## 'RAFFLES' IS GOOD OFFERING AND WELL PRESENTED BY 'THE PLAYERS'

Story of Amateur Cracksman Full of Action and Work of Cast Exceedingly Good

So excellent was the presentation of "Raffles" by "The Players" at the Bijou theater last night, that the members of the audience almost forgave the performers for the delay in opening the show—the curtain rising promptly at 8:50—also for the lengthy wait of about a half hour between acts, two and three; fortunately the sole change of scenery for the production.

Action is the keynote of the entire four acts, which tell the story of the amateur cracksman who puts his brain against Scotland Yard and steals for the mere pleasure of stealing—always returning to his victim the spoils of the "chase."

George Webb in the title part is at his best, while Florence Oakley, as the girl with whom Raffles falls in love, is exceptionally clever. The love scenes between Webb and Miss Oakley are exceedingly well handled.

The story of the play opens with Raffles and Bedford meeting at the home of Lord Ameresteth where they are guests, together with a selected party of the British elite and a woman who has "loved Raffles in the past. That love is renewed when they meet at Milchester Abbey and, irrespective of the fact that she is the wife of another, Mrs. Vidal yearns for Raffles' love, which has been lost to Gwendolin Conron.

Being cognizant of Raffles' identity as the "amateur cracksman" about whom all London is raving, Mrs. Vidal determines upon his undoing and, throwing in her lot with Captain Bedford agrees to identify him in case he is arrested.

Raffles realizes that there are too many against him and that the chase is almost ended. He is preparing to leave England and return to his native "Never-never" land of Australia, when Gwendolin appears upon the scene to warn him of his impending capture by Bedford. She, however, arrives too late. Raffles makes a full confession to her and refuses to ruin her life which he believes would be the result of an alliance with him.

It is natural that it was up to Mr. Webb or his carpenter to see to it that the local man was on time. Honolulu is not New York and when Mr. Webb contracted for the local engagement he must have been aware that the local stage hands were not in the same class with those in a large city. Mr. Webb, undoubtedly, has not spent his entire thespian career in the larger cities and should have been conversant with the drawbacks of "tanks." It would appear that Mr. Webb should have reckoned with these conditions and made his plans accordingly.

In his talk Mr. Webb stated that it was his desire to put on the best possible production in the best possible style, avoiding all faking. That is most commendable and his plan has been carried out to a large extent. Good shows have been the order of things during the engagement of this organization. A majority have been most acceptably presented. A few have been poor. In the majority the work of the company has been excellent, individually and collectively. In a few the work of the members of the cast has been poor. The stars have fallen down on spots, as have the minors. On the whole, however, Mr. Webb has carried out his original desire.

However, Honolulu is an early show town and Mr. Webb should endeavor to start his performances a little before nine o'clock—provided, of course, he is desirous of drawing the crowds. It is a regrettable fact that he should have made such a strenuous effort to shirk the responsibility and shift it to the shoulders of the local help—the same help that has been used by other companies with much more satisfactory results.

"The Butterfly on the Wheel." Raffles will be on the boards again tonight and tomorrow night, to be followed the early part of next week with "The Butterfly on the Wheel," a strong divorce play in which Miss Oakley will be afforded a splendid opportunity for strong emotional work.

The system of distributing souvenir photographs of different members of the company was inaugurated last night, a very fine photograph of Miss Ragan being given away.

Throughout the entire four acts the chase is swift and strong, with Raffles first in the lead, then overtaken and Bedford holding the trump card. Love, jealousy and hate play conspicuous parts in the movement of the drama and each and every member of the company handles his or her part in the most satisfactory manner. The players are in perfect control of their lines throughout the entire play and the action, while the actors are on the stage, is at all times rapid. It is one of the best things The Players have done since their advent in Honolulu.
