rex Beach has written of love and hate in the topmost portion of Alaska. John Gale is depicted with his "back against the Arctic Circle," having spent 20 years in an endeavor to escape arrest for a crime of which he is innocent. Gale is a snow-man and, with the aid of his faithful squaw, has reared Neela, a beautiful girl, the daughter of the woman Gale loved and who was murdered when Neela was a babe in arms. Gale's rival for the love of Neela's mother, Dan Stark, who committed the murder and shouldered the blame on Gale, appears as a "slain jumper" at Gale's trading post, Flambau, on the Yukon river. Stark recognizes Gale and Gale thinks he knows Stark. Each is afraid of the other.

Both Stark and Gale are opposed to the presence of Captain Burrell, U. S. Army, who has been sent into the gold country to establish law and order, and take away from the pioneers the right of administering summary justice. Burrell falls in love with Neela and would make her his wife until he is told that she is a half-breed, the girl believing Gale to be her father and Allana her mother. With this news his blue-blood rebels and, thinking of his folk back in Kentucky, he tries to decide which is the better course to follow, the dictates of the little love god or those of the social system, on "the outside" of which he is a member and with which he is closely allied. The heart wins and Burrell decides to make Neela his wife, resign from the service and cast his lot with the hardy miners of the Yukon country.

In the meantime Neela has learned of her parentage, learned that she is not a half-breed, while Gale has decided to see Burrell question him as to his intentions toward Neela and then surrender himself to the young army officer for trial on the charge of murder. During Gale's visit to Burrell's quarters Stark puts in an appearance and Gale hides in an adjoining room. Stark endeavors to force Burrell to arrest Gale, which Burrell refuses to do, ordering Stark to leave Flambau, together with his partner, Runnion, on the first outgoing boat.

Intensely Interesting Drama.

Gale enters the quarters of the army officer, telling Stark he has come to keep his vow—that he would kill the murderer of his sweetheart. A fight ensues in which Stark falls with a mortal wound. Burrell declares that Gale acted in self defense and forces Stark, in his dying statement, to exonerate Gale of the murder charge, make known the parentage of Neela and straighten out the numerous complex situations of the play.

From initial to final curtain "The Barrier" is intensely interesting, full of action and strong situations, without even bordering on the melodramatic. While the U. S. Army plays a conspicuous part and comes in for considerable applause it is not found necessary to resort to the use of the flag to make good. Rex Beach has given us a drama that is close to nature, one that is true to life. It tells of the loves and hates of real people and tells of them in splendid fashion. The players have taken the wealth of material and presented it in first class style. They put across one of the best bills they have attempted since coming to Honolulu.

During last night's performance it was necessary, on a number of occasions, to stop the action of the play until the applause had died down. The work of the company was greatly appreciated and rightly so.

"The Barrier" will afford to anyone a splendid evening's entertainment.
