Three Bills Before Congress to Establish National Leprosarium on Molokai

RECEIPT OF NEWS HERE STARTS PROMPT PROTEST

Board of Health to Take Matter Up—Chamber of Commerce May Be Called Upon

Three bills are now before Congress having as their object the establishment of a national leprosy hospital for lepers on the island of Molokai.

The bills were introduced in the house early in June. Two of them were referred to the committee on interstate and foreign commerce. The third went to the committee on appropriations.

Street Rumors Laid at Rest by Statement Made by Federal Representative

ATTORNEY-GENERAL AGAIN BEFORE THE GRAND JURY

Instructions Call for Probe of "Affair," Also of McCarn and McBride

"There is absolutely no reason why the public of Honolulu should have occasion to believe that action has been taken by anyone to protect District Attorney Jeff McCarn or save him from a broad investigation into the affair between himself and Claudius McBride."

Federal Judge Sanford B. Dole thus expressed himself this morning shortly after the grand jury went into session for a continuance of its investigation of the McCarn-McBride affair. He made the statement following an interview with the Star-Bulletin in which he brought out the fact that the attorney-general of the United States desires the grand jury and Special Assistant Alexander Lindsay, Jr., to make an investigation of the "affair" between McCarn and McBride, and not necessarily an investigation of an assault either upon McCarn or McBride.

Judge Dole's statement, as given above, serves in no small way to clear up the rumors which have been prevalent of late to the effect that it was the idea of certain persons to "get" Mr. McCarn.

GOVERNOR PINKHAM WILL DELIVER ADDRESS ON VITAL LOCAL TOPICS

Large Attendance is Expected at Chamber of Commerce Meeting Today

PUBLIC IS INVITED TO ATTEND THIS SESSION

Outline of Future Policy of the Territorial Administration May Be Outlined

Governor L. E. Pinkham will deliver an address under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce of Honolulu, in the maki pavilion of the Young hotel at 3 o'clock this afternoon, in which he will discuss a number of the burning issues of the day in Hawaii and will probably outline the proposed future policy of the territorial administration.

While this is a regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, a general invitation has been issued to the public and it is anticipated that the attendance will be sufficiently large to pack the pavilion.

The land question will be one of the principal issues discussed by the governor and considerable pertinent information is expected to be forthcoming.

The Star-Bulletin, in the second edition this afternoon, will carry a verbatim report of the governor's address, as all of its readers will be deeply interested and the many who will find it impossible to attend the meeting will be afforded an opportunity to digest the remarks of the chief executive at their leisure.

HAWAIIAN SUGAR PAYS THE INITIAL TOLL FOR USE OF UNCLE SAM'S 'BIG DITCH'

Returns for Month of June Show That Local Product Brought Government Sum of \$7,000 During Temporary Suspension of Tehuantepec Route During Last Month—This Amount May Be Considerably Swelled by Later Returns

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 18.—Hawaiian sugar figures prominently in the first report of cash returns from Uncle Sam's gigantic work in the "Big Ditch" linking the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, being the sole item of freight carried during June.

During the temporary suspension of the Tehuantepec route barges laden with Hawaiian sugar paid a toll of \$7000 for passage through the Panama canal, according to returns made to the treasury department today.

This sum includes all tolls paid up until and including June 1 and it is probable that the amount will be considerably swelled upon receipt of the report and cash for the current month, which will not reach Washington until the middle of July.

Malpico Betrayed Federals And Expected Quick Death

MAZATLAN, Mex., June 18.—It developed today that romance, intrigue, treachery and remorse combined to cause the self-destruction of Captain Malpico of the constitutionalist gunboat Tampico which was sunk by the federal gunboat Guerrero yesterday.

The Tampico a year ago was a federal vessel and Captain Malpico turned her over to the rebels as the price for the hand of a fair constitutionalist of whom he was enamored. Had he surrendered, following yesterday's disastrous engagement, he expected summary death at the hands of the comrades he had previously betrayed.

The victorious Guerrero entered Mazatlan bay today with flag at half mast in honor of the bravery of Captain Malpico.

Eight Eruptions Reported From Mt. Lassen Today

REDDING, Cal., June 18.—Eight eruptions in the old crater on Mt. Lassen have been reported today, while an investigation has confirmed the report of the opening up of a new crater on the southern slope of the mountain.

But little detailed information can be secured at the present time as the continuous eruptions compel the exploration parties to refrain from venturing above the timber line.

Quimet Practically Out of British Open Championship

TROON, Scotland, June 18.—Francis Quimet, the American champion, was practically eliminated from the British open golf championship today, when he required 88 strokes for his first round. Vardon had a 72, and several other pros. turned in cards of 76. Quimet played sensational golf in the qualifying rounds, finishing the 74 holes only four strokes behind the leader, Taylor. Today he was in continual trouble, and showed poor form.

Lorimer Bank Declared to be Hopelessly Insolvent

CHICAGO, Ill., June 18.—The attorney-general, in applying for a receiver for the La Salle Street Trust and Savings Bank, says the concern is hopelessly insolvent, owing to the culpable negligence of former Senator William Lorimer and the balance of the directors of the institution.

Effort Made to Dynamite Special Train of the Czar

EERLIN, Germany, June 18.—Special dispatches from St. Petersburg report an unsuccessful attempt to dynamite the Czar's special train, en route from Kishinev to Tarkov with the entire royal family.

