### SCHOOL STREET EXTENSION UP AGAIN THURSDAY

The board of supervisors will hold the third public hearing on the proposed extension of School street Thursday evening at 7:30 o'clock. The hearing will take place in the chamber of the supervisors.

The board has learned that there is a growing opposition to the proposed extension, which, it is planned, will be made under the provisions of the direct frontage tax statute. Several property owners in the district are asserting that the cost of the work will mean an excessive tax on their lands, one that is greater than the benefit to be derived from the improvement.

The first two meetings on this subject did not get far. The majority of the property owners present evidenced a fundamental ignorance of the law. The supervisors state that they do not wish to force this improvement through if it is against the wishes of the property owners; but they say before acting one way or another they wish to be sure that the property owners know what they are voting for or against.

The supervisors made arrangements yesterday to lease the corner store of the Kapiolani building. This place will be used for offices of the water and sewer works. The garbage department may be moved in the building also, or it may be given the present quarters of the city and county treasurer, allowing the treasurer to make use of part of the building just leased.

David K. Naole, who was found guilty of a statutory offense yesterday afternoon was sentenced to six months imprisonment by Judge Clemons. Naole was also ordered to pay the costs of the suit. The jury retired at half past three and were only out ten minutes.

### FIELD WINS; HIS FIGURES ARE ACCEPTED

the small sum of \$2,586.59. This amount will not have to be written off as hopelessly lost, as Field has made clear in his report to the commission that county warrants may still be dug up from the records which were not turned over by the county auditor to him, which will even clear up this small discrepancy.

The statement is as follows:  
Comparative statement, showing reconciliation of disbursements by county treasurer with warrants issued for same and registered by county auditor, taken from the entries in the books of these officials and the itemized schedules of irregularities in accounts contained in the report of M. Gooding Field, auditor, to the Hawaii County Investigation Commission:

1. County treasurer's statement of warrants received and transfers to funds, from July 1, 1905, to March 31, 1913:

General fund warrants received and transfers to funds, \$1,961,729.40.  
Road tax special deposit warrants redeemed and transfers to funds, \$1,084,298.46.

Permanent improvement warrants redeemed, \$74,702.38.  
School fund warrants redeemed, \$20,791.12.

Totals, \$3,141,521.36.

2. County auditor's statement of warrants registered and transfers from funds, from July 1, 1905, to March 31, 1913:

General fund warrants registered, \$1,165,999.13.

Road tax special deposit warrants registered, \$1,083,877.22.

Total warrants registered, \$2,249,876.45.

Add:

Transfers from road funds, \$793,450.02.

Transfers from permanent improvements fund, \$108,908.17.

Transferred from school fund, \$10,000.00.

Total transfers from funds, \$912,356.19.

Add:

Warrants redeemed by county treasurer, but not entered in register of warrants by county auditor (see schedule, No. 22, Field's report to commission), \$1,758.77.

Less outstanding warrants as reported to Hawaii County Investigation Commission (see schedules 31 and 32, Field's report to commission), \$18,981.46.

Totals, \$3,144,107.95.

Summary—

County auditor's records show warrants registered and transfers from funds, less outstanding warrants, \$3,144,107.95.

County treasurer's records show warrants registered and transfers to funds, \$3,141,521.36.

Difference, explained in note below, \$2,586.59.

Note: To the above difference of \$2,586.59, interest charges on registered warrants should be added to the county auditor's statement, but as no record of these amounts were kept by that official, this item could not be ascertained. The variances between the county treasurer's figures (which are correct) and those of the county auditor, may very likely be located in warrants still outstanding. The records of the county auditor, however, are in such a deplorable condition that it is impossible to arrive at a closer reconciliation than the above one.

The above statement has been examined and found correct by us, and we concur in the above remarks as to variances in figures.

On folio 336, of Field's report to the Hawaii County Investigation Commission, the following notation was made by him:

"A number of the general fund warrants issued in the years 1906 to 1911, and appearing on the books of the county auditor as outstanding as of March 31, 1913, might have been paid by the county treasurer but no entry was made of such payments by the county auditor."

On folio 322, in Field's report to the commission, referring to warrants entered in register of county auditor, purporting to have been issued, for which no record was found showing that the warrants had been issued or paid by the county treasurer (Schedule, No. 25 in report, Field stated as under:

"Warrants, from No. 3000—November 30, 1906—to No. 3489—December 31, 1908—road funds, East Hawaii, were missing from the records of the county auditor. These warrants had been duly cashed by the county treasurer."

The information contained in the foregoing notations will account for the small difference, given in the above comparative statement compiled by Field, and certified correct by the county treasurer and special auditor, of the county of Hawaii respectively.
