HUERTA LOATH TO QUIT HOLD ON MEXICO

U. S. Representatives Turn Down Dictator's Latest Proposition.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ontario, June 10.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—The representatives of President Wilson attending the mediation conference announced yesterday that the United States was unwilling to extend recognition to a new provisional president of Mexico if he is named according to the method prescribed by the Mexican delegates, who suggest that Huerta appoint as ruler of his country a foreign minister to be agreed upon here until an election can be held.

According to the American representatives the administration at Washington contends that the elevation of such an appointee to the presidency of Mexico would be construed as a recognition of Huerta which President Wilson will not concede. There is a possibility that a compromise plan will be agreed on.

NEW CASHIER NAMED FOR U. OF CALIFORNIA

SAN FRANCISCO, June 10.—(Associated Press by Federal Wireless)—Robert G. Sproule, nephew of the president of the Southern Pacific railway, was yesterday appointed cashier of the comptroller's office of the University of California. Sproule succeeds Cashier Wright who is charged with embezzlement of university funds, taken in an attempt to recover losses sustained in real estate speculation.

ALL WAITS ON MCCARN DECISION

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 28.—All judicial appointments for Hawaii will be held in abeyance until the troubles of United States Attorney Jeff McCarn have been settled. The marshalship is included in the same hold-up.

This is the semi-official statement made at the department of justice. It was made plain in that connection that none of the judicial vacancies will be filled until the McCarn affair is out of the way. No explanation is given as to why the distribution of patronage must be suspended because the district attorney became involved in difficulties.

No time limit has been fixed for renewed consideration of the positions to be filled upon recommendation from Attorney-general McReynolds. The impression is conveyed that quite a period of waiting will intervene. It is hinted that a sifting out of the McCarn affair will require much time. Up to the present no determining statement of fact has been received in connection with the McCarn trouble. All reports on the subject have come from persons biased one way or the other. No conclusions have been submitted by people of standing and position who have no interest in the outcome. These are desired by the attorney-general. He does not care to review seriously the accounts given by those who either favor or dislike Mr. McCarn. He seeks the testimony of those who have no feeling in the matter and would be in a position to furnish impartial evidence. None of this kind has yet reached the department of justice. Until it comes along no decisive action will be taken in the direction of sustaining or rebuking Mr. McCarn.

It is believed that Mr. McCarn has freely expressed his views to Attorney-general McReynolds regarding the fitness and qualifications of all applicants for judicial places in Hawaii. It is thought that the apparent determination to defer appointments of that kind rests on the endorsement or disapproval of Mr. McCarn. The value of his suggestions would depend in the last analysis on the final decision in his own case.

MANOA PAVING PROJECT IS NOW IN THE BALANCE

Protests Appear and Final Decision Postponed to Later Meeting of Supervisors.

The owner of a few feet of land on the lower Manoa road holds the balance of power to decide whether that thoroughfare shall or shall not be paved under the provisions of the direct frontage tax statutes.

This fact became known last night at a meeting of the board of supervisors, when a protest against the improvement project was filed by J. L. Young, signed by property owners representing slightly more than 55 per cent of the property affected.

But one of the protesters, who was Richard Trent, put a notation under his signature, which stated that his protest stood until such time as the board of supervisors enunciated a definite and uniform policy with reference to the proportion of the cost of such work it would pay. Now that the board has announced such a policy, advocates for the improvement declare that Mr. Trent's objections are met, and that he is no longer a bona fide protestant. With his withdrawal from the protest, the objections would be short of enough signatures to bar the work, and the other side would win out.

While several of the advocates for the improvement work were present at the meeting last night, the protesters were not on hand, and this fact was commented on by different supervisors. R. R. Reidford, G. G. Guild and J. T. Warren led the discussion on behalf of the project. William W. Chamberlain of the Guardian Trust Company, representing A. P. Taylor, was present to oppose the contemplated project, though Taylor does not appear as a protestant.

Mr. Young's letter to the board reads as follows: "I hand you herewith a protest against the proposed improvement in Manoa Improvement District No. 2, a portion of east Manoa road. "It is understood that under the law a protest signed by 55 per cent of the property owners bars action. Out of 32 property owners, I hand you a list signed by 19, representing 2860.45 feet frontage, or 56 7/10 per cent of total frontage which it is proposed to improve, 810 feet of the frontage is along Manoa park, and the list of property owners signing this protest represents 67 3/4 per cent of the total frontage."

Mr. Warren spoke strongly in favor of the work.

"It is not so much a question of whether this particular work should or should not be made," he said. "We want to see some progress made in testing out the statutes. This protest was signed by several before the board announced its policy with reference to street improvement" under the frontage statute. Now that the policy is known, I am sure that those two who now appear as protestants would wish to withdraw their objections."

It was decided to hold a meeting June 17 at 7:30 o'clock, the persons protesting against the work to be given an opportunity in the meantime to reconsider their objections.

H. S. RICKARD WOULD BE SUCCESSOR OF KEALOHA

Harry S. Rickard, former member of the legislature, arrived from Laupahoehoe yesterday. He is expected to call on Governor Pinkham this afternoon to discuss his candidacy as successor to John A. Kealoha, who was a member of the board of supervisors of Maui.

Rickard has not admitted so far that he is a candidate for the place, but his friends in the city are willing to admit the fact for him. He is not out of politics by any means, and part of his business here will be to confer with party men on the subject of the new primary law. Rickard plans to run for the legislature from the first district, which comprises East Hawaii.
