CONGRESS MAY ELIMINATE LOCAL 'RED LIGHT' DISTRICT BY LAW

(Continued from page one)

for the purpose of proving the existence of said nuisance. If the complaint is filed by a citizen, it shall not be dismissed, except upon a sworn statement made by the complainant and his attorney, setting forth the reasons why the action should be dismissed, and the dismissal approved by the attorney of the United States for the territory of Hawaii or the attorney-general of the United States of America in writing or in open court. If the court is of the opinion that the action ought not to be dismissed, it may direct the attorney of the United States for the territory of Hawaii to prosecute said action in judgment; and if the action is continued more than one term of court, any citizen of the territory of Hawaii, or the attorney of the United States for the territory of Hawaii, may be substituted for the complaining party and prosecute said action to judgment. If the action is brought by a citizen, and the court finds there was no reasonable ground or cause for said action, the costs may be taxed to such citizen.

Sec. 4. That in case of the violation of any injunction granted under the provisions of this act, the court, or, in vacation, a judge thereof, may summarily try and punish the offender. The proceedings shall be commenced by filing with the clerk of the court an information, under oath, setting out the alleged facts constituting such violation, upon which the court or judge shall cause a warrant to issue under which the defendant shall be arrested. The trial may be had upon affidavits or either party may at any stage of the proceedings demand the production and oral examination of the witnesses. A party found guilty of contempt, under the provisions of this section, shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$200 nor more than \$1000 or by imprisonment in the district jail not less than three nor more than six months or by both fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 5. That if the existence of the nuisance be established in an action as provided in this act, or in a criminal proceeding an order of abatement shall be entered as a part of the judgment in the case, which order shall direct the removal from the building or place of all fixtures, furniture, musical instruments, or movable property used in conducting the nuisance, and shall direct the sale thereof in the manner provided for the sale of chattels under execution, and the effectual closing of the building or place against its use for any purpose, and so keep it closed for a period of one year, unless sooner released. If any person shall break and enter or use a building, erection, or place so directed to be closed he shall be punished as for contempt, as provided in the preceding section.

Sec. 6. That the proceeds of the sale of the personal property, as provided in the preceding section, shall be applied in the payment of the costs of the action and abatement, and the balance, if any, shall be paid to the defendant.

Sec. 7. That if the owner appears and pays all costs of the proceeding and files a bond, with sureties to be approved by the clerk, in the full value of the property, to be ascertained by the court or, in vacation, by the collector of taxes of the territory of Hawaii, conditioned that he will immediately abate said nuisance and prevent the same from being established or kept within a period of one year thereafter, the court, or, in vacation, the judge, may, if satisfied of his good faith, order the premises closed under the order of abatement to be delivered to said owner and said order of abatement canceled so far as the same may relate to said property; and if the proceeding be an action in equity and said bond be given and costs therein paid before judgment and order of abatement, the action shall be

thereby abated as to said building only. The release of the property under the provisions of this section shall not release it from judgment, lien, penalty, or liability to which it may be subject by law.

Sec. 8. That whenever a permanent injunction issues against any person for maintaining a nuisance as herein defined, or against any owner or agent of the building kept or used for the purpose prohibited by this act, there shall be assessed against said building and the ground upon which the same is located and against the person or persons maintaining said nuisance, and the owner or agent of said premises, a tax of \$300. The assessment of said tax shall be made by the assessor of the territory of Hawaii and shall be made within three months from the date of the granting of the permanent injunction. In case the assessor fails or neglects to make said assessment the same shall be made by the chief of police, and a return of said assessment shall be made to the collector of taxes. Said tax shall be a perpetual lien upon all property, both personal and real, used for the purpose of maintaining said nuisance, and the payment of said tax shall not relieve the person or building from any other penalties provided by law. The provisions of the law relating to the collection and distribution of taxes upon person and real property shall govern in the collection and distribution of the tax herein prescribed in so far as the same are applicable and not in conflict with the provisions of this act.

Sec. 9. The United States district attorney or other attorney representing the prosecution for violation of this statute, with the approval of the court, may grant immunity to any witness called to testify in behalf of the prosecution.

\$2,000,000 LOSS TO COUNTRY YEARLY IN UNTIMELY DEATHS

(By Latest Mail) SAN FRANCISCO.—Members of the San Francisco teachers' institute were startled when Lewis M. Terman, associate professor of education at Stanford university, told them that probably 500 of the children they were teaching in the schools here would become insane later in life.

Prof. Terman was lecturing on "The School's Contribution to National Vitality." "Conservation of our national vitality is the most important problem of our day," he said. "Every year in this country there are 1,500,000 deaths—42 per cent, or some 600,000 of which are preventable, or at least postponable. If we could put into practice our knowledge of diseases we could add 15 years to the average life."

Untimely deaths, he said, cost this country each year more than \$2,000,000,000.

Malnutrition was assigned by Prof. Terman as being responsible for more human life than alcohol.

Better medical inspection of pupils was urged by the speaker.

Simplified Curriculum

Principal Shong of the West Division High School, says that 47 per cent of the high school failures are attributable to lack of daily preparation on the part of the pupils, and that the causes for this in turn are want of interest, engrossment in outside concerns and too many students. Two of these causes reflect upon the pupils, the last—the overloading of the curriculum—is chargeable on the management of the school and should be remedied without delay. It is a fault by no means peculiar to Milwaukee. The simplification of the curriculum would reduce the percentage of failures attributed to other causes and probably would contribute more than any other single expedient toward increasing the efficiency of the high schools. The same prescription would work for good in the grade schools also. The average teacher would accomplish more if not directed to accomplish so much.—Milwaukee Wisconsin.

WILL SECURE LEGAL HELP IN CAPITAL

Chamber Makes Promotion Allowance Preferred Debt—Elects New Members

Authorization was given the committee on maritime affairs of the Chamber of Commerce of Honolulu, at yesterday's meeting, to secure the services of former Governor Frear, if possible, as a representative in Washington to further the interests of the territory in relation to the Kalahele channel and other harbor improvements and extensions. Provided Mr. Frear is not attainable the committee will secure the services of some other attorney.

Chairman W. Fred Guza, of this committee, reported favorable action and a sub-committee gathering data to be forwarded to Washington as soon as a representative is secured.

After a lengthy argument no definite action was taken relative to the employment of Asiatics on government work. A motion to write the secretary of war and the navy requesting that citizen labor be employed, as far as possible, on all public works was defeated in a tie vote.

The sum of \$300 a month was voted to the Hawaii Promotion Committee, this amount to be a "preferred" debt of the chamber.

Five new members were elected. They are Edgar Wood, Joel C. Cohen, H. L. Strange, W. Spencer Bowen and J. E. Sheedy.

OUR STATISTICIAN SAYS:
