HILONOTES

[Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence]
HILO, June 12.—Dr. H. B. Elliot,
chairman of the Hawaii county inves-
tigation commission, is at work on the
commission's report to the governor.
A lengthy, detailed document which
he reports is now rounding into form
and should be ready to hand the ex-
ecutive within the next two or three
weeks. One or two persons who have
seen portions of the manuscript say
it contains a number of highly valu-
able, practical suggestions for recon-
struction of the present system in
the county. Dr. Elliot of course will
confer at some length with his col-
leagues of the commission at Honolulu
before the document is finally com-
pleted. How soon he will go to Hono-
lulu for this purpose is not yet cer-
tain.

Ben Brown, deputy clerk in the
county auditor's office, announces that
he expects to strike a balance in the
books of the auditor and treasurer, a
task which H. Gooding Field, the ex-
pert accountant and record prober,
and even the special auditor, Sam
Spencer, aided by Treasurer Swain,
have given up as impossible.
Brown is working more or less un-
der the suggestion and direction of
Robert W. Breckons, who has declar-
ed stoutly that he believes the thing
can be done and that he proposes see-
ing it is done. He insists it is largely
a matter of perseverance and intelli-
gent application to the adding ma-
chine. A few days ago the discrep-
ancy of \$3,000 which H. Gooding
Field said he found between the ac-
counts of the two offices, was discov-
ered to be even larger, a number of
warrants being found that Field had
recorded as "outstanding." At last
reports the difference between the two
offices was in the neighborhood of
\$7,000. Brown says he expects to
bring his job to a successful termina-
tion early next week.

Criminal activity among the Pil-
ipinos is becoming noticeable. A crowd
of nine men of the race was gathered
in from Repulse Monday evening by
the police, following an affair in which
it appeared that seven were threaten-
ing vengeance on the other two. The
fugitives sought refuge in Joaquin
Carvalho's saloon and the proprietor
notified the authorities.
Another gang of six was captured
Tuesday night in the same district
by Special Officer S. C. Bell, who de-
tected them in the act of stealing
lumber from the sugar company's
flume. All are held pending investi-
gation.

T. Nisi Saka, a Japanese spin boy
of the Inter-Island steamer Kaimani,
committed suicide at the Mauna Kea
wharf Monday morning by bringing
himself from the rafters stretching
across the pier chute leading to the
ship steerage. He had come from
Honolulu only a few days before and
is said to have lost his job on the
vessel and become despondent in con-
sequence. The night watchman found
the body suspended there early Tues-
day morning.

A Model Road

Before long the country will have a
demonstration road of such impor-
tance and lending itself so well to
publicity that it may become the text
for many cautionary words on main-
tenance. The American Highway As-
sociation will take over the manage-
ment of a through route from Wash-
ington to Atlanta, and will provide
the facilities whereby the office of
public roads, at no expense except
the time of some of its men, may ex-
ercise supervision of the maintenance
work. The road is practically com-
pleted for the entire distance. Most
of it is macadam, but parts of it is
sand-clay. The highest praise is due
the American Highways Association for
its initiative. It is thereby aiding
materially the advance of highway
practice in the United States.—Engi-
neering Record.

**REDFIELD DENIES
IS CONSIDERING
DUTY ON SUGAR**

**Giffard & Roth Receive Author-
itative News on Possibility of
Free List Suspension**

Authoritative denial that the admin-
istration, at least so far as the depart-
ment of commerce is concerned, is
considering restoring a part of the
duty on sugar, has come to Hawaii
almost directly from Secretary of
Commerce Redfield.
It will be remembered that a re-
port was given publicly here some
weeks ago that as a result of investi-
gations by the department of com-
merce, the administration was consid-
ering either a change in the new tariff
bill or else a suspension of the free
sugar clause. Now Giffard & Roth
of this city have received direct in-
formation that no such conclusion has
been reached by the department of
commerce.
J. Barth & Co., the well-known San
Francisco brokers, correspondents of
Giffard & Roth, have sent a letter
to the latter firm containing copies
of telegrams between the San Fran-
ciscans and Secretary Redfield. The
important ones are as follows:
Telegram from J. Barth & Co. to
Secretary Redfield on June 2:
"Reported in San Francisco Chron-
icle that you said you had not made
any investigation or report on sugar
industry and did not contemplate do-
ing so; that Democratic leaders de-
nied rumor that they were consider-
ing restoring part of duty on sugar.
Is this interview correct? Please an-
swer collect."
Secretary Redfield was out of
Washington when the telegram reach-
ed his office but immediately on his
return telegraphed as follows:
"Telegram of second seen first time
today. Know nothing of interview in
Chronicle. Have no knowledge that
anyone is considering restoring part
of sugar duty."

A Great Canal Builder

In speaking of the river regulations
of the ancients at the recent National
Drainage Congress, Sir William Wil-
cocks, the noted English engineer,
said: "Cyrus the Great controlled
the Gyndes, a tributary of the Tigris,
in a truly original manner. Babylon
was already peopled and lands were
needed for his Persian troops. The
Gyndes discharges 40,000 sec-ft. and
runs 30 ft. deep in a sandy and mo-
bile bed. He could build no regula-
tor, so he dug thirty canals, divided
the waters of the river among them,
closed the river by an earthen dam,
and completely controlled it. As he
could never have induced his wild
soldiers to dig these canals for any
useful purpose, he took advantage of
the fact that his favorite horse had
been drowned in the flood and urged
his soldiers to dig the canals and
dissipate the waters of the river in
such a fashion that it could never
again drown a horse.—Engineering
Record.

PUA REPROVES OFFICER.

around the island, visiting principally
the Kohala and Kau districts. At the
request of district Magistrate R. H.
Atkins of North Kohala he adminis-
tered a mild rebuke to Officer Kaipoo,
who was deemed guilty of something
or other for firing at a bunch of es-
caping gamblers whose game he had
raided. As the shooting wounded no
one but enabled an officer to capture
six of the miscreants the reprimand
was extremely light.

10,000 RATS KILLED.

ports that 10,442 rats were caught and
killed between Olaa and Hamakua
during the month of May, according to
the figures which have been submitted
