CHANGES MADE IN TRAFFIC BILL BY SUPERVISORS

Accumulating protests against the new traffic ordinance caused the board of supervisors to take up the ordinance last night for suggestion and amendment. A number of changes were made upon the request of interested citizens who addressed the board, among whom were George W. Smith, H. P. Wichman, C. Du Roi and George G. Guild, the latter talking particularly in favor of the opening of Tantalus road to autos.

One of the apparent blunders in the ordinance was corrected when the board amended the section ordering lights to be burned during the day. Hereafter they need only be lit at night. It was decided to open Tantalus road, where signs will be put up and some repairs made. It was also decided to amend Section 34, relating to leaving vehicles in the special traffic district, which is as follows: King and Hotel streets, between River and Alakea streets, Fort street from Queen to Beretania street. As the ordinance is now amended, cars can be left unattended for half an hour on Fort street between 8 a. m. and 10 p. m.

Much other routine business was attended to. Notification was given of a 5-year lease with the Kapolani Estate for the use of the corner store space in the Kapolani building, the rental of this and the present treasurer's office in the same building to be \$200 a month. This new space will be used for the water works and sewers departments when they are transferred from the territory on June 15.

PROGRESSIVES OF MANOA FORM PRECINCT CLUB

Begin Work With Intention of Being Factor in the Next Election

Manoa Progressives formally organized themselves into a precinct club last night at the residence of Charles R. Frazier, Manoa valley, the third precinct of the fourth district. Geo. R. Carter, chairman of the provisional committee of the Progressive party of Hawaii, was present and delivered a strong address in which he outlined the plans of the Progressives in this territory and discussed the rules under which the party will work.

That the Progressives mean business was evidenced by the earnestness and enthusiasm of those present at last night's meeting and their desire to begin work immediately for the good of the party. A caucus will be made at once of Manoa for membership in the club.

The birthday of King George V. was observed today by the British consul, who received foreign consuls resident and officers of the army and navy at his home on Beretania street this morning.

Major-general Carter and his aide, Lieutenant Pillow, Rear-admiral Moore, accompanied by his aide, Lieutenant Lando, Colonel W. C. Rafferty, accompanied by Captains Winn, Taylor, Stanton and Waller of the Coast Defense of Oahu, Captain J. B. Dougherty, N. G. H., representing Governor Pinkham and Lieutenants Crockett and Goetz, representing General Edwards, were among those who paid their respects to King George's local representative this morning.

MISS MCCARTHY BEATS MISS MANNING AT TENNIS

Although the score indicates a rather one-sided match the contest between Miss Martha McCarthy and Miss Mary Manning in the McKinley High School girls' singles tennis tournament, held yesterday afternoon, afforded those present an exciting time. NEW INFANTRY PACK USED BY 2ND INFANTRY FOR THE FIRST TIME

The 3rd battalion of the 2nd Infantry, commanded by Major H. O. Williams, marched from Fort Shafter this morning at 7 o'clock, bound for the eastern end of the island, in the neighborhood of Ni'u ridge, for three weeks of field training. The four companies of foot soldiers carried the new infantry equipment, being the first soldiers on Oahu to hike with the pack instead of the blanket roll, and the water bottle instead of the old canteen.

The officer escorted George Marshall, colored, alleged to be a deserter from the United States army, to central police station this morning. It is reported that Marshall is wanted by the military authorities and that a substantial reward had been offered for his apprehension. Marshall was found dressed in civilian clothes at Aala park.

Jose Rivera is held in detention at police station charged with being armed with a knife. Rivera was placed under arrest last evening, it being alleged that he was attempting to enter doors of business houses along the streets bordering on the city fish market. When questioned by police officers, he offered a variety of excuses and was taken to the station for investigation. While being searched, it is stated that the man reached into his pocket and concealed a small knife in the palm of his hand.

Cooper and John Silva, injured at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon by falling off the running board of a Rapid Transit car proceeding along King street near the intersection of Mauna Kea street, while badly bruised about the body, will recover. Baker received a deep gash on each leg, one member being fractured at the thigh. The boys were returning from Alexander Field sports and were clinging to the outside of the car when they collided with a heavily loaded truck. No blame has been attached to the driver of the vehicle.

Governor Pinkham had a conference with the license commissioners yesterday and it is believed that the matter of the "Volcano House" saloon at Lilehua was discussed. The commissioners were, it is said, informed by the governor that everything pertaining to the liquor trade was in their hands to manage as they thought fit.

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
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
