**JACK LONDON'S
 MASTERPIECE AT
 LIBERTY THEATER**

At Ye Liberty theater tonight the first of the run of big pictures brought to Honolulu by Sam Blair will be thrown across the screen. It will be Jack London's "The Sea Wolf," like all of London's works, a story of big red-blooded men who live big lives in the great world of out-of-doors.

London possesses an ability of putting into his stories a series of thrilling adventures that, while they are adventures of the most exciting nature nevertheless are true to life. None of this effect has been lost in the filming of "The Sea Wolf," London having shown himself to be not only a word-picture artist but one with not a little ability in preparing a scenario for the motion pictures.

All of the several stories of London's that have been filmed have been photographed under the personal direction of London himself, and he has insisted on a great amount of detail that might otherwise have been lost.

Ye Liberty theater has been thoroughly renovated for the season of the movies that Mr. Blair anticipates will last for many months, during which the latest high-class pictures will be shown.

Two picture machines will be used in presentation of these pictures, thereby avoiding the usual delays between reels.

Two performances will be given each evening, the first commencing at 7:30, and the second at 9:15.

**'THE GIRL' TO
 BE PRESENTED
 AT THE BIJOU**

"The Girl of the Golden West" which created a dramatic sensation here in the early season of The Players' All-Star Company, will again be presented at the Bijou theater tonight and tomorrow.

Those who were fortunate enough to witness David Belasco's great masterpiece will recall the acting of Miss Florence Oakley as the "Girl," also the balance of the company, and the grand scenic production, which made this drama one of the most attractive stock productions ever staged in Honolulu. The play will be presented and mounted exactly as it was when first produced here.

The story of "The Girl of the Golden West" is of the early days of California, during the gold fever, when California was filled with all classes and characters, all seeking fortunes, some lawfully, others not. The drama is full of intense situations and abounds with many thrilling scenes with laughable comedy. "The Girl of the Golden West" was first produced in San Francisco at the Alcazar theater with Blanche Bates, running fourteen weeks. It was later taken to New York where it played for two consecutive years at the Belasco theater. During the run in New York David Belasco arranged to produce the play in Los Angeles and immediately engaged Miss Oakley to play the part of the "Girl," a role in which she achieved great success, receiving an ovation for five months at the Belasco theater.

In the production here the same Miss Oakley will be seen in the star role. George Webb plays the road agent. Many were turned away from the recent performance of this drama and should therefore engage their tickets early. Friday and Saturday night "Within the Law," with George Webb as Joe Garson, will be the offering, and will also be the farewell attraction for Mr. Webb and his company of artists.

**PROF. CASPER

Herr George Casper will make his initial bow in a public recital at the Opera House tomorrow evening. Prof. Casper is a young Austrian violinist of marked ability and his opening program is being keenly anticipated by music lovers in Honolulu.

As an exponent of the classics on the violin Prof. Casper has attained not a little prominence during his short residence in the islands, and as a consequence much is expected of his rendition of the classical program that he has outlined for his recital.

In selecting his program Prof. Casper endeavored to give a wide range of the finest compositions of the violin masters and, according to musical experts, he has succeeded admirably.
