SHINGLE STATES HE IS NOT A KUHIO RIVAL

Says He's Not Delegate Candidate—Will Fight Here in Ranks for Party

(By Latest Mail)
WASHINGTON, California secured many large sums in the naval appropriation bill to the senate today by the senate naval affairs committee.

Chief among the appropriations handed out for the states was \$104,000 to entertain the foreign fleets that will assemble at Hampton Roads, Va., and sail through the Panama canal to attend the Panama-Pacific exposition. Reimbursement of tolls through the Panama canal for these war ships is provided.

Mare island fares well in the bill. To complete the quay wall \$20,000 is allowed; for the electric lighting system \$10,000, and to complete dredging the straits \$257,000 is appropriated.

Other appropriations are: Yacht Basca training station, \$70,000; fuel oil station, San Francisco bay, \$500,000; to be available until expended; with \$100,000 immediately available; dry dock at Hunter's point, to be constructed by the Union Iron Works, \$50,000 dockage annually for six years.

Other appropriations for the Pacific coast are: Fuel oil station at San Diego, \$50,000, and coaling tower, San Diego, \$45,000. Completing building at Puget Sound navy yard, \$175,000. For four radio stations, one each on the California coast, Panama canal zone, Hawaiian islands and Philippines, \$400,000.

For the naval station at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, \$7000.

The limit of cost of the drydock at Pearl Harbor is increased to \$4,985,500.

Care of letters, Guam and Cuyan to lands, \$14,000.

Robert W. Shingle is not a candidate for delegate. In a statement given to the press, he states that he has decided not to run for the place. The following is his statement:

"I have been urged by many Republicans to seek a nomination for delegate on the Republican ticket this fall and have been assured of their hearty support. The matter has been given very careful consideration by me, and I have also consulted with my friends and business associates in regard to the matter.

"I have finally determined that under no circumstances will I be a candidate, and, in order that there may be no misunderstanding on the subject by anyone, desire that this statement be made public. My action is taken solely for personal and business reasons. It is not prompted in the slightest degree by any fear of what the result might be if I were to receive the nomination. This year looks very much to me as though it would be a Republican year on the mainland, and in Hawaii it is bound to be such. So strong do Republican ideas prevail in the territory that I feel whoever receives the Republican nomination is sure of election. With a leader better equipped than I—and there are many available in the ranks of our party—Republican success is doubly assured.

"Progressive following in this territory will be negligible. The thinking people of these islands quite fully recognize that the Progressive movement can only aid in returning to Congress as delegate a member of the Democratic party—the party whose policies as already applied to Hawaii have brought about the greatest depression, and a party whose program of free sugar, already written into law, will unquestionably give these islands a setback which will take a great many years to recover from.

"I wish to express my sincere thanks to the very considerable number of Republican friends who have tendered me their support. I wish to say to them, too, that while I shall be found in the ranks, my support of our party will be no less sincere, earnest and energetic than were I at the head of the ticket."

OAKLAND CLUB GOOD ONE FOR THOSE WHO ARE MINUS LIMBS