The effort to wreck the train and kill the royal family was made at a point near Selo, and but for the fact that the "pilot" train exploded the bomb it is believed that serious damage would have resulted.

FISHMARKET SALOONS AND WAIKIKI INN LICENSES MEET OPPOSITION

Management of Former and Their Locations Protested Against by George Paty, Representing the Anti-Saloon League, While License Inspector Fennell Charges That Liquor is Sold to Minors at Beach Resort—Board Decides to Give Both Sides Hearing and Meeting for That Purpose Will Be Held Next Week.

Before the board of liquor license commissioners, sitting to consider the applications for renewal of such licenses yesterday afternoon, two distinct movements of protest were launched. The first, if it succeeds, will mean that all saloons will be driven out of the "fish market zone."

The second aims at the Waikiki Inn, and if it succeeds it means that that resort will no longer have the right to sell booze.

Because of the large amount of business before the commission, 60 applications for renewal of licenses being before it, the two movements were not carried to a conclusion yesterday afternoon. At the request of persons interested, on one side or the other, the board agreed to set a special time for consideration of this matter.

The protest against the Waikiki Inn came direct from License Inspector William Fennell, who charged the management with selling liquor to minors, in open defiance of the law and the order of the commission. The protests against the saloons in the "fishmarket zone," which were led by George Paty, who appeared on behalf of the Anti-Saloon League, were directed not so much to the saloons themselves and their management as to their location, the undesirability of such places near the markets being urged.

The commission was requested to set a special time for hearing arguments on this point. It was stated that many protestants wished to be heard. E. C. Peters, representing as attorney one of the saloons in this district, insisted that a further hearing was unnecessary, and called upon the commission to decide the question without more ado. However, the board decided in its executive session to give both sides a hearing, the date of which will be Wednesday or Thursday of next week.

Of the 60 applications for licenses, 40 were granted by the board. Nineteen were held up, either because protests had been made against them or

'JIM' QUINN IS NOW CANDIDATE FOR SUPERVISOR

Former Member of Board Makes Vigorous Announcement of His Intentions

Manuel C. Pacheco, member of the board of supervisors and chairman of the Democratic territorial central committee, today announced his candidacy at the coming election for the territorial senate.

"To the Voters of the Third Senatorial District, Island of Oahu:

C. H. BROWN MAY RUN FOR OFFICE; LOW TO SENATE?

Charles H. Brown, for years identified with local business interests in this city, now a member of the civil service commission, will soon bring his name forward as a candidate for the house of representatives on the Democratic ticket from the fourth district.

While Mr. Brown has been closely in touch with the local political situation in the city and county of Honolulu and throughout the territory since the annexation of the islands he has never entered the lists for office.

The announcement was made this morning, that he would make a serious fight for a place on the ticket. He has already marshaled his forces and has intimated to his friends that he is in the game to stay.

Eben P. Low, who returned from the island of Hawaii after an absence of one month, is stated, upon excellent authority, as seriously considering the advisability of permitting his name to be used as a candidate for the territorial senate. Low was talked of as a suitable timber for the mayoralty, and did not deny that he might enter the lists for that office. He is a Republican.

Since returning to Honolulu, a change is reported in the political aspirations of the steamship manager and former cattle king, and that he will come before the primaries as a republican candidate for the upper house is declared to be a foregone conclusion.

Low entered the political arena several years ago, having been elected to the membership of the board of supervisors. During the two years that he served in this capacity he was termed by his colleagues the "watch dog of the treasury."

GOVERNOR GOES TO HILO TO BE GIVEN 'DOPE'

SHIPPERS' WHARF COMMITTEE GOES OUT OF BUSINESS

"I Want Them to Tell Me All They Can; Will Absorb All I Can," Declares Pinkham

"I want them to tell me all they can, and I will absorb all of it if I possibly can," declared Governor Pinkham this morning, when questioned on the purpose of his visit to Hilo, on which he will start Saturday evening, returning June 30.

"I want to find out all I can, and will make a searching investigation into the subjects to be presented by different committees that have been appointed for that purpose. I do not know just where this investigation will lead.

"This will be my first trip to the island since taking up my duties as governor. From what I learn, there are a good many things the people of Hawaii wish to inform me on. I shall be glad to hear them, and they may expect me to insist on being given the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth."

SHIPPERS' WHARF COMMITTEE GOES OUT OF BUSINESS

Passing of Unique Organization Ends 14 Years of Effective Sanitation Work

After an active and effective existence of 14 years, the Shippers' Wharf Committee yesterday permanently disbanded, placing the matter in its treasury in local banks, and today the work of the committee goes over to the Chamber of Commerce of Honolulu through the chamber's health committee.

The passing of this unique organization puts in the jurisdiction of the chamber's committee the handling of all future proceeds from the special and unofficial tax imposed on incoming cargoes and used several times in the past as a means of war to fight epidemics that threatened disaster to the port of Honolulu. The Shippers' Wharf Committee itself was unofficial. It was organized in 1900 to deal with the plague epidemic of that year. Its latest activity was during the campaign against the mosquito more than two years ago when a case of yellow fever threatened an outbreak of the dread "yellow jack" at this port. Then the shippers' committee came forward with \$45,000, contributed by the shippers.
